

"Save the Dream" Helping Ohioans Avoid Foreclosure

Program Has Helped Thousands with Assistance and Advice

The nationwide housing crisis continues to threaten the dream of home ownership for Ohioans. The Associated Press recently reported that "Weak sales, sinking home values, tighter home-loan lending practices and a slowing U.S. economy hamstrung by high fuel prices have lef

hamstrung by high fuel prices have left some homeowners with few options to avoid foreclosure. Many can't find buyers or owe more than their home is worth and can't refinance into an affordable loan."

According to RealtyTrac, Ohio's foreclosure rate recently ranked 7th in the nation, with one in every 440 households reporting a filing.

While still a dangerous situation, this new ranking actually represents an improvement fueled by Ohio's "Save the Dream" program.

"Save the Dream" is Ohio's anti-foreclosure effort, designed to offer information and assistance to help you keep your home.

Since the campaign was launched one year ago, more than **5,600 Ohioans** have received housing counseling and/or legal assistance through "Save the Dream." There have been more than **26,000 visitors** to the program's website (http://www.savethedream.ohio.gov/) and more than **12,000 calls** to the hotline (888-404-4674).

Thousands of homeowners have attended borrower outreach days around the state. These events give homeowners the opportunity to meet one-on-one with their mortgage servicers to discuss the possibility of a "work out resolution" and attend workshops on foreclosure prevention topics.

PREVENTION EFFORT

A model program for Ohio courts to use mediation in home foreclosure cases has trained more than 250 court personnel from 50 of Ohio's 88 counties.

More than 1,300 Ohio attorneys have volunteered to provide legal assistance free of charge to people in danger of losing their homes. The Columbus Bar Association recently honored the initiative with its "Outstanding Pro Bono Project" Award.

The Ohio Department of Development and the Ohio Housing Finance Agency have distributed more than \$5 million in grants to housing counseling agencies. They have also offered \$1 million in grants and \$3.1 million in deferred loans for homeowners through the Ohio Home Rescue Program.

To supplement these programs, Ohio received \$258.1 million in Neighborhood Stabilization Program funds from HUD. Of this amount, \$116.8 million was awarded directly to the state for distribution to neighborhoods in need, especially to restore or demolish abandoned homes.

Legislation is also in the works to protect renters when their landlords go into foreclosure. The Ohio Renter's Protection Act sponsored by State Reps. Ted Celeste (D-Columbus) and Mike Foley (D-Cleveland) would require landlords to notify tenants and allow renters to stay under a month-to-month lease once the property is sold. It may join "Save the Dream" as one more protection for people during this crisis.

Keys to Save Your Dream of Home Ownership

- Act now; don't ignore the problem!
- Contact your mortgage servicer as soon as you realize you have a problem.
- Open and respond to all mail from your servicer.
- Contact a HUD-approved housing counselor.
- Stay in your home to make sure you qualify for assistance.
- Understand Ohio's foreclosure process, options and alternatives.
- Beware of scams.
- Do not sign any document that you don't understand.

Governor Offers Bold Vision for Ohio

Highlights of Ted Strickland's State of the State Address to the Legislature

Ohio may be facing tough times, but that makes this the best time for bold action to confront challenges facing state finances and education. That was the message delivered by Ohio Governor Ted Strickland in his State of the State Address to a joint session of the Ohio General Assembly.



It offers a transformative plan to reform education in Ohio and proposes to balance the budget without raising taxes. It also lays out several important tools, such as tax credits, to help stimulate the economy and create jobs here in Ohio.

Here are some of the highlights of the Governor's plan:

Fiscal Responsibility: Living Within Our Means

Though forecasts indicate general revenue taxes available to the State of Ohio will be lower in the 2011 fiscal year than they were seven years earlier, the Governor's budget is balanced without raising taxes through a series of tough choices and leveraging federal stimulus funds.

Education: A Comprehensive Plan to Modernize Education and Ensure Every Child Learns Skills to be Successful in a 21st Century Economy

Governor Strickland's comprehensive plan to establish a modernized education system is designed to ensure every Ohio child learns the skills they need to be successful in the 21st Century – as productive citizens, in work and in life. The plan demands an unprecedented level of accountability and transparency from our school districts to ensure taxpayers know exactly how their dollars are being spent, right down to an individual school building's budget. It meets the state's constitutional obligation to provide a thorough and efficient system of public education for Ohio students.

<u>Tax Relief: New Tax Credits to Create New Ohio</u> <u>Jobs and Fully Phase-in Tax Reforms</u>

The budget fully implements previously approved tax

reforms, including the full phase-in of a 21 percent across-the-board income tax reduction. In addition to broadening the Job Retention Tax Credit and Job Creation Tax Credit to encourage more business opportunity in Ohio, the Governor's budget creates several new job-creating tax credits. They include a Film Tax Credit to spur growth of the film industry and a New Markets Tax Credit to give our cities and towns a proven tool to spur investment and bring new life to downtown centers.

Health Care: Access to Health Care for Every Ohio Child and 110,000 More Ohioans

The state children's health insurance program and buy-in program would provide access to affordable health coverage for every single child in Ohio. The budget expands health care access to an additional 110,000 adult Ohioans currently without coverage. It allows Ohioans with employer-provided insurance to purchase coverage for their dependents up to the age of 29, and allows small business employees who lose their jobs to purchase continuation coverage for up to 12 months and other innovative reforms.

<u>Higher Education: Extend Historic Tuition Freeze</u> to a Third Year for All University System of Ohio Schools

Governor Strickland's budget extends the current 2-year tuition freeze at all University System of Ohio institutions for a third year in fiscal year 2010 (the 2009-2010 school year), and for a fourth straight year at all community college and university branch campuses in fiscal year 2011 (the 2010-2011 school year). Under this plan, 60 percent of all students in the University System of Ohio will have seen no increase in tuition for four straight years.

Job Creation: Pledge to Work with Legislature to Develop a Second Job Stimulus Plan

Governor Strickland announced that he will work with the legislature to develop a second job stimulus plan in the coming months. It would include an expansion of Ohio's Third Frontier program, regulatory reform and streamlining measures to assure that Ohio gets its share of federal stimulus funds as well as other investment dollars to create jobs in the short term and strengthen Ohio for generations to come.
