

# Foundation and Friends Offer Innovative Literacy Programs

From free books for babies to 'auction bucks' for teens, the KCLS Foundation sponsors innovative literacy programs in partnership with Friends of the Library organizations. The KCLS Foundation will support these community programs in 2007:

- Bellevue Reads—In conjunction with Bellevue Community College, Bellevue libraries focus on a single book: *The Things They Carried*, Tim O'Brien's 1990 novel/memoir about the Vietnam War. Bellevue Friends of the Library (\$3,520).
- Read Me a Story teaches Early Literacy skills and offers opportunities for reading to and with children. Woodinville Friends of the Library and Duvall Civic Club/ Friends of the Library (\$1,000).
- Read 3, Get 1 Free "Book Bucks" Auction continues the popular teen reading program piloted in Federal Way in 2006. Friends of the Federal Way Libraries (\$450).

- English for Spanish Speakers— Free series of classes at the Library Connection @ Crossroads includes reading activities for parents and children and tips on using the library. Bellevue Friends of the Library (\$4,800).
- Books for Babies—Public health nurses distribute gift books and reading tips to low-income parents in South King County. Coordinated by the White Center Library Guild with support from 13 Friends groups (\$7,050).
- Book Shelf Connection— Volunteers encourage family reading and visits to the library, and offer free books at the Issaquah Food and Clothing Bank. Friends of the Issaquah Library (\$2,000).
- Early Literacy Bridges/Little Literacy Bridges—Story Times, musical activities, and creative movement programs help children learn skills through rhymes, stories, and songs. Newport Way Library Association (\$750).

## Record Attendance at Ready to Read Events

Storytellers, book characters, and authors took center stage at King County Libraries during the recent system-wide celebration of **Ready to Read Day**, November 4.

Libraries greeted more than 30,000 children, families, and readers of all ages—a 28% percent increase in visitors over the previous Saturday. Imagine 3,500 visitors in the 3,700 square foot Library Connection @ Crossroads, and you know it was a busy day.

With the focus on Early Literacy, storytellers and performers raised awareness of the importance of reading to and with very young children, and literacy agencies provided resources for parents and caregivers. Eager readers checked out a record 56,545 items, 18% more than the previous Saturday.

Library visitors also enjoyed refreshments, courtesy of Schwartz Brothers Bakery and Starbucks Coffee Company. "Offering our patrons cookies, scones, muffins,



coffee, and water significantly added to the celebration. Patrons, both big and small, enjoyed these special treats. Finding words to express our gratitude is hard, but the smiles on the faces of the community members who came to the library that rainy Saturday lit up our building," said Sandra Ogren, Children's Librarian, Burien Library.

The KCLS Foundation supports the Ready to Read campaign, which reaches out to parents, caregivers, educators, and agencies to promote the importance of developing Early Literacy skills in children from birth to age six. ### Neighborhood Literacy Parties Get Kids on the Road to Reading

KCLS is reaching out to Spanishspeaking families in south King County and offering Early Literacy training in their neighborhoods through festive and informal Literacy Parties.

"Regardless of where we come from, as parents we all want our children to have better opportunities, better education, and better lives. Literacy Parties—Fiestas de Alfabetización Temprana—are an excellent vehicle to get kids on the road to reading.

All cultures share a strong focus on family, community, and celebration," said KCLS Literacy Project
Coordinator Karina Kawaguchi, who is originally from Argentina. "By using a format that brings families together to learn and socialize with their neighbors, the Literacy Parties build on our cultural values."

Funded by a grant from the Discuren Foundation, Kawaguchi is recruiting and training parents who will teach the essential Early Literacy skills to other parents in the community. Based on a successful program in Maryland, the eight-week series

features social activities and focuses on how to teach children six and under the pre-reading skills they need to master before they can learn to read.

These skills include demonstrating excitement about books, creating awareness of the connection between words on the page and the story, using native language to expand children's vocabulary, building children's storytelling skills, identifying letters of the alphabet, and using rhymes and games to illustrate sounds of letters and words.

"The response from the Spanishspeaking community has been really positive and we plan to launch the first workshops this spring," said Kawaguchi. For more information, contact Karina Kawaguchi at kakawaguchi@kcls.org or 425.369.3443.
