To make this transition it is proposed that a phased plan be implemented for the establishment of an

The Board have now accepted a bid from the NGO / not-forprofit organisation <u>"Partnership</u> for Every Child" based in Kyiv, Ukraine. They will provide a team of three highly qualified & experienced individuals who will each work part-time on IFCO matters. They will provide Financial Management and Administrative and Communications support to the IFCO Board & membership.

Two people will be based in Kyiv, Ukraine & one in Manchester, England. Between them they will offer English, Ukrainian, Russian, German, Spanish & Polish!

There will be elections to the I FCO Board this year.

Those people who were elected to the Board in 2009 will have to stand down but they may be candidates for election again. They are:

The two people marked with a * have indicated that they will not seek election again / retire from the Board. Many thanks Nicole & Chris for your creative contributions & many years of service to I FCO!

Under I FCO's rules the Board may be between 8 & 20 members. The current Board will be proposing at the AGM before the Elections that this is changed to "may be between 8 & 15 members."

If this resolution is passed then there will be up to 11 vacancies, & if it is not passed there will be up to 16 vacancies on the Board. There may not be more than 2 Board members from any one country.

All paid-up members of FCOI/I FCO may stand for election with their candidature being declared in advance so that their profiles may be sent to other members. All members can vote at the meeting or by giving their Proxy Vote to another member who will be there (details in July).



Russia: Are efforts to help thousands of 'abandoned' children being resisted? + watch the 15 minute video documentary

The Russian Government has launched an ambitious programme to move tens of thousands of children out of institutions and into family homes.

However, this recent BBC report & video says "Ambitious plans to reduce the number of orphans in Russia are running into strong institutional resistance, child welfare campaigners have warned." Shalapatova was appointed Deputy Minister of Labour and Social Policy in March. She will coordinate activities related to policies on social assistance and social services, children and people with disabilities. Her portfolio includes the State Agency for Child Protection, Social Assistance Agency, the Agency for Persons with Disabilities and the social inclusion.

* In some countries in sub-Saharan Africa, 90% of children who have lost one or both parents are looked after by relatives. • * In Cambodia 79% of orphaned and

vulnerable children are cared for by older people.

* In many countries, the effects of HIV & AIDS have left older relatives caring for children.

• * In countries such as China, Nepal and Malawi, where large numbers of adults migrate for work, children are being cared for by their grandparents or other relatives.

Most of these arrangements are informal and therefore children and their carers may be missing out on social protection and benefits. Older carers may find it difficult to support children financially.

While many kinship carers do their best, children, especially girls, may be exposed to discrimination and abuse.

The prevalence of kinship care means that this issue is not just of concern for those with a narrow alternative care or child protection remit, but also requires commitments from agencies working in health, social protection, justice and education to ensure that the needs of children in kinship care and their carers are met.

This paper demonstrates how recognising the value of kinship care, and addressing the challenges faced by children and carers, is likely to lead to a range of positive outcomes, including improved education and child protection, and better physical health and psychosocial well-being for older persons.
