## Why an online / correspondence playgroup course

Busy people with limited time go to playgroup. This training course is flexible enough for playgroups to choose who, what, when and where to learn.

It has been developed so you can discuss playgroup issues together and come up with solutions for providing best practice, quality experiences for all children and adults. It builds on a playgroup framework that can be adapted for large or small, city or country, structured or informal playgroups.

### 4. Discussion starters

### Discussion starter 1. What if...

Molly, one of the playgroup mothers, collapses and hits her head on the corner of the table. She is unconscious and bleeding from the head. Her four-year-old daughter is frightened by the fall and screaming uncontrollably. Panic sets in among children and parents. There is no phone available and no one knows the whereabouts of a public phone box. There is no record of her doctor, home address or next of kin to contact.

What should be done?

What should be in place to be prepared for an accident?

#### Discussion starter 2. What if...

Billy is a shy 2½-year-old and hates coming to playgroup because he is often bullied by Tom, an older aggressive child. Toys he is playing with are taken and he is pushed, hit and kicked often. Tom's mother either ignores his behaviour and blames Billy or says "boys will be boys". Billy's mother really enjoys the friendships at playgroup and so does Billy when Tom isn't there. Billy's mother doesn't want to leave the playgroup. How can this situation be resolved?



### Discussion starter 3. What if...

There has been a party in the playgroup room the night before and it has been left littered with cigarette butts, bottles, broken balloon pieces, wine glasses with leftovers, a broken glass on the floor and several bowls of leftover chips and nuts. Garbage bins are overflowing, chairs are stacked 8–10 chairs high.

The party organisers intended cleaning up that day but forgot about the playgroup.

How could you handle this situation?

#### Discussion starter 4. What if...

Several children are playing dress-ups. Each child dresses up complete with hat, clothes and bag. Megan doesn't have a handbag like the others, sees one on the table and takes it. She is delighted with the contents – a mobile phone to play with, a little bottle of lollies (tablets), a small purse with several shiny coins, cigarettes and a cigarette lighter, a used tissue and some makeup. For quite some time Megan plays with the items in the bag. A horrified parent discovers Megan. Both the owner of the bag and Megan's mother have a heated exchange over the incident. Both blame the other.

What safety practices should have been in place to prevent this?



### 5. Playgroup assignment
