

Upcoming Weeks on the New Site ...

Below is a picture of the new Church Building Site as of February 18th. Many people have been commenting about "What is going on with the middle of the church?" Well, that's a great question . . . Because the roof structure of the sanctuary involves exposed rough cut scissor trusses, the roof construction is different than the pre-fab construction of the trusses that ultimately get covered up by drywall and ceiling material.

The other things folks have been asking is, "Has progress slowed?" The answer is, "No!" Indeed the "visible" progress looks slow, but much of what has been happening has been inside the portion that is already constructed . . . Plumbing and electrical work is ongoing. In the next three weeks, here is what you will see: the scissor trusses will be installed in the sanctuary, the sanctuary will have the sheathing put on the roof, then you will begin to see asphalt shingles going on the ends working toward the middle; next is windows and siding. So, within three to four weeks depending on weather, the entire building will be buttoned up. Also beginning March 10th, you should begins seeing the entryway developed - roadwork will progress at night and the turn-in and out will be constructed. It's a very exciting time . . . Be sure to keep all the workers in your prayers.

But, I want to talk about an even more genuine and innocent love: the love that Jesus showed to the world!


Lent is here and Easter is coming, but we have a lot of living to do between now and when we celebrate Easter in 2016. One of the most touching services that we have during the year occurs just before Easter: Maundy Thursday. This celebration is filled with love, although we sometimes are so filled with reminders of <u>our</u> sins and guilt that we forget that we should be celebrating <u>HIS</u> love.

The term "Maundy" comes from the Latin "mandatum" (from a verb that means "to give," "to order" or "to command"). As Jesus and the disciples walked toward the Garden of Gethsemane, having just finished the Last Supper, Jesus gave them a new commandment: "I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another" (John 13:34). Jesus had just given them a new way of sharing in God's grace, through the sharing of His body and blood in the Last Supper. Communion, each time it is offered, allows all of us to share in the ultimate sacrifice that Jesus did, out of His innocent and genuine love for us. His death, and resurrection, took away the punishment of eternal death for us. Talk about love!! Although I have love in my life, I have never been loved that much by anyone (except Jesus)!! Jesus' valentine for us was His very heart, given for us!!

Then, he gave the new command: we are to love one another. Not just halfheartedly, not just when it is convenient. "Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another." Wow! Helping More Than Once

Dan came to us about three years ago. He had a checkered past – a less than honorable discharge from the Navy, substance problems, and brief periods of incarceration. But at one time he had a beautiful family. Dan was referred to us by the Delaware 211 Help Line. He was what we call "virtually homeless." He had an address but it was an abandoned house without electricity or water. A propane heater provided a precarious source of heat. We listened to Dan's story, and then we helped him by providing financial assistance so that he could afford a security deposit for a decent apartment. Flash forward to 2016. Dan got robbed in a home invasion. He was broke and the rent was due. Scared and desperate, he called LCS. He knew we have a goal of limiting individual assistance to once, but he knew also that exceptions can be made. We listened to Dan's story; then decided to make an exception, and provided him with financial assistance to help with the rent. That was a wakeup call for Dan. Emboldened by our assistance, he did some serious soul searching and began to lay plans to reconnect with his family...and in his words, "learn to be a grandfather."

Thrivent Action Teams

For many years, the local Thrivent chapter made generous matching gifts to worthy causes in our community. Now, we are coming to a turning point. A new benefit program has been introduced, Thrivent Action Teams, which is the replacement program for the chapter system. The current board will thus be the last one for our New Castle County Chapter. Here's how these new Thrivent Action Teams work. First, identify an unmet need in your community that you are passionate about. Your project should bring people together for a one-time fundraiser, service activity or educational event that can be completed within 90 days. As a team leader, you can invite your friends, family and even community members to help. You apply online at <u>thrivent.com/actionteam</u>. An Action Team kit will arrive that includes a Community Impact Card with \$250 in seed money to help cover some of the project costs like promotional material and rental expenses.
