One elderly woman had lost both her sons to road traffic collisions. She described her first hand story in great detail and her bravery for doing so was commendable. Drink and Drug Driving was also highlighted in a film where a driver got out of his car on a main road and was hit by an oncoming car. This was a shock for everybody and a big wake-up call to us as a generation who will be driving in the near future.
