<u>Napa Valley College is in compliance</u> Measure N report accepted

The Napa Valley College Board of Trustees accepted the annual report of the Measure N Independent Citizens' Oversight Committee at its June meeting. The public report was presented by Greg Evans, vice-chair of the committee. "The District was found to be in full compliance with all provisions related to Measure N," he said.

The report, which fulfills reporting requirements, covers the period April 2008 through March 2009. The committee found that the college had spent bond funds as required on school construction and that no money was spent on teacher or administrative salaries. Both a performance audit and a financial audit completed by an outside firm also showed that the college was in compliance with bond provisions.

The committee, Evans said, commended the district on its efforts and expressed appreciation to college staff.

"Napa Valley College is doing an excellent job," Evans said, adding that staff provided excellent reports and support that allowed the committee to function effectively. The committee meets four times a year, well beyond the minimum of one meeting per year as stated in the bylaws.

Napa Valley College has a system in place called AlertU for real-time important security information. It was used throughout the incident April 20, 2009. Spread the word, not the flu!

Napa Valley College staff members have been meeting since last year to prepare for a possible H1N1 flu pandemic. The first fall meeting of the Emergency Response Committee was just held, and a draft H1N1 Pandemic Flu Plan has been completed to add to the college's Emergency Operations Plan thanks to leadership from NVC Police Chief Ken Arnold. Arnold and Charlene Reilly of Student Health get regular updates from the Napa County Health Department.

The Emergency Response Committee includes Arnold; Matt Christensen, director of Facilities; Faye Smyle, dean of Instruction; Betty Malmgren, director of Community Relations; Dr. Linda Napholz, Faculty Senate (who also works with the Red Cross on disaster services and mental health services); Jan Schardt of the Classified Senate; and Carollee Cattolica, Administrative Senate.

A public awareness campaign will continue on the importance of staying home when you are sick, avoiding close contact with those who are sick, hand washing, covering coughs and sneezes, avoiding touching eyes, nose and mouth, and practicing other good health habits.

College orchestra has new director

Harry Cadelago, who has been conducting the North Bay Wind Ensemble, is expanding his teaching duties with Napa Valley College this fall to include directing the orchestra. Cadelago will also be conducting the musical *Man of La Mancha* this year for NVC.

Napa Valley College's Criminal Justice Training Center will start a new Adult Corrections class Sept. 14. The Adult Corrections Graduation Class No. 5 ceremony was held Friday, April 3, in the Cafeteria.

Register now for Corrections Academy

A new session of the Adult Corrections Officer Academy at Napa Valley College will start Sept. 14. Registration is now open. It is a sixweek, 240-hour training program certified by the Standards in Training for Corrections (STC). This course is required to be hired as a full-time Adult Local Corrections Officer, working within the local jail facilities throughout the state. This course is presented in a moderate discipline, moderate stress environment and includes Laws of Arrest – non firearms, Codes, Statutes and other Legal Documents, Booking/ Receiving/Releasing, Supervision of Inmates, Managing Inmate Workers, Emergency Procedures and Physical Training/Lifetime Fitness. The class meets 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday at the Napa Valley College Criminal Justice Training Center.

All fees must be paid prior to course start date. The entire amount is nonrefundable after the first day of class. Some financial aid is available for this course (contact the Financial Aid office at 707-253-3020 for information).

Students must register in person at the Criminal Justice Training Center. 

Grant for research into wine tourism. A reception in his honor was held at Trinchero Napa Valley in St. Helena in July.

> To mark the celebration of its first decade, the Great Wine Capitals Global Network (GWC) is investing in high-level research into wine tourism relevant to all wine-producing regions. GWC has allocated €10 000 for two studies, one based in California, the other in Portugal. The first two recipients of grants of €4 500 each are Ian MacNeil, who has been engaged in the U.S. wine industry for more than 20 years, and Carla Silva, a specialist in marketing and communications who lives in Portugal. MacNeil, the Hospitality and Tourism Management Program director at Napa Valley College, will research the impact of wine tourism on California's Napa Valley. With viticulture and hospitality the two top drivers of employment in the region, MacNeil will look at critical issues faced

by the Napa Valley such as

traffic congestion, declining

water supplies and the

impact on local residents. Grant recipients will present their research to the GWC annual general meeting in Bordeaux, France, in early November.

plays, All the Great Books (abridged) purports to reduce all of Western Literature into a single evening's entertainment performed by Keith Baker as The Student Teacher, Dodds Delzell* as The Coach and Chad Yarish as The Drama Teacher.

No classic from *Beowulf* to War and Peace remains safe from Martin and Tichenor's slings and arrows of outrageous parody. The New York *Times* calls the company's work "intellectual vaudeville."

Reed Martin, Reduced Shakespeare Company performer/writer/managing partner, Napa Valley College Theater Arts instructor and co-creator of All the Great *Books (abridged)*, says the show covers "Great Lit's Greatest Hits": "We go over

every book you should have read in high school, but probably didn't," he says. The trio of actors will take the audience through 83 great books. The Iliad and *The Odyssey* are combined as a joint sketch called "The Oddity." Little Women is explained in terms of football plays on a blackboard.
