We have come to the end of another very successful and productive term and nothing is slowing down.

This newsletter documents some of the highlights that enhance the many rich and varied learning opportunities provided at Seaview High School. I would like to acknowledge the staff who work assiduously to ensure our students, your children, are supported to achieve their full potential at our school. This vacation, a number of Year 12s, who have been successful in their application for a Seaview funded scholarship, will be taking part in intensive Revision and Exam preparation sessions at the Adelaide University. Others will be working with their teachers, who are volunteering their time to offer tutorials at school during this break. Both of these opportunities will be available again at the end of next term.

This is something that should not be taken for granted, but like our 4-day/week after hours Home Work Club, evidence of the dedication and commitment staff have towards our students is obvious. I would like to thank those in our community who acknowledge this by nominating Kristen Threadgold, Andrew Cavallaro and Alastair Thomas in the 2015 SA Excellence in Public Education Awards this year.

Semester 1 ended on Wednesday June 17, which released staff to take part in Professional Development aligned to our site improvement plan. Having two consecutive days enabled us to focus deeply, think creatively and work collegiately on Assessment and Moderation in the Australian Curriculum, as well as our Teaching for Effective Learning (TfEL) pilot work; designing activities that increase intellectual stretch and engagement. Semester 2 began on the 22 June, but you will be receiving the previous semester's report with this newsletter. Year 11 and 12 Reports will also include, where relevant, the midyear exam grade. This provides an important indication of progress towards the end of year result. Students who are not progressing as well as they could, or should, will receive an invitation to discuss their results with the Year Level Manager.

Student achievement is best supported when families and schools work in close partnership.

Earlier this term Year 9 students across the country sat for the National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN). Students completed tests in Language Conventions, Writing, Reading and Numeracy, which included solving problems both with, and without calculators. We anticipate that these results will be available at the end of Term 3.

Once again this has been a very busy term with much of the activity outlined in this newsletter. H&PE and Sport (refer to page 9) and the Performing Arts have had a particularly busy one with a Music Night, Dance Night and Year 12 Drama Production involving more than half of our school in recent weeks.

Support for these quality performances continues to grow with sell-out shows and audiences being turned away. We have started to explore alternative spaces to accommodate the demand for future shows.

Rehearsals are well underway for the Musical Production of 'Disco Inferno' next term. I encourage you to book your tickets to this early, as I am confident it too will be another sellout performance.

Our after school *Come and Try Dance* classes have been running two nights a week and proved highly successful. Each class; Classical Ballet, Jazz, Contemporary and Hip-Hop has been well subscribed and we are excited to be able to continue offering this opportunity to our community next term.

We are really excited to announce that we will be working in partnership with **Gravity Studios** to deliver a Certificate II Dance program in 2016.

The course will be available to students in Years 9-12 across Adelaide, and count towards Stage 1 (Year 11) SACE. It is also a preparatory qualification that allows learners to prepare for work in the live performance industry. Certificate III in Dance (equivalent to (Year 12) Stage 2) will offered after successful completion of Certificate II.

Students will study a range of dance styles including, Contemporary, Jazz, Lyrical, Classical Ballet, Musical Theatre Tap, Hip-Hop and Breakdance and Aerobics. Students in the Special Interest Dance program will be able to undertake general/ SACE Dance subjects in conjunction with the Certificate Dance.

Our Royal Academy of Dance (RADA) qualified teachers; with the support of industry professionals, will deliver the program. Auditions for entry into the course will be advertised early next term.

Our **Advanced Technology** building development is progressing steadily and plans have been drawn up in response to a series of consultations that occurred last term with students, staff and Governing Council. Ideas were provided to Architect Andrew Kirkbride and technology consultant Brian Jacobi.

The plans include upgrades to the following areas to create:

1. STEM LEARNING HUB

This invention and innovation space will serve a variety of purposes and accommodate large groups of students as well as small group breakout spaces.

A range of projection equipment and writing walls will enhance communication. Students will be able to use a variety of kits and equipment and work in groups or individually to develop ideas, designs and prototypes.

Features: To act as a resource for classes from areas such as Design &Technology, Science and Mathematics and enable access to specialist resources such as a CAD software, video cameras, laser cutter (fume extraction) and 3D printers, 3D

2. SCIENCE LABORATORIES AND ADJACENT COURTYARD

The design will increase access to the external courtyard space by providing a direct connection to the adjacent laboratory and develop environmental applications in the area.

Features: A polyhouse, with a hydroponic system for plant propagation, as well as providing a basis for sensing and measurement of pH, moisture and nutrient levels, humidity and temperature, solar water heating demonstration unit, Measurement and monitoring of water temperatures, mapping temperatures, Solar power generation panels to monitoring power generation, effects of sunlight changes cloud cover, effects of the angle of panels to sun direction, surface temperature of panels and power output.

A wind-powered generator installed on the roof of an adjacent building with wireless connections to monitor wind speed and power output. These will supplement the existing weather station.

Future development, the provision of aquaculture may also be considered into the future using the courtyard and the wet lab space.

3. DESIGN AND TECHNOLOGY

In conjunction with the existing CAD and Electro Technology area, the space will see students designing and developing prototypes and working on solutions to challenges that may include:

- Electronic devices encased with 3D printed covers, enclosures or using printed components,
- Applications of devices that respond to moisture, light, sound, temperature e.g. burglar alarms, automated fan, moisture sensor that opens a valve when the soil is dry,
- CO₂ racers or model F1 cars that can be made on the milling machine and wind tunnel tested,
- Working models of alternative energy devices such as wind powered pumps, solar power for vehicles, solar water heaters, pumps,
- Floating devices such as a floating crane, dredge, floating dock, submarine, yacht using a fan as a wind source,

- Mechanical devices with components designed in CAD and machined in the CNC router, could include models of machines using gears, pulleys and cams,
- Making closed and monitored environments for the propagation of plants,
- Battery powered artefacts that might include simple robots, machines or vehicles,
- Applications controlled by Raspberry Pi computer modules that are programmed by students,
- Model gliders and flying machines including glider and propeller driven devices that could lead into using drones,
- Designing, making and testing structures including sustainable and modular housing using CNC routed parts, energy efficient house
- Modelling hydraulic and pneumatic control systems.

At the end of this term we farewell a number of staff; Joe Davoli; Che Porter—our Business Manager of 13 years, is leaving us to take up a permanent position at Aberfoyle Park High School; Wendy Harrison— Finance officer, is taking up a temporary position at Hallett Cove School; Jess Tutton who, as many of you are aware is taking maternity leave and we wish her all the very best with the imminent arrival of her baby and all of the others in their chosen pathways.

We welcome Sadie Gomer as Executive Assistant; Su Jen Cheong (ESL and Maths); Kaitlyn Holroyd (ESL); Fumie Akaike (Japanese) to our team. The remainder of our staff are ongoing.

I would like to wish everyone a relaxing and safe holiday and look forward keeping you all informed about the exciting developments at Seaview High School.

SA Aquatics High School Memberships



Signing up for a High School Membership at the S.A Aquatic and Leisure Centre, gives members the opportunity to utilise SAALC's state of the art facilities including Health Club (Gym), pools, waterslides, Steam and Sauna rooms (must be 16+ years). The membership will also entitle the user to book in for a health induction (compulsory for under 16year olds) where they can meet with a qualified personal trainer who can sit down with them and go through what they are wanting to achieve and how to do it. They will then be taken through exercises and the machines providing information and guidance to ensure they are using correct technique. At the end of the session they will get a personalised exercise program to follow. The membership will also entitle the user access to our supervised group fitness classes as well as a specially designed session for high school members on a Wednesday afternoon. 




Seaview High Music Community Arts Events



Learning power can be explained as a mix of dispositions, lived experiences, social relations, values, attitudes and beliefs that shape a person's engagement with any learning opportunity.

On Friday the 15th May, Emily Cester, Will Tuck and Jessica Carroll represented Seaview High School at the first ever 'TfEL PILOT Student Think Tank' event. 42 students from Year 3 to Year 9, from 10 TfEL PILOT Host Schools and from across 10 DECD Local Partnerships were at this unique event, representing students from all across South Australia.


The event was hosted by the DECD TFEL PILOT Team and also by Siohban Leahy, an ex-Principal from the United Kingdom, who has specialist skills and experience in being an innovator in student voice for learning.

Students collaborated and shared their ideas on how students can take responsibility for learning through ideas such as; students giving feedback to teachers, students as lesson observers, student learning communities and student led parent/ teacher meetings. Emily, Will and Jessica were fantastic ambassadors for not only the school, but the Marion Coast Partnership, and feedback at the conclusion of the day from participants indicated that they were great role models for the younger students at the event and were all nominated to be in the TFEL PILOT Student Ambassadors group.

The students will now bring their ideas generated from the day back to Seaview High to share with other students and teachers and to further explore implementation later in the year. The students were also lucky enough to meet Professor Dylan William, an international expert on Formative Assessment, at the Student Think Tank event.
