



## **GRANT PROPOSAL**

My current internship at International Rescue Committee (IRC) has given me the opportunity to apply my skills as a social designer to aid the refugee community within Baltimore. My current projects at IRC include, creating and implementing an exit orientation program to aid refugees towards self-sufficiency. Another component of my internship includes designing and developing a standardized orientation guide for all caseworkers to use easily and functionally with their refugee clients.

A large part of my thesis for MASD includes the research and development of the two projects at IRC. This opportunity gives me the chance to exercise the tools I have been provided by the social design program to holistically think about the process in which refugees are aided in this country, and to find an area for design intervention to take place.

I have been passionate about the issue of relief for refugees before coming to MASD, and I believe this is an amazing opportunity for me to prove that designers are more than just decorators. As a social designer, I hope to contribute to the notion that designers are innovators, thinkers, and change makers. The tasks ahead are challenging and time extensive, however, my hope is that it will push me to be a better thinker and problem solver in the world of social design.

Currently, the Graduate Research Development Grant is my primary funding opportunity for these projects. I plan to heavily use the majority of the proposed amount of \$350 for aiding my research and development for the community of refugees in Baltimore, which may include: transportation, conference attendance and materials and supplies for project development. Continued is a detailed budget of potential needs.

### JUSTICE CONFERENCE

The purpose of attending this conference is to gain incite on how other humanitarian organizations are approaching their issues of conflict. The conference will also provide a plethora of networking opportunities with organizations like World Relief who works similarly like IRC. #### RESEARCH

This component of my project is arguably the most important, and I plan to use all resources that are available to me to help support the development process. I plan to conduct interviews within the staff at IRC as well as refugees that live outside of Baltimore perimeters. Transportation to and from meetings will be constant, and brainstorming sessions to ideate with coworkers and refugees will be held. Supplies in support of these sessions and transportation funds are crucial.

## **DEVELOPMENT**

Printing mock-ups and examples will be an important component of this process and funds will be needed to expedite results.
