#### Pastor's Corner

**Preparation** is the word for today. Jesus lifted up the parable of the ten bridesmaids in Matthew 25. Five were prepared with lamps and oil for use when the bridegroom was to arrive. The other five were foolish and unprepared. When the foolish ones attempted to borrow oil from the wise ones, they were turned down, because there was not enough oil to go around.

The *interim time is a period of preparation for the future of the congregation* and it is not just a time, but a process to which all are invited to share. This period in the life of our congregation is one where we examine what works well for us and areas of activity and direction that do not work well for us. David Sawyer left us with recommended tasks to prepare us for the time when we will develop the future vision of what we discern that God wants from this congregation.

If there is one thing that I have learned about congregations across our land it is that communication skills are lacking. When I have done surveys with congregations, the largest complaint has been that people say they do not get the proper information in a proper timing and in a way that helps them to know the leadership's expectation in ministry.

We are attempting to keep it simple in our congregation for this fall. We are kicking off the study and discussion in the book by John Savage, <u>Listening and Caring Skills</u>. As you may have already heard, we are being treated to an introduction by a graduate of this John Savage course - this Wednesday evening (Sept. 11) at our meal together by Thais Sikora. Come and enjoy this meal and time together.

So, it is proper to say that when we have, in a significant way, moved through this initial recommendation from David Sawyer and really begun to build our skills of communication together, we are then ready to move to the next assignment. That second phase is to spend a few intentional weeks building on our understanding of who we are together and whose we are. "The icing on that cake" will come when we work together in discerning what it is that God is calling us to do and be in this part of His Kingdom.

So it is, we prepare our lamps for giving the light that is needed in a wise fashion just as Jesus' parable signifies. Let us prepare ourselves to be the congregation that we aspire to be. We live in challenging times that challenge us to be prepared to be the disciples that explored the cost of being disciples.

#### Bristol Faith in Action Personal Care Kit Item List

In a 1-gallon Zip-Loc or reusable cloth shopping bag, regular (not travel size) size of the following:

- **♦** Shampoo
- ♦ Soap
- ♦ Toothbrush
- **♦** Toothpaste
- ♦ Deodorant
- ♦ Comb or brush
- ♦ Razor (s)
- ♦ Small can of shaving foam
- ♦ Washcloth
- ♦ Emery boards or nail clippers
- ♦ Lotion, if available

If you tailor some to men and some to women that would be great. For example, Secret deodorant and emery boards rather than Right Guard and nail clippers. But this is not a requirement. Inexpensive or store brands are fine. Purchase the things that you, yourself, would use.

While we prefer you not use travel size in the personal care kits, we welcome those because we give them out in bulk. But they should be unopened and clean.

You may also want to <u>include a note</u> stating who put the bag together, which church, and perhaps a note of encouragement.

II Thessalonians 3:16a "Now may the Lord of peace himself give you peace at all times in all ways."

Created in 1980 and one of our special PCUSA offerings, we again have the opportunity to participate in the Peacemaking Offering on Sunday, October 6. On a day we share with other Christians around the world to celebrate the Lord's

Supper, we are mindful of the love of Christ, who draws us all together despite our many differences.

Peacemaking is a central declaration of the gospel. Through Jesus Christ, God restores our relationship and grants us the gift of grace. We then experience God's grace as peace and His peace restores, sustains, and heals us. In response to this good news, Christians go into the world to proclaim and become part of God's peace-giving as peacemakers.

The Peacemaking Offering allows us to tangibly contribute to this work of peace by making funds available locally and nationally to provide programs to broaden our understanding as well as advocate for the work of peace. In a conflict-ridden world, we understand we cannot eliminate all conflicts, but we learn to address them through peaceful means with dialogue, education, and knowledge. God's peace then works through us.

Twenty-five percent of our Offering received will be retained locally and the Session has approved for the funds to be forwarded to Abuse Alternatives, Inc. here in Bristol. Having resources to provide an emergency shelter, victim/court advocate, education and outreach programs for domestic and dating violence is essential. An additional 25% will go to our presbytery/synod, with the remaining 50 percent to the General Assembly Mission Council for peacemaking involvement throughout the world.
