A Mid-Winters Night Ride

It is dusk and a smoky blue sky meets the horizon. A breath of wind is coming from the west that sends the snowflakes spinning in all directions. As we move, the snow stirs beneath us like fairy dust, but it will not give up the land so early in the season. Victor, my 4-year-old Fjord, and I are riding bareback tonight- something I have longed to experience. As I ride Victor, I wrap my legs around his belly like a ribbon on a Christmas package and I sink into his soft thick coat, feeling the warmth of his body. I feel good and look forward to our wintry ride. My husband Tim stands from a distance trying to get a snapshot of Victor and me before we head out for our evening ride.

Snow is falling heavily as we start up the road. Clip-clop sounds echo from Victor's hooves as they hit the pavement. With my head held high and body balanced, I see the horizon at the rise of the hill. On the left side of the road stands a thick forest and on the right a rough ridge. The combination of the two creates a creepy passage even during the day. In my mind's eye I picture a scene in the Wizard of Oz where Dorothy and Toto encounter the flying monkeys. The steady sound of Victor's hooves hitting the pavement chases the monkeys away. At the crest of the hill the night's sky opens up before me and I take in a deep breath. We stand and silently take it all in. We move forward and I take Victor through a snow-capped ditch. He plows through the snow sinking ever deeper and I find myself wondering about the wisdom of this route. His movements are labored; every one of his muscles works as he takes each step. I feel his belly move as air pushes out of his lungs creating a mist of moisture around his large nostrils. I smile as I imagine him to be a furry steam engine. My eyes fill to the brim with tears because of the cold air and they begin to trickle down my cold face as the west wind blows. Soon it's time to pause so Victor can catch his breath. There is a cloud cover yet the snow brightens the night's sky. Suddenly, something catches Victor's attention on the ridge to our north. As he moves his head his thick neck flexes into the shape of a soft smile. I focus on the ridge and can make out a silhouette of a small herd of deer. They look like the lawn ornaments people use in their front yard. It is so very quiet and still- even the wind stops blowing. I close my eyes to imprint this sacred time to memory. The beauty of the moment is a blessing from God and I accept it humbly. I open my eyes only to see the bored look on Victor's face- he is ready to move on, so we continue. He forges ahead with his head held high. He misses nothing as he looks around and enjoys the scenery. Some horses ride with their heads on the straight and narrow but not Victor, he loves to sightsee as we ride. As we continue through the night my Fjord is truly enjoying himself, and that makes me happy. His gait is so light I feel like we are floating. All too soon, it is time to return to the barn. The idea of riding through the Oz type landscape chills me, but I'm reassured by Victor's power and steadiness. The wonder of the night is passing. Each of Victor's brisk long strides brings us closer to the barn. We move through the wooded area without mishap and I feel relieved once it is at our backs. I can see the barn from a distance and the glow from its yard light. The falling snow wraps around the light like a summer swarm of mayflies. This has been a special time and not a word, not a whisper, was spoken. I am all the closer to Victor because of this shared experience and I wonder if he feels the same.



You also find out how smart your horse is, does it stay on the path, knowing it's EASIER to stay on a path, if there is ice, is he/she silly and tries to go faster, or does it

stop and try and figure out what to do or better yet, listen to you? You really can learn a lot about your horse if you ride them outside. There are so many positives, it just plain feels good. What are the negatives. IT can be cold but with good clothing and hand and foot warmers, you can survive! REALLY You know there is no bad weather just bad clothing. :-)

There you go, now you know what I do during the winter, and you're probably just glad Spring is coming. I really am too, love riding in the spring and fall, DARN BUGS ARE OUT IN FULL FORCE IN SUMMER, So that is my least favorite time of the year.

Maybe I didn't encourage you to ride next winter, but hopefully I got you thinking about riding this spring, go out and ENJOY THAT FJORD!!


Winter Meeting Highlights

I was lucky enough to be able to attend this year's Winter Meeting, and I must send my congratulations and thanks to everyone who put the event together. We had an interesting variety of demos and events going on, and the one thing I heard from many of the participants was how much fun it was to actually get out and try the hands on work with the horses.

Phil Odden along with Sue Plein and Susan Cargill, showed us what to look for and work toward to develop a solid family Fjord. We worked on ground work with several horses, testing them and the handlers with learning to communicate between the two.

Saturday brought a Showmanship demo, with plenty of participants, all the way down to a couple of Bob and Therine Gudknecht's grandsons working on keeping the judge in their sight while working around the horses.



While Sandi McKee did a bit fitting and whip use seminar, Kathy Johnson and Tanya Welch of MN LINC showed us how and why Fjords can excel in working not only with the disabled, but also assist in programs for troubled youth. We even had the chance to observe a cart designed especially for the use of those in wheelchairs, enabling users to be able to drive the horses.

Saturday afternoon provided a chance to try log skidding and pulling the stone boats, followed by a chance to actually try cart driving. This was well attended, and I must say Kathy Johnson's demo on what not to do in a driving class was the hit of the afternoon....a must for everyone's rule book....she included chewing

gum (AND blowing bubbles), running over the judge, tapping the judge with her whip, standing up in the cart, waving her hat, and just generally running the judge ragged. Her antics were well tempered by the ever elegant Bob Gudknecht leaning back with his legs crossed on the front of his cart, the picture of relaxation.

The final demos on Sunday morning included Andrew Hinrichs showing us the fun side of Fjords, with tips for gaming including running barrels and the key-hole race. In the other arena, Robin and Pat Holland took several of the scruffier, winter coated Fjords and proceeded to make at least their manes beautiful again. This was being filmed with the aim of providing a new mane trimming video available to Fjord owners.



One item of interest was a presentation by Robin Holland on a project she is doing, trying to track white markings on Fjords. Similar to what has been done with some Quarter Horse lines, she is trying to establish a possible link between Fjords who have white markings or feet and their lineage. I know she got at least two examples right at the meeting, since Oz has one white foot, so she got more information for her survey. If you can add to her data base with a white marked Fjord, there is a survey on page 6 which can be filled out and mailed back to her. Please participate if you can help out.


