February is American Heart Month. Sadly, heart disease continues to be the leading cause of death for both men and women in the US; one in every three deaths is from heart disease and stroke. This alone accounts for 2,200 deaths per day. In addition, heart disease is very costly. Together heart disease and stroke hospitalizations in 2010 cost the nation more than \$444 billion in health care expenses and lost productivity.

This all-day program will focus on clinically relevant information and state-of-the-art treatment options on cardiovascular diseases including acute coronary syndromes, atrial fibrillation, hypertension management, antithrombotics, dyslipidemias and chronic heart failure management. Research on emerging treatment options designed to improve patient care outcomes will be discussed throughout the day.

Objectives:

Upon completion of this knowledge-based program, participants should be able to:

- 1. Describe the pathophysiology and acute treatment algorithms for acute coronary syndromes (ACS).
- Identify the key priorities for long-term care following an ACS event.
- 3. Identify patients with atrial fibrillation who warrant anticoagulation for stroke prevention.
- 4. Among AF patients, describe candidates for rate control or for rhythm control.
- 5. Discuss the indications, general methodology, complications and follow-up strategies for atrial fibrillation ablation patients.
- 6. Identify potential changes in recommended treatment goals and therapy recommendations associated with management of hypertension based on recent trial data.
- 7. Recommend appropriate medications and monitoring parameters for patients who require antihypertensive therapy.
- 8. Identify potential places in therapy for new anticoagulant and antithrombotic therapies.
- 9. Compare and contrast new agents for use in the prevention and treatment of thrombosis related to pharmacokinetic, pharmacodynamic, and clinical data parameters.
- 10. Review data associated with conversion onto and off of new thrombolytic agents to provide safe and effective patient care.
- 11. Identify controversies in treatment of non-HDL cholesterol and HDL cholesterol based on clinical trial evidence.
- 12. Discuss new evidence impacting heart failure care.
- 13. Develop safe and appropriate drug regimens that include evidence-based therapies in patients with heart failure.
- 14. Discuss the monitoring and management of complex drug regimens in heart failure therapies.
- 15. Describe implementation of device therapy in appropriate patients.
- 16. Discuss therapeutic options for treatment of diastolic heart failure.
