CONTACT LIST

In modern email clients, both browser-based and stand-alone, you'll find the digital answer to analog address books: contact lists. The most basic contact lists simply contain the name of the contact and their email address, but more robust contact lists (such as those found in Outlook and Gmail) hold significantly more information like your contact's physical mailing address, phone numbers, and other relevant information including notes.

BLACK LIST

In computing a black list is a list of items that a security algorithm or filter will always block. If you set up a filter in your email client to explicitly block the address of someone spamming you, for example, you've created a simple black list. Other black lists are automated, such as a black list that bans IP addresses at the server level after too many intrusion attempts are discovered from that IP address. Black lists are also used to filter content; when companies block entertainment or adult-content websites they're using a black list to restrict employee internet access.

WHITE LIST

In computing a white list is a list of items that a security algorithm or filter will always allow to pass through. In the case of email, whitelisting an email address (adding it to your contact list) ensures that the email is delivered to your inbox. When configuring a firewall, the list of applications that are allowed to always pass through the firewall is the white list.

EMAIL HEADERS

Every email has an email header. The header of the email contains information recipients are used to seeing with each email (the date it was sent, who it is from, and the subject) as well as a large amount of additional information that email clients hide from

the user by default. The hidden information (typically accessible by looking for a "view full header" or equivalent button or link in your email client) includes the routing information for the email such as the address of each mail server it passed through and the times at which the email was passed forward.

CARBON COPY (CC)

In email composition, the "CC:" section, short for Carbon Copy, is a method of sending an email to additional addressees without inserting them into the primary "To:" section. While this might seem counter intuitive as it's just as easy to put an email address in the "To:" section as the "CC:", the practice is a holdover from the days of paper letters and memos where a document within an organization would be intended for a specific recipient but additional carbon copies could be sent to people who needed to stay abreast of the material. That same functionality remains in email: the primary recipient(s) go in the "To:" section and anyone else who needs to be aware of the communication but is not the primary recipient goes in the "CC:" section.

BLIND CARBON COPY (BCC)

In email composition, the "BCC:" section, short for Blind Carbon Copy, is a method of sending an email to additional addressees without alerting the primary addressees that the email has been shared beyond those listed on the email. The practice is a holdover from the days of paper letters and memos where a document within an organization would be intended for a specific recipient but could also have additional recipients (including those whose identity, for whatever purpose, needed to remain hidden from the other recipients). ***Ed. Note:** Please use this instead of putting all recipients in the "To" or "CC" to keep all the addresses private. We'll all thank you!

EMAIL ATTACHMENT

An email attachment is a file sent along with the email message. Early email systems required manual attachment encoding in wherein the user would have to use a program to convert the file into a block of text which could be pasted into the body of the email.

Modern email systems use the MIME standard which makes the process of attaching, sending, receiving, and accessing an attached file faster and removes the burden of manually encoding and decoding attachments.

Click on www.blueapron.com/ and find a service that will prepare a menu, print a recipe, shop for ingredients and send all of the above to you by UPS. All for only \$9.99 per person per meal, 3 meal minimum. The homepage explains what the site requires and provides a sign-up box. All you need to do once the box arrives is turn on the oven and follow the directions provided by the included recipe.

For those with fewer culinary challenges, *Real Simple Magazine* also provides a dietary service: five nights of dinners delivered to your in-box. The email provides 5 curated recipes [chosen recipes] by Real Simple editors, a shopping list of ingredients, and encouragement by the magazine's professional chefs. This subscription costs \$6 for six months or \$10 for a year. The magazine promises that the email will arrive in your in-box every Friday. For more information visit realsimple.com/getmealplanner.

Presidential Escapades

President Warren Harding doesn't rate as a leader according to historians. But the Library of Congress has recently made public love letters Harding wrote to his mistress, Carrie Fulton Phillips, more than 100 years ago. President Harding wrote the letters between 1910 and 1920, although the affair started in 1905.

In spite of many requests by Harding to destroy the letters, Carrie Phillips kept them and her lawyer made the letter collection available to a potential Harding biographer. After a lawsuit to prevent publication, finally Harding's daughter donated the letters to the Library of Congress in 1972. Cancer News

Speaking of physical activity, the Environmental Working Group or www.ewg.org, released a report on skin cancer. Approximately 2 million people are diagnosed each year with this disease. Doctors recommend that all individuals venturing outside apply sunscreen for protection. But according to EWG, not all sunscreens are equal.

The organization rated more than 1400 different products and discovered the following.

1. No spray sunscreens. They are convenient but may pose risks if inhaled. And you can miss spots.
2. Super-high SPFs are not good since spf only refers to protection from UVB rays and does not protect against UVA rays.

.. that Windows key plus + will zoom your screen out and Windows key plus - will zoom it back in? That's the +/- on your numerical pad of keyboard – you may need to also hold the function key if you have no numerical pad on your laptop [and make sure the num lock is not on]. The one bad thing is that a magnifier will stay on screen unless you close out the mini program. Holding the Ctrl key while scrolling the wheel on your mouse will do the same thing.

.. that Windows key + L will lock your computer? To use the computer again, press Ctrl+Alt+Del, enter your password and then press Enter.

.. that right-clicking in Windows Explorer you can get extra options? What even more options? Use Shift-right-click.

.. that in Windows Explorer Alt+p switches file previewing on and off? Switch it off to gain more speed, so you'll know you have the right file.

.. that Sticky Notes in Windows 7 can be a great time saver? You can post a note on the desktop by tapping the Start button, typing Sticky Notes, and then choose Sticky Notes in the list. To create additional notes, click the New Note button or press Ctrl+N. To delete a note, click the Delete Note button or press Ctrl+D. You can change the color of the note and format the text. Change color by right-clicking the note and then click a color. To change text, select the text you want to alter and then choose the formatting you want, such as Ctrl+B for Bold. Ctrl+Shift+> will increase text size while Ctrl+Shift+< will decrease it. To make a bulleted list, press Ctrl+Shift+L, press it again to switch to a numbered list.

.. that if you don't use libraries in Windows 7 you can hide them and save space in the left side of Explorer navigation pane? Right-click an unwanted library and select *Don't Show in Navigation Pane* to hide it. To bring it back, click Libraries, right-click whatever you need; choose *Show in Navigation Pane*.

.. that you can do an easy search in an Explorer window? Use the F3 key to get search box, enter what you want and press Enter to run the search. ◆
