#### **AN OVERVIEW**

The Seattle Film Institute (SFI), founded in 1994, is well known for both the small size of our classes and our commitment to hands-on education. SFI is locat-



ed on its own 7,400 sq. ft. mini-campus just 10 minutes from downtown Seattle. SFI offers the largest independent film program in the Northwest. With its 40-Week Total Immersion Program, SFI is a destination for students from all parts of the United States and abroad, including Canada, Finland, Japan, Taiwan and Israel.

#### **DEDICATED FACULTY**

Faculty members are not only dedicated teachers but also experienced professionals in their chosen



fields. Our teachers, often working professionals, give the school its character and identity, and provide a genuinely rigorous education in an open and supportive fashion.

#### **ADVANCING EXCELLENCE**

Two notable partnerships help films produced by SFI students attain a special level of excellence.

First, through the Pacific Northwest Film

#### **INTEGRATED PROGRAM**

The Seattle Film Institute offers a fully integrated program in filmmaking and



digital video production. Students in the fulltime program live, eat, and breathe film as they explore production, screenwriting, and film history. These

students are in class and hands-on labs for 4 hours a day, 5 days a week for 10 months.

#### A MEASURE OF SUCCESS

The opportunity for students to develop and acquire skills in all aspects of the filmmaking process points to the real measure of the school's success–its alumni. Our graduates have jobs and internships locally and also in Los Angeles, Chicago, Dallas,

and Austin. Just as important are former students who are making their personal mark on film communities across the United States by launching their own independent projects and companies.



## CURRICULUM OVERVIEW

#### THE 40 WEEK TOTAL IMMERSION FILMMAKING PROGRAM

The 40 week full-time total immersion program provides a complete handson overview of the filmmaking and screenwriting process as well as a solid grounding in film history and analysis. During the program, students learn technical skills and practice standard industry protocol and, equally important, develop their personal artistic vision.

#### **ELEMENTS OF FILMMAKING**

Elements of Filmmaking concentrates on areas involved with directing, production design, producing, and the practical workings of the film world. The first quarter reinforces basic skills in lighting, camera operation, and editing. The second quarter is

quarter is oriented towards production management, budgeting and scheduling, and reinforcing both the preproduction and production skills that are needed to successfully complete both lab and



out-of-class projects. The third quarter highlights very specific areas such as casting, audition techniques, working with actors, and art direction. The final quarter is geared to life after school. Here, students prepare their resumes and portfolio reels. Students also study grant writing and fund raising for documentaries as well as analyze patterns of producing, production, and distribution for projects including short films, independent features and major mainstream productions.

#### SCREENWRITING

In Screenwriting students develop a fundamental awareness and understanding of script and dramatic structure that is crucial to understanding the filmmaking process. During the course of the program all students complete an original feature-length screenplay. The first quarter focuses on screenplay structure and the development of story ideas.



During the second and third quarters, the emphasis is on overall story structure and specific topic areas such as writing dialogue and developing characters. Students complete their screenplay during the fourth quarter. As part of the screenwriting program, students also deal with the business of screenwriting from

pitching scripts to finding agents. In addition, it is during this class that students write the short scripts that are produced in the production phase of the program.

#### **TOOLS OF PRODUCTION**

Tools of Production focuses on developing both the creative and technical hands-on skills that are at the core of the filmmaking process. The groundwork in lighting, composition, story boarding, and editing is set out in the first and second quarters of the program. In the third and fourth quarters of the program, as projects become larger and more complex, students build on their basic skills and develop their craft in all aspects of production with a particular emphasis on cinematography, camera operation, editing and sound design. Over the 40 week program, students are involved in every aspect of pre-production, production, and post-production. In addition to individual projects, each student rotates through all the major crew positions including director, director of photography, camera operator, sound and editing.

#### FILM HISTORY AND ANALYSIS

Film History and Analysis provides an intensive grounding in film history and introduces students to the core theories of film criticism and analysis. The first quarter traces the history of film from its very beginnings to the end of the silent era. The second and third quarters focus on the 1930's and 1940's and the development of the Hollywood studio system with a particular emphasis on genres such as

film noir, musicals, and gangster films. The fourth quarter is devoted to international cinema and alternatives to Hollywood from the 1940's to the present. During the class, students concentrate on the elements of film language that make film a unique medium—editing, cinematography, color, and sound. At the core of the film history program is the fundamental concentration on both the individual film and the underlying structure of film and filmmaking.



#### LAB DAY

Lab Day takes place for four hours each week. During the second and third trimesters, students use this time to complete projects using the school's facilities. The lab time also provides a scheduled period of time when students can meet with each other to work on group projects. Students may also use this time for individual tutorials and faculty may also schedule additional classes during this time when appropriate.

**Virginia Bogert** has directed, written, and produced award-winning films and videos for over 20 years, from commercials and corporate to documentaries and feature films. Her project "Pike Place Market: Soul of a City" garnered three

Emmys. She is vice president of Women in Film/Seattle. She launched her company Laughing Dog Pictures (www. laughingdogpictures.com) in 1993.

**Alec Carlin** recently wrote and directed "Outpatient" which has won awards including Best Picture and Best Director at the New York International Independent Film and Video Festival as well as Best Picture awards at the Keywest IndieFest, the No Dance Film Festival and the International Festival of Festivals in Palm Springs. Alec was a finalist in the Nicholls Foundation Screenwriting Fellowship and his script, "Darkdrive," was produced in 1997.

**David Culp** has extensive experience as an animator, director, and producer of commercials, documentaries, corporate and educational films and television programs. David has worked as a film educator for 16 years and has worked in the Seattle film community for over 20 years.

**James Eaton**, founder and president of James Eaton Associates, has over 20 years of practical experience in all aspects of filmmaking including ads, documentaries, and features with an emphasis on creative development, execution and packaging of visual, audio and graphic information. His expertise extends to computer animation, visual effects, high-end post-production, digital compositing, special effects and CGI platforms.

**Christopher Mosio** graduated from the USC School of Cinema/Television. In addition to commercials and documentaries, he has worked on nearly two dozen feature films-- both the micro-budgeted independent film and the Hollywood studio production. His work has appeared in theaters and television. Christopher also has filmed many live concerts and music videos, including those of Celine Dion, Reba McEntire, and K.D. Lang, and is a regular for VH-1's "Behind the Music."



**Krk Nordenstrom** is a graduate of the Seattle Film Institute's 40 week Total Immersion Program. For the last eight years he has worked as a designer and produc-

> tion artist for print and web projects. Most recently he has produced, directed, and edited two music videos for the Seattle band Kultur Shock. He is also a strong presence in Seattlewood and Nimble Productions and is highly visible on many Seattle independent productions on the set and as an editor.

> **Lance Rhoades** is a graduate instructor at the University of Washington Department of Comparative Literature and Cinema Studies Program where he earned the 2003-04 Excellence in Teaching Award. He has taught summer courses on literature and film at MIT and Cal Tech. Lance has written articles on

horror films and film music, and is currently editing a book on Federico Fellini.

**David Shulman** has produced, directed, written and edited numerous PBS documentaries. He has worked as a story analyst for Columbia Pictures and worked on a wide range of feature films. He received his MFA in Cinema/ Television from USC and taught film/video at the university level prior to founding the Seattle Film Institute in 1994. His screenplay, "World Enough and Time," is due to go into production later this year.

**Kevin Tomlinson** has been a producer, director, and cameraman for 20 years, working with broadcast (NBC News, ABC, CBS, FOX-TV, PBS, etc) and corporate clients to produce news magazines, documentaries, international travel series, marketing, and corporate communications programming. Recent projects include 60 Minutes (CBS), Dateline NBC, 48 Hours (CBS), 20/20 (ABC), National Geographic TV, The Today Show (NBC), Good Morning America (ABC), Entertainment Tonight, The Disney Channel, Nicklelodeon, The Discovery channel, The Learning Channel, and The History Channel.

**George Tramountanas** has worked in several Hollywood offices, including those of Michael Phillips and Oliver Stone. He has a Masters in Film and TV Production from USC, where he made the award-winning short "SCREWED: A Hollywood Bedtime Story". In addition, he's worked as a film publicist, written several scripts, and directed a promotional video for Camp Agape NW (an organization for kids with cancer).

**David Trees** graduated with a four year degree in film production and has studied writing at the University of Washington. After scripting film documentaries, he did a two year stint writing for television. He then launched into a newspaper writing career as a reporter, editor and columnist. He left the news business to pursue his own creative writing and was awarded the national Writer's Digest grand prize for his screenplay "Under High Woods."

Tuition: \$16,900 Within four weeks of acceptance, a 20 percent deposit (\$3,400) is due to hold enrollment. The balance of tuition (\$13,500) is due one month prior to the start of the program.

Tuition includes film stock, processing, workprint, and access to all basic equipment needed to complete the assigned projects. Students also receive a copy of work completed during the program. Students are responsible for discretionary production costs, books, and supplies.
