#### **Objective**

Defamation continues to play an important role in protection of reputation as the socially valuable freedom of speech engages with new technologies and in new social contexts. Defamation Act amendments have changed the landscape for claimants. A number of matters have reached the Court of Appeal in NSW in late 2014 so there is increased focus on the basis of these decisions on defences and damages. Major claims still involve television and paper publishers but other channels are increasingly in focus. Social standards, privacy and technology are changing providing a complex backdrop to defamation claims.
