Pastor's Page

God also said to Moses, "Say to the Israelites, 'The Lord, the God of your ancestors...has sent me to you'" Exodus 3:15

God is not only incomprehensible and wonderful, the Lord is also personal. God names Himself, and God gives us names for Himself. The God who created heaven and earth is a person, and we are persons. That's what makes it possible for us to have a personal relationship with God.

In fact, a personal relationship with God is inescapable. That relationship is established in creation between God and us. I can deny the existence of God, but all that does is put me in an estranged relationship with God. It is a relationship now of hostility and denial, but it is still a relationship.

So the question is not whether there is a personal relationship, but rather what is the "quality" of that relationship. Is it healthy or an unhealthy one? Is it a redeemed or an estranged one? Is it a relationship of love or hate?

Notice something else about this personal relationship. When God revealed Himself to Moses, He said, "I am the God of your ancestors, the God of Abraham and Sarah, and the God of Isaac and Rebekah." God was personally known by the saints of Scripture, and the Lord spoke to them. In the New Testament the disciples and apostles were called by God into a personal relationship with Jesus. The God of the Old Testament is the same as the God of the New Testament.

Anyone can know about God, but it takes a personal relationship with the Lord to take life to a deeper level. Read the Bible daily and journey with those who found that living is more than just the here and now, more than just personal peace and affluence. God connects us to the great expanse of His redeeming love for people down through the ages, those who surround us now, and scores that will follow. With the Lord we are connected with God's eternal love as the kingdom of His children, guarded and guided into a personal relationship with the One who is the same, 'yesterday, today, and forever'. Praise God, I'm connected.

SESSION NOTES

The regular meeting of Session was held February 5, 2013 with all members present except Bob Hearson, Joy Eubanks and Bill Mulligan, who were excused. In addition Sue Mechura and Gary Strock were present as representatives from the Deacons and the Trustees respectively. Pastor Jon Speck acted as our moderator.

The meeting began with the reading of Psalm 107 and discussion by Pastor Jon Speck. Pastor Jon pointed to the message of the Psalmist that the steadfast love of God is with us and within us at all times, even when we feel our lives our in our own desert. Jon then shared his own witness, a time when he felt to be in the desert, and through it all God had a new beginning and purpose for his life. God truly does "lead us beside still waters." Amen!

I write this having just come back from NYC where my wife and daughter have been for the past 18 months. My daughter, who many of you know was severely injured 6 years ago. She gave her final "graduation" speech, along with her fellow trainees in rehab at NYU, all to a loving audience of staff, family, friends and prior participants in the program. For Margaret and my family this is another example of where life moves from a desolate desert that transforms us to feeling awash with God's steadfast love and purpose.

The standing committee reports included many topics of discussion including a welcome and celebration of our new Praise and Youth Choir Leader, Steffan Bomberger, a praise for our continued vibrant Youth Program and upcoming overnight with 24 youth participants to date, an announcement of the upcoming Agape Dinner and Worship Service on Ash Wednesday, a plan to revitalize our mission in Honduras and the "Wright Family" as our mission representative with a plan to hold a "Honduras Event" at the church, the announcement that Souper Bowl Sunday at the church yielded 83 food items and \$338.00, and the request by the Worship Committee for the appointment of a Trustees representative to the Worship Committee.

The Session, following discussion from each committee, approved the following Motions:

Administration & Personnel – request and approval to a) update the Praise Team Leader & Director of Youth Choirs policy as to vacation time in order to comport with other music staff; b) to provide Rev John Barlow with a thankful honorarium for visitation services provided our congregation; c) to give Susan Wood a stipend to head up the church leadership retreat to be held February 8 and 9, 2013.

Nominating Committee – request and approval to commence developing a slate of candidates to head up the Pastor Nominating Committee to be comprised of Session Member, Deacon, Trustee and members at large from the

congregation; and, to solicit suggestions from the congregation for members of the search committee to select our next pastor.

Worship Committee – request and approval: a) for St. Andrews to hold a time of intentional prayer from 2/14 to 2/28/13 at the church, Monday-Friday from 7-8 PM; b) to conduct Communion Service at the Leader's Retreat on Friday February 8, 2013; and, c) to conduct new leaders training, ordination and installation of Robert Hearson (Elder); Ed Phillips (Deacon); and Jennie (Youth Deacon), reinstallation of Elders, Bill Mulligan, Stuart Juppenlatz, Paul Kilgore and Perry Latshaw, Deacons Connie Dowhower, Jane Juppenlatz, Dolores Shott, Bonnie Tenney and Marianne Kopp, and installation of new trustees, Ken Tice and Ken Peterson, re-installation of Trustees Doug Lister, Robert Lowrie and Jody DeWald, and finally, to re-install David Sensenig as President of Trustees.

In other business, Glenn Royer was reappointed as Clerk of Sessions and Marc Hamme was reappointed as St. Andrews Treasurer, each for a one (1) year term. Perry Latshaw and Tom Shott were appointed as commissioners to the next meeting of Presbytery to be held February 26, 2013.

There being no further business the meeting was closed in prayer.

In Review: 1. The Nov. 29, 2012 "The Voice of Christmas" program had over 500 people in attendance. With ticket sales, sponsorships, and free-will offering, the net proceeds for this first-time event was over \$6,000. - 5. LCCM would like to thank the Francis J. Dixon Foundation for its \$10,000 gift to help the fight against hunger.



This chart represents contributions from the community, which includes families, individuals, businesses, service clubs, and churches, just to name a few. Thirty -five percent of LCCM's annual income, comes from these sources. Through the first six months of this current fiscal year, LCCM has received \$122,275 in "general contributions." Although this number does represent 50% of our goal with six months remaining in the fiscal year, we did not see the "end of year giving boost" we typically have in No. and Dec. In fact, the "general contributions" received in Nov. and Dec. 2012 were down 27% from last year's total.

What a truckload of responsibility and potential for pain we take on when we love another human being: all the dangers of misunderstanding, of betrayal, of indifference, and ultimately, of loss.

To more than balance those dangers, we feel the possibility of life made rich through sharing experiences with another – of physical and spiritual warmth and communion, of enriched understanding and common achievement, of a stay against loneliness and isolation.

Most of us have no trouble opting for love.

But then, to have invested so much of our life's energy in the life of a loved one – and then to find that loved one gone! Is it any wonder we are, for a time, laid low? This is where the St. Andrews Grief Support Group can be of help. The people who come to these meetings all have loved and all have lost, some more than once, and have experienced these feelings of extreme sadness and loneliness. Yes, we have been "laid low" by our intense grieving for a period of time. We help each other work through these feelings by sharing our stories and experiences, by offering ideas and suggestions, and expressions of hope to those who are feeling especially low. We learn through sharing that these feelings are "normal" – whatever "normal" is! – and that we are not alone with what we are experiencing. We often say that during this time we will find a "new normal".

No matter how recent or how long ago the loss occurred, if you or someone you know could benefit from meeting with our group, please do not hesitate to join us. We are always very welcoming to new members.

Our meetings are usually held on the 2nd Thursday of the month, at 2:00 PM, in Cassel Chapel, unless we plan something special. The meeting for March will be on March 14, and in April, on April 11. Please feel free to come join us – to share, to learn, to listen, to cry, to laugh – we will be happy to have you there! In January we welcomed our new Advisor, Diane Pomeroy, to our group. Diane and her husband moved to Cornwall Manor last summer and have been attending St. Andrews regularly ever since. They are both retired ministers. We had a good meeting with her then and are looking forward to sharing this special ministry with her in the future.

The love we have shared helps form the strength to deal with loss. The hope and joy we have known helps us believe in the possibility of hope and joy again. And the intensity of grief (which *will* moderate, though we may find that hard to believe) mirrors the intensity of shared love, which will continue to beam through our life, to illuminate and nourish all that we do and are.

Love never ends. Never.
