Our fall worship theme is "Challenging Christianity" as our faith is one that challenges many of the lifestyles and views held by our society. Our faith is also challenging because it is not as easy as memorizing a creed or learned as if taking a class. It is not a body of knowledge to digest and repeat, but a story to be told and lived. By looking at Jesus' life, what he valued - what he did - how he treated others, we can choose to live lives more aligned with God. By studying the ways in which God has always interacted with God's people we will be better equipped to see the ways God is working in our lives, our community and our world. Hopefully we will also gain the ability to challenge those who use Christianity to justify their own views and actions or as a means to hurt others.

During this time we will explore some of the basic tenets of faith such as *The God We Worship & Serve*, *The Church as the Body of Christ* and *What is Promised, What is Required*. These tenets and some of the information for reflection will come from the Rev. Martin B. Copenhaver's book, *To Begin at the Beginning*. Rev. Copenhaver is a UCC pastor, writer and will become president of Andover Newton Theological Seminary in October. In this book, Rev. Copenhaver encourages us to see the story of God's faithfulness and interactions with us as God's people through the biblical accounts.

It is our hope that as Apostles we too will continue to tell the story as we look at both Old and New Testament scriptures. To help us share the stories of God's work and continue to develop ourselves as the Body of Christ, I propose to have some dialogue within some of the worship services. Specifically at the 9:15 service, I would like to meet in the fellowship hall on the fourth Sunday of the month so that we can reflect together around tables on the monthly theme and how we may more fully live as people of faith. This would be a differently structured service to include the music from the children's Sunday School curriculum and stations to encourage more active participation. If you attend the 9:15 service, I would like some feedback on how this idea sounds to you.



As we seek to be faithful Apostles, we will be willing to challenge our own perceptions to grow closer to God.

Discussion about keeping our website up to date. Each commission was to present their info for the website, but it did not always happen. Erika N, made a motion seconded by Cindy W, "Council authorizes our communication specialist to have the authority to

update website content and social media." The motion passed unanimously.

### HELP for HONDURAN SCHOOL CHILDREN

The media has been full of stories about women and children fleeing the violence in Central American countries, including Honduras. Many of you have been involved in the program Central American Relief Efforts [CARE] either by direct participation or donations of all kinds.

There certainly is violence in parts of Honduras, especially in the northern part of the country. CARE works in the southwestern area, providing a variety of services that help the very poorest of the poor. We believe our work has encouraged many Hondurans to 'not give up'. Our work projects provide permanent benefits to many.

CARE has found an area where almost 200 children are receiving sporadic education as there is no school building and there can't be school when it's in the rainy season.

## Opportunity for Service: Power Packs Project



“GIVE A MAN A FISH AND HE EATS FOR A DAY,  
TEACH A MAN TO FISH AND HE’LL EAT FOR A  
LIFETIME.”

Power Packs Project identifies needy families and provides weekend food and nutritional education so that families are empowered and children thrive. Power Packs started in one school in 2005 in Lancaster with the recognition that many children and their families were having trouble making ends meet through the weekend. Presently, ingredients, recipes, and tips are packed by volunteers for approximately 750 families per week, from 20 schools of five local school districts. This educational component of Power Packs is vital to the goal of “changed behavior” among the participating families.

Church of the Apostles has partnered with the Power Pack Project for the past five years and will continue to do so for the 2014-2015 school year. We are once again paired with Elizabeth Martin Elementary School where last year we packed and distributed food and recipes to 13 families each Thursday afternoon during the school year. ## PARISH HEALTH NEWS



The Parish Life Commission is sponsoring a Flu Shot Clinic this fall at Church of the Apostles. Pharmacists from Rite Aid will be giving the injections and submitting your

information to your insurance company for payment based on your individual policy.

On Wednesday evening, October 8, from 6 PM to 9 PM, and again on Thursday, October 9, from 1 PM until 4 PM, bring your insurance cards and drop by the church parlor to receive your immunization. Rite Aid needs an estimate of how many people will be coming so they can plan how many pharmacists they need to send. Beginning on Sunday, September 14, there will be sign-up sheets in the narthex for you to record your preference of a time slot.

Save one of the dates on your calendar so you can receive this all important shot.

And in other health news, our oxygen tanks have been filled, our AED machine has been checked, and our first aid kits in the kitchen and the narthex closet have been updated. The cabinet in the narthex closet holds our health equipment and there is a wheelchair and an oxygen tank in the west lobby also. Familiarize yourself with their locations so you can act quickly if you need to provide aid to someone.

Recently, the Lancaster newspaper ran a sizeable article on the change in CPR techniques. It is no longer necessary to give mouth to mouth resuscitation. Chest compressions are all that is required, and they should be given in time to the 1977 hit song "Staying Alive" by the Bee Gees.

### SEEDS OF HOPE



The Seeds of Hope garden is being put to bed for the winter. Most of the crops are finished, with the exception of the late planted corn and some fall crops that were planted in August.

All in all, it was a hard year for gardeners. The weather was either too wet or too dry, both of which cause problems for a lot of the vegetables. So the weeds either slipped right out of the ground after a rain, or needed cut off when it was so dry. And the bugs were phenomenal! It remains to be seen if the bug situation is due to climate change or if this was really a fluke year for a lot of pests.

We rejoice in the people who have contacted us about helping in the garden because they heard of our mission to donate the food we've grown to the hungry in the community. Local farmers, farm stores, seed stores, neighbors, and our Campus Partners have all been very generous with their time and help because

of our mission. It has been a pleasure and an honor to be part of something that makes people smile and want to help when they hear about it. And it is with joy that we thank all our members for supporting the effort by being generous with your purchases of vegetables on Sunday mornings.

Just like farmers, we are not idle over the fall and winter. Plans for next year's garden are in full swing. We want to create some raised beds for some of the crops that would benefit from them and the fall seems like the best time to work on that. We don't want to be caught short next spring if the weather would allow planting early, for a change. A new garden layout is in the works too that will maximize our available space.

We will be making a substantial investment this fall in the future of our garden. Perennial crops of asparagus and four kinds of berries have been planted this year. Fruit trees are in the plans for the future too. And truckloads and truckloads of compost are needed to amend the soil for next year's crops. We hope you will consider investing in the future of the Seeds of Hope garden too. Think about making the church's efforts to feed the hungry part of your personal budget for mission work by donating money to the garden in the next few weeks. Not everyone can get down on all fours and help grow the vegetables, but everyone can support feeding the hungry people in our community.

### The Birds of Rader Park

Do you know all the species of birds that fly through Rader Park during the year? Which ones are year-round residents? Which ones just stop by on their migratory journey? Have you seen or heard any birds as you walk through Rader Park and can't identify those birds?



We are hoping to find the answers to those questions. The president of the Lancaster County Bird Club is willing to visit Rader Park several times this coming year to help us learn about our avian friends. Mrs. Barbara Hunsberger, and several members of the Lancaster County Bird Club, will be coming to the park early one morning in September to do a survey of the birds. They will be back for the Annual Christmas Bird Count during the period of December 16-January 5th. The final survey will be done in spring of 2015.

Mrs. Hunsberger will provide the results of her surveys to us at Church of the Apostles. After learning what



birds we can expect to find in the park, birding activities for adults, families, and children will be planned.

In the meantime, grab your binoculars and bird books and head out to the park to see which birds you can identify. Birding is one of the most popular leisure activities enjoyed by people world-wide.
