

alfway isn't yet there, and half-hearted is no way to live. So, why do we settle for half? Why not go "all in"?

When Anne Lamott was expecting her son, Sam, she realized how much she feared that she wouldn't be able to provide adequately for his

needs. She remembered that, during her own childhood, her parents were so cheap that they didn't keep Band-Aids in the house. When Anne would fall and scrape her knee and go to the medicine cabinet, there wouldn't be anything there to bind up the wound. She knew it was strange, but, somehow, her parents' failure to keep Band-Aids in the house made her feel shaky and scared, even as an adult. Pregnant and worried about how she would provide for her own child, she said to her therapist:

I realized . . . that I wanted Sam to grow up with the sense that it is safe to fall, that there's enough of the important stuff in the world, including Band-Aids. I still secretly worry that there isn't enough love, or money, or acclaim, and I have to do all I can to make sure I get my fair share. I'm not even sure there's enough God to go around. I worry that people, even friends, are sucking up my portion of fame, or God, or money." (Lamott, *Operating Instructions*, p. 44.)

Some people live with gnawing anxiety that there isn't

enough of whatever they need. Their anxiety keeps them from claiming the kind of life God intends for them to have. Their worry sidelines them. They are overly cautious, reluctant, and hesitant. They're half-hearted and damped-down, not because they want to be, but because they are afraid to engage life fully.

When we're nervous about whether or not there will be "enough" (enough of whatever we think we lack—time, energy, money or love), we don't live fully, freely, and joyfully. We hold back, fearing that we might be left empty. We end up missing opportunities to learn, grow, and make a difference.

Over and over again, God calls us beyond our anxiety. In the Scriptures, when God calls people to adventurous faith, the first words God speaks are: "Do not be afraid." We can overcome our fear, because God promises to give us what we need to live the lives God is calling us to live. We can make risky commitments to things that truly matter, trusting that God will honor those risks.

Remember that Jesus gave everything he had and everything he was for us. On Calvary, on a bleak and lonely Friday, he poured out his life. He died for our salvation. And, on Sunday, God vindicated him. God raised him from the dead. The life, death and resurrection of Jesus form the pattern of a God-shaped and God-trusting life: Good Friday gives way to Easter Sunday; giving leads to receiving; losing becomes finding, and risking opens us to rejoicing.

Trusting Jesus, we are set free from fear. In him, with him, and through him, we give it all. We don't hold anything back. We leave everything on the field. We go "all in." There's nothing to lose but fear. There's everything—abundant life—to gain.

Spiritual Practices for Late Fall: What's Most Important Is Often Too Easily Forgotten

October - Go All In: Avoiding Sloppy Discipleship

At this past summer's gathering of the Cooperative Baptist Fellowship (CBF), Baptist scholar Walter Shurden suggested that our Baptist emphasis on freedom has led some to a casual commitment to faith that downplays our responsibility and is detrimental to the spiritual growth of people, churches, and the CBF movement. "Sloppy discipleship," Shurden said, "worships when it is convenient, reads its Bible if it has time, tips God rather than tithes to the kingdom, or far better, fails to engage in a kind of Christlike generosity that nudges us toward sacrifice."



There are tried and true means that have helped people throughout the centuries become the kind of persons who can fully and joyfully enter into an abundant life with God. They are basics: (1) Worshipping God faithfully every week, (2) Studying Scripture in Community, and (3) Sharing our Lives Together. However, it is easy, I will admit, to forget these basics of faith and replace what is most important with what is attractive. We easily get caught up in a casual life of faith, overwhelmed by self-imposed busyness, and too tired to be faithful. St. Benedict wisely wrote, "Always we begin again." And so, we recommit ourselves this season to practicing our faith with all our hearts, souls, mind, and strength.

The spiritual practice for this month is simple (but will be a challenge):

Take some time to write down how often you intentionally (1) worship God in community each week, (2) read and reflect on scripture, (3) pray in solitude, and (4) share your spiritual life with other people.

Next, recommit to God and to this community of faith that you will be faithful in attending Bible study and worship each week. As you commit to and prepare for each Sunday, seek to experience God anew, to pay attention to how others are God's gifts to you, and to become a blessing to others through your presence and your spirit. Bring your spirit of wonder, love, mystery, laughter, and desire to become all that God has called you to be. Go "All In" in your discipleship!

November – Giving Thanks


Thanksgiving, for me, brings to mind family, football, turkey, macaroni and cheese, and afternoon naps. And though we give thanks to God for God's blessings, we rarely spend much time being intentional in our thanksgiving. In an article titled "Thank You," published November 21, 1982, in *Parade* magazine, Alex Haley, the author of the novel *Roots*, reflects on the meaning of his past Thanksgivings.

It must have taken me a half-hour to sense that maybe some key to an answer could result from reversing the word Thanksgiving...to "Giving Thanks." After a while, like a dawn's brightening, a further answer did come—that there were people to thank, people who had done so much for me that I could never possibly repay them. The embarrassing truth was I'd always just accepted what they'd done, taken all of it for granted. Not one time had I ever bothered to express to any of them so much as a simple, sincere, "Thank you."



So Haley sat down with paper and pen and lots of good memories. He wrote notes of gratitude to his father, his grandmother and other special people in his life who had blessed him.

As we approach the Thanksgiving season, let us make a list of those people in our lives who have blessed us in both big and small ways, and send them a simple hand-written note to express heartfelt thanks to them. Let us give thanks with grateful hearts.





Chasin' Rabbits

Most local church history is about as dry as last year's bird nest. There are likely many reasons for that, among them a desire not to offend, a wish to include everything, and a perceived need to follow a rigid timeline.

The first reason skirts controversy, but we need to admit that we're human, and occasionally fuss with one other. It's not important to detail an argument over fixing the roof, but it might be essential to examine one over, say, methods of baptism. Simply to say the church

changed (or didn't change) its policy isn't enough.

The second bogs down even a conscientious historian, who has amassed mountains of data and doesn't want to let any of it go. But when tempted to tell the reader that twenty-nine youngsters and six chaperones went to Camp WackaWacka on July 25 (pity the poor adults), he or she needs to ask "Does this move the story along?" and prune whatever doesn't.

The third flirts with method. A historian works with raw materials — bulletins and newsletters, minute books and lists. Pretty dull stuff. How does one include all these dates and names without sounding like, well, a list of dates and names?

What if he or she had sketches of what members considered to be important moments in the church's history? There are still some, for example, who remember the 1927 walk from the old building to the new. Details from them would be good to have on paper, audiotape, or videotape. (A good youth project, by the way, if anyone's listening.)

What of the "unimportant" events in a church's life? Passing the light of the Christ Child on Christmas Eve. The urge during an ordination to take one's shoes off, for this is holy ground. The welcoming hug a widow receives the first time back after her husband's death. The time a baby took her first steps in the children's building. Realizing years later you found your future bride at a youth retreat. Things like that.
