On November 10th, 2006 Marnie McDermott, Coordinator of Clinical Services Community Living Huronia (Pineview), John Clarke, Coordinator of Behaviour Management Services (Simcoe), and Angelo Boutsis, Behaviour Consultant, Behaviour Management Services York-Simcoe, presented at the 2006 ONTABA Annual Conference. Their presentation of, "Dual Diagnosis: Stabilization, Assessment and Treatment in the Community", gave an overview of the Central East Region Dual Diagnosis Treatment Home, Pineview.

Located on the grounds of the Mental Health Centre, Penetanguishene, Pineview is a Central East Region resource that accommodates the needs of five individuals with 24-hour staff support. Individuals with a dual diagnosis (developmental disability and mental health diagnosis), who present serious acting out behaviours, are referred to Pineview to received treatment that assists them with the necessary steps to transition back to their community. The admission to Pineview is for stabilization, assessment, and treatment programs.

The November 10th, the ONTABA presentation focused on the key components of Pineview; The Treatment; The Mobile Resource Team; and Building Community Capacity. Statistics were also presented revealing that four of the five individuals who have received treatment from Pineview had all of their identified acting out behaviours go to a zero baseline. Two case examples were also presented detailing the use of the Bio-Psycho-Social Model of Assessment, Treatment and Replacement Skills Training for their transition into the community. The audience of over 200 people enjoyed this innovative community support model to treatment.

Congratulations goes out to the Pineview team for their commitment and expertise, for their contributions and being a part of such a valuable program. Special thanks to Louise Spicer, Pineview Administrative Assistant, for her knowledge, technical support and contributions to a very successful presentation.

OUR TRIP TO SEE THE MEMORIAL WINDOWS


