YOU REPORT: Have the ud stories by answering the 5 W's and 1 H about its te

themselves. Those estions will tell their basic story. Have volunteers share with the group.

ACTIVITY: Reporters write in a style called the inverted pyramid, where they put the most important information in the top of the article. That means if you read the headline and first two paragraphs, you should know the answers to the 5 W's and 1 H. Put it to the test. Have the students answer the 5 W's and 1 H of the story of Tom Davis on the student page.

POINT TO MAKE: The word "gospel" means "good news." So, the gospel (at its most basic level) is news, just like you tell someone else and just like you'd read in the paper.

DISCUSS: Ask your group if they had to tell the basic news story of the Bible, how would they tell it? In other words, what is the story of the gospel? (Leader: Listen for the basic outline-God created us; we sinned and were separated from God; God redeemed us through the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus; one day Jesus will come back for us).

POINT TO MAKE: The gospel is more than a story from two thousand years ago. The story of the gospel affects our story today. It answers the 5 W's and 1 H we all wonder about: WHAT is the purpose of life? WHO am I? WHEN will my life get simpler? WHERE can I find an-

swers to the big questions of life? WHY are there so many problems in the world? HOW can I know God?

We are all looking for answers to those questions. Good news! The gospel answers the big questions that a newspaper can't.

SESSION 1 News Story THE 5 W'S AND 1 H: Who? What? When? Where? Why? How? YOU REPORT: What do you look like? When were you born? How do you plan on making a difference? **Jefferson County Man Finds Artifacts** Last weekend. Tom Davis planned on getting a start on a new fencerow at his farm just off Highway 92. He never planned on finding a box of artifacts and becoming a local celebrity. "It's the craziest thing. One posthole, I hit something that sounded hollow. When I got it out of the ground there was a box containing jars, trinkets, and some tools. Dr. Hall from the college came, and I've never seen a guy so excited about a box of old junk," said Davis . . . Every news story answers the 5 W's and 1 H. So does the story of the gospel. On the most basic level, the gospel is news. It is the story of God and It is the most important news story you will ever hear. "The gospel is the one story that makes sense of ever story of every person who ever lived." - Paul Tripp SESSION 1

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SPECIAL REPORT (40 minutes)

The gospel story is often divided into four parts. The bulk of this section will look at these four parts more closely.

POINT 1: The story of the gospel starts with God. He created. He spoke. He created everything you see (and even you) for His glory and His joy. Romans 1:20 says that creation reveals God's power and divine nature. Every person, every mountain, every ocean, and every beautiful sunset was created to glorify God.

POINT 2: While God c perfect and for His glory, Adam and Eve sinned. We refer ate ever

to that act as th is Feation rebelled against Him, and His perfect world no longer existed. Now sin, death, pain, fear, shame, guilt, and all sorts of evil entered God's creation.

DISCUSS: Go through the 5 W's and 1 H of Adam and Eve's sin from Genesis 3. Have them write the answers in their guides. Also, have a student read the "Because of the Fall" list.

ILLUSTRATION: The story of *Frankenstein* was written in 1818 by Mary Shelley. The story is about a man, Victor Frankenstein, who creates a living being. (Today most people think of the monster as Frankenstein, but it's the name of the scientist.) He made his monster bigger than regular men because he could not re-create all the small parts. Frankenstein abandons his monster, and it becomes angry. The monster turns against his creator and tries to track him down and kill him and everyone close to him. The story ends in sadness as both Frankenstein and his monster die.

DISCUSS: Why would a creature turn against its creator? How are the monster's actions like those of humans'? What do you think God thinks as He looks towards a world that has turned on Him and largely rejects Him?

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POINT 3: Redemption and redeem are terms we rarely use today. Sometimes you'll hear someone say they will "redeem" a coupon or gift certificate. The word means to buy back or to exchange. In the Bible, it means that Christ came to earth to bring God's creation back to Him for His glory. The price was the highest price imaginable: the death of the Son of God. The life, death, and resurrection of Jesus bought back creation.

READ: Read through the verses and quotes and discuss each.

ILLUSTRATION: The Death Railroad was built in Burma in the 1940s. Why is it named that? Because over 100,000 people died building it, many of which were Priso War. DISCUSS: In your opin n, parts he ost mazing part of Jesus' substitutionary death?

POINT TO MAKE: God redeemed us through the most incredible event imaginable. Jesus, God's Son, came to earth to die in our place. He was our substitute, which is what is meant by substitutionary atonement. God poured out His righteous anger for sin onto Jesus instead of us. The Father turned His back on Jesus, when it should have been you and me. And Jesus died a horrible death instead of us. He was our substitute. But the story ends with Jesus coming back to life, proving the redemption was complete.

POINT 4: The happiness and peace in the Garden of Eden is gone because of the Fall, but it began to be recovered with the life and death and resurrection of Jesus, and will be fully restored when Jesus returns. Restoration is about the future and getting God's creation back to the place where it is glorifying Him once again.

DISCUSS: Read Greear's quote. How is restoration a bigger goal than just rescuing people?

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THAT'S A WRAP (10 minutes)

QUICK RECAP: Point out the chart on the student page. Review what is meant by the terms creation, fall, redemption and restoration. Make sure the students understand the story of a perfect creation which glorified God and the close relationship humans had with God, and that how humans chose to rebel against God's glory, and how through the substitution of His own Son Jesus, God has redeemed and is restoring creation. The gospel is that story of what all God has done.

QUESTIONS FOR THOUGHT: Give the students a few minutes to silently answer the questions in their guides. Then ask for individuals to share. Go through the questions one at a time asking for students to share answers as they are comfortable. You share too!

CLOSING: Sum up that the gospel is a story of perfect creation, humans rebelling against God, and all that God did to buy back and bring back His creation. Say a closing prayer, praising God for the glory He has shown through His creation and thanking Him for His mercy and grace in saving sinners and restoring his creation.
