NEW JOURNEY by Ada Simpson, *Modern Liturgy Magazine*

I got a new car a few months ago. There was really nothing wrong with my old car, but it was time to trade it in. I have become such a creature of habit. I didn't go out shopping for something daring and different, slick and shiny, sporty and sexy. No, I went to my dealer and bought the latest model of my previous car. It's the same car, right down to the color. There's only one problem — I miss my old car.

You might wonder how that could be. It's the same car, right? Well, yes and no. It looks the same, but there are subtle changes that are driving me crazy, no pun intended. The interior is a

much lighter color; it shows every speck of dirt. All the little bins and cubbies that were in my old car are gone; I have very little space to store my sunglasses, electronic devices, and spare change. The audio system has been updated and "improved"; it's hands-free now — more like hands-off, if you ask me (I still can't figure out what all those buttons and knobs do). Oh yes, one more thing: my car talks to me. It tells me what I can and cannot do. Despite all this, I had to prepare to share new journeys with my new car. When I drove my brand-spanking-new car off the lot, I started a new journey, but I admit I felt like I was leaving an old friend behind. I can't help but think of all the journeys my old car and I took together and all the people who traveled with us. I felt comfortable with my old car, and I miss it.

I suspect that in the coming months, many Catholics are going to experience similar feelings about the new translation of the missal. The Mass will be the same



but different. We'll have to think about prayers and responses that previously rolled off our tongues. Perhaps at first, some will find it difficult to enter into prayer at all. They'll be

edged out of their comfort zone a bit. They'll recall the weddings and funerals, first communions and confirmations that they prayed so comfortably, and they'll question what was wrong with the Mass before. Others may even experience a period of grieving, a deep sense of loss and yearning for words and prayers that were so familiar.

Change is difficult. Experience has shown us, however, that with time we adapt, we adjust, and we adopt the new translation of the church's prayer as our own.

Many of the words that have changed will be sung. In the Memorial Acclamation, during the Eucharistic Prayer, we will have three new choices to sing.


SAINT JOSEPH COMES TO QUEEN OF ANGELS!

The Feast of the Immaculate Conception is a Holy Day of Obligation



and will be celebrated Thursday, **December 8**, **8:00 AM and 7:00 PM**

The Feast of the Immaculate Conception reveals when Mary was conceived by Joachim and Anne, she was already free of Original Sin—a freedom we gain later when we are baptized.

Mary—as Mother of God—was the first to receive Christ's saving grace. God's freeing Mary from Original Sin, her holiness from the beginning, does not mean that she did not have free will to choose whether or not to sin. She did. She had the freedom to say No to the angel Gabriel when that messenger appeared to Mary, asking her to be the mother of "the most high." We are blessed she chose to say Yes to God.

Mary's free will is an important part of her sinlessness. Fr. Johann Roten of the University of Dayton explains there are two different aspects of freedom. One is freedom *from* things like addictions and personal concerns. The other is freedom *to do* something or choose a course of action. "Mary was free to say No to whatever might have been an obstacle for her [and] at the same time, free to say—positively— Yes to God." Mary actively and freely chose to do God's will: She said Yes to God and No to sin.

Though we are born with Original Sin, we have the same free will Mary did. We too can say Yes to God and No to sin. Through the strength of God's grace, and Christ's gift of salvation, first experienced by Mary, we too can say yes to God, imitators of the Patroness of the United States, Mary, the Immaculate Conception.
