

EDITORIAL

Spirituality

N THURSDAY 29th November George Harrison of The Beatles' fame, died. He was a very spiritual person. The press recorded the following about him, 'He died as he lived, conscious of God, fearless of death, at peace'. 'Everything else can wait, but the search for God cannot wait'. 'The purpose of life is "Why am I here? Where am I going?" 'His former manager said 'George found it' (the meaning of life) 'in his Hare Krishna's beliefs'. George Harrison was very spiritual.


Many people are inclined to think that if a person is spiritual then they are 'good' and on their way to heaven. But there are evil spiritualities. In fact the Christian warfare is not against people but "against principalities and powers against spiritual hosts of wickedness" [Eph 6:12]. It is because of the reality of evil spiritual forces, that Paul goes on to instruct us how to defend and attack these forces with spiritual weapons.

Because a person believes in God, that does not necessary make him a Christian. Neither does the fact that he prays. Few people actually disbelieve in God. Few people never pray. The question is what kind of God do they believe in? What kind of God do they pray to? Many people today have 'their own view' of what God is like. They make God in their image. The Psalmist met people who thought God had the same values, ideals and views as themselves "You thought that I was altogether like yourself" [Psa 50: 21].

Nor in fact, is a person necessary a Christian because he holds to principles that accord with the Bible. Biblical principles are exceedingly wise, logical and workable. Family, business and social relationships benefit from the wise counsel in the Scriptures. It is no wonder that people still hold to much of the Bible's teaching because they have stood the test of time and have been tried by a wide range of cultures over a long period of time and proved successful.

It is indeed encouraging that many are now turning away from the materialism and sexual pleasures which are not satisfying the basic needs of mankind. It is good that people are turning to spiritual things, but it must be true spirituality. False spirituality abounds. Satan knows it is just a matter of time before humankind will turn from the unsatisfying pleasures of secular ideology. So what is true spirituality? What is Christian spirituality?

A Christian is a person who believes what Christ believed. A

Christian believes what Christ taught. "For whoever is ashamed of Me and My Words in this adulterous and sinful generation, of him the Son of Man will also be ashamed"

[Mark 8:38]. The Christian's spirituality is defined by the person of Jesus Christ and the words of Jesus Christ. He accepts the life and teaching of Jesus. He subjects his whole understanding of reality by what Scripture says.

A Christian believes in the reality of **sin** as defined by God in Scripture. It is an evil that deserves punishment from God and must be forgiven if eternal life is to be enjoyed after death. It is not what we think of sin, nor what the government think sin is,

The Wonderful Grace of Forgiveness

AST AUGUST the newspapers carried an article about two children playing near a railway line. They were being cared for by a child-minder. A train came by and killed the two children. It was a horrific accident. The mother, however, just could not forgive the child-minder and went on record as saying she would never forgive the child-minder. She was bitter and full of anger. We know nothing of the religion of the mother.

In the August issue of 'Evangelicals Now', an account is given of the sudden murder of a missionary in China who had six children. The Christian attitude of his wife to the horrific death of her husband is in stark contrast to the attitude of the mother of the railway children.

On 3rd February last, Bruce Morrison, a short-tern teacher of English at the Hubei Institute of Technology in Wuchang, China, was about to start teaching, when a madman burst into the room. He stabbed Bruce, who was rushed to hospital where he died. On her way to the hospital, Bruce's wife Valori, told her six children what had happened, and they resolved to forgive whoever had done this. On arrival at the hospital, they were told that Bruce had died.

Valori immediately turned to her six daughters, and quietly said, 'Your father has gone to be with Jesus. He is asleep in Jesus' arms.' She turned to the medical worker and said 'Please contact the killer and tell him that the family has forgiven him and will be praying for him. Valori then comforted the many students who had come to the hospital and had witnessed the killing. She reminded them of Christ's words that if a corn of wheat falls into the ground and dies, it brings forth fruit.

Bruce was admired by all his students and his Christian witness made a great impression on all who knew him. On his gravestone is an inscription which reads "Your gentleness has made me great" [2 Sam 22:36].

What a beautiful thing forgiveness is. Here is an example of the

but what God says it is. The prophet said "your sins have separated you from your God, and your sins have hidden His face from you" [Isa 59:2]. Solomon said "sin is a reproach to any people" [14:34]. Paul said "the wages of sin is death but the gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord" [Rom 6:23]. Sin is the cause of all the misery in the world.

The Christian believes that sin can only be forgiven through Jesus Christ – there is no other way to be forgiven. "Nor is there salvation in any other, for there is no other name under heaven given among men whereby we must be saved" [Acts 4:12].

True spirituality focuses on Jesus Christ as the saviour of His people.

He came into the world to save them and to deal with their sin. His very name means "He will save His people from their sins" [Mat 1:21]. After healing people He would say to them "Go and sin no more" [John 5:14, John 8:11]. Sin was the big problem that had to be dealt with. True spirituality takes cognisance of the significance of sin. Some religions refer to ignorance as mankind's problem, but the Bible tells us it is sin.

Central to Christianity is the Cross of Jesus. The traumatic events of Calvary are fundamental to the salvation of the Christian. A spirituality without the significance of the Cross is not Christianity. Jesus came, not so much to preach the gospel but to live and die so that there would be a gospel to preach. The Cross brings peace and satisfaction to the guilty sinner. The Cross was the means whereby all our sin was removed.

The Unreported Genocide

The Persecution of Christians in Indonesia

T LEAST 10,000 CHRISTIANS have been murdered by Islamic fundamentalists in the Malukus region of Indonesia because of their faith. One Christian was asked 'Are you a follower of Christ?' As they crucified him they said 'Then you will also follow him to his death!" and left him to die. A further 8,000 Christians have been forced to convert to Islam and undergo circumcision.

Indonesia is made up of various islands and last year the island of Ambon was 'cleansed' of all Christians, their homes and churches being burned and destroyed. Those who could not flee were made to convert to Islam. Water was thrown over them to 'wash away the dogs, pigs and Christian demons' and were forcibly circumcised. Those who resisted were killed. One young woman said 'they can circumcise my body but they can never circumcise my soul'.

This is the unreported genocide that is going on in the far east. All the above is definitely happening although there is little press reporting of it.

Nearly half a million Christians

Prepare Them for the Future

E READ IN Scripture 'Train up a child in the way he should go, and when he is old he will not depart from it" [Pro 22:6]. An alternative rendering for the Hebrew is "Train up a child according to his way and even when he is old he will not depart from it". If this alternative rendering is correct then it teaches that if a child is allowed to go his own way when young, then there is little hope of changing him afterwards!

The reality of this can be seen in the current change of attitudes to child-rearing and to assessing the resultant adult problems.

We used to be able to cope and put up with hardships. We used to be able to overcome difficulties. But now, very often, if trouble arises it often

means stress and depression, or far worse, the breaking of vows, the terminating of relationships, and reneging on commitments.

In the past, when wronged, people did not always resort to litigation and libel. They could take a reverse and endure hardship without looking for someone to blame – and pick up the bill. People used to have the courage of their convictions and be willing to suffer and to stand for what they believed to be right.

Why are more and more people today cracking up under pressures previously considered to go with the job?

We believe one of the factors is the way we now bring up children. We need to bring children up in God's way (not their own way).

We need to give them responsibility and make them accountable. Too many parents fail to warn their children, instruct them, and train them. Too many of the threats made are never carried out. There is little consistency in discipline. Many just allow children to do their own thing. There is no punishment for disobedience. The child only needs to persist and it gets its own way.

Parents must tell their children that life is difficult. Life is full of hardships and inconveniences. Children need to be instructed and trained for the rigours of life. Parents must give their children responsibilities in the home, else they will never be able to carry responsibilities later on in life. Children need preparation for the years ahead.

If children are given everything they want in the home, once they go out into the cold hard world and discover that things are not given to

crack up and end up with psychological difficulties. Hence counsellors' waiting rooms are packed.

Most importantly, children are no longer taught the Bible, the oldest, best proven counsellor in the world. Some years ago, the president of Yale

University said that knowledge of the Bible was more valuable than a university degree. The basic principles of life, the essential keys to prosperity, and the elementary rules for progress are all contained in the Bible.

Much of the difficulties of the young today, arises from the fact that children are no longer being brought up by their parents. The State now wrongly assumes this role and provides nurseries so that parents can carry on with their careers. The Bible puts the onus of childrearing fairly and squarely onto parents. The following notice was found in a Police Station - not in a church:

How to Make Your Child a Delinquent:

Give him everything he wants.

Laugh at his bad habits.

Never give him spiritual training.

Pick up everything he leaves around.

Give him as much pocket money as
he wants – why should he be
denied anything he wants.

Satisfy every wish - otherwise he will
be frustrated which is harmful.

Take his side against all neighbours
and teachers who criticise him.

The Unjust Trial – 'The Tables Turned!'

Read Luke chap. 22 verses 66-71

OME JEWS ATTEMPT to excuse themselves from complicity in the condemnation of the death of Jesus and have suggested that their rulers tried to save him from the Romans. Our present Scripture, along with the other three gospels, tells a different story. It was, Pilate, in fact, who attempted, once and again, to free the prisoner at his Bar; and, to no avail, in the presence of unrelenting pressure to destroy Him from the side of the chief priests.

Innocence in the hands of envy

The "contradiction of sinners against himself" was an enduring feature of the experience of Jesus whilst here on earth. His family had to flee to Egypt to escape the fury of Herod against the young child and, subsequently, they had to turn aside to dwell in Nazareth.

From the hour of the Lord's first official appearance at the feast of the Lord in Jerusalem the rulers had already decided that he must die. It was hostility that increased to become truly intense by the time of the Passover three years later. The treachery of Judas Iscariot gave opportunity to effect their wish. Jesus is, therefore, apprehended, brought before Annas; and, at the break of the day, the whole Jewish Council conve

day, the whole Jewish Council convene under Caiphas.

It is this extreme hostility that

It is this extreme hostility that Jesus was now to suffer. He complains, -"if I also ask you, ye will not answer me, nor let me go". Already they had failed to answer his question with regard to the baptism of John [20:3-8] and now, in the course of trial before a duly constituted Court of Law, the issue was one of basic justice that the prisoner at the Bar be given an answer. In its absence the trial was a formality and a farce with the outcome already decided!

Equally revealing is the complaint – "If I tell you, ye will not believe". Nothing could be more frustrating for the defending party than to realise that whatever he would say would make no difference as the minds of the judges were closed. Such is the prejudice of unbelief and, even more, the blind prejudice that bitter hatred had engendered in the hearts of these rulers. The omens were ominous!

A need for self-accusation

The semblance of a just trial before their Council was clearly demanded. It was also needful in that, as a subject nation seeking the death of the prisoner before them, they present a credible case to the Roman Governor. Pride in respect of their ecclesiastical law again required that to be so. Treason with regard to the former, and blasphemy in respect of the latter, was what needed to be

established. False witnesses had spoken but to no avail.

The case for the prosecution was in crisis! Caiphas, as high priest, thus invokes the desperate procedure of requiring Jesus, under the oath of the most high God, to answer as to whether or not he was the Christ. The rulers had understood that the Prophet of Galilee had aspired to the promise of God to Abraham in

this regard being fulfilled in himself. It was what the common people had spoken in the presence of his mighty works, -- "Is not this the Christ?"

At this juncture the observation of Jesus (already noticed) comes to have

such relevancy. They were saying, "tell us", and the Lord knew that if he would tell them they would not believe him nor let him go. The rulers of Israel would not believe because they had already, and to so full an extent, made up their minds that this was **not** so. No prophet was to arise from Galilee and, in any case, there was the urgent need to rid themselves of a most troublesome person who was usurping their place with the people and exposing the hypocrisy of their behaviour. The High Priest's enquiry was, therefore, no search for information but an undisguised stratagem to obtain a basis of accusation to condemn.

If there were any person that morning in the house of the high priest that knew what was transpiring in the minds of these rulers it was Jesus. The question put had one purpose and, if the hoped for response be given, the sentence to death would follow. What others had failed to do was now in the power of Jesus himself to accomplish at one stroke.

His guilt in terms of the caricature of a trial that morning in Jerusalem would be fully established and he would be delivered to the Romans to be crucified. He must needs, therefore, be his own accuser! Here was that further step, in the self-humiliation of the Lord of glory, which Jesus now takes, alike with determination as with measured dignity.

The accused, is in fact, judge!

The trial does not, however, take end at that point; and, in parallel, neither does the noble confession of Jesus [cf. 1 Tim 6:13]. What the Lord says in answer to the "leading" question, -- "Art thou the Christ?" is a most definitive affirmative but does not stop there. He is the Son of Man who is to sit at the right hand of the power of God.

This was, of course, reference made to the prophecy of [Dan. 7:13,14], and so what Jesus is affirming to these elders of Israel was that He, the prisoner at their bar, is that Person, anointed by God and sent into the world to redeem the Israel of God in all generations. He is proceeding to receive the universal dominion which by right pertains to this "Son of Man", and so to sit on His throne at God's right hand. It remains for Him

to come in the clouds of heaven to judge all the nations. This was the truth of the situation not to be concealed; and come out it did, under the oath of the Almighty, in the presence of these arrogant and murderous rulers of the people!

Yet another vital item of information emerges. It is plain that the Jewish rulers understood Daniel's words as having reference to a Divine Person; so, on hearing the reply of Jesus, they respond with the further question,--"Art thou the Son of God?"From the side of the prosecution this suited very well their case in that they might now accuse Galilee's prophet of "blasphemy". MANUSCRIPT EVIDENCE for JESUS

World-class scholar Bruce Metzger said that compared with other ancient documents, there is an unprecedented number of New Testament manuscripts and that they can be dated extremely close to the original writings. The modern New Testament is 99.5 per cent free of textual discrepancies, with no major Christian doctrines in doubt. The criteria used by the early church to determine which books should be considered author itative have ensured that we possess the best possible records about Jesus.

"We have better historical documentation for Jesus than for the founder of any other ancient religion." said Edwin Yamauchi. Sources from outside the Bible corrobor ate that many people believed Jesus performed healings and was the Messiah, that he was crucified, and that despite his shameful death, his followers, who believed he was still alive, worshipped him as God. One expert documented thirty-nine an-

"Of All the images he could have chosen for himself, Jesus settled on that of the groom whose radiance cheers up the entire wedding party...

"He had nearly inexhaustible patience with individuals but no patience at all with institutions and injustice...

"Surely his style had little in common with that of modern day evangelists, with their tents and stadia, their advance teams and billboards and directmail campaigns, their electronically enhanced presentations. His little band of followers, possessing no permanent base of operations, wandered from town to town without much discernible strategy...

"Were they living in modern times, with the crack-down on homelessness, Jesus and his disciples would likely be harassed by police and forced to move on".




No not an avid reader but a constant reader. I usually have at least one book or two which I daily dip into. I did not enjoy books as a child, the books I read were usually for school and I would

(CPC).... how has this work changed or
challenged you? Do you get

people you meet?

The work of the CPC has certainly been challenging, especially in my own faith and love for Christ. It has made me aware of my own weaknesses and my total dependence on God. It is so easy to say we have biblical principles but it is quite another thing to put them into practice. Going into schools and speaking to teenagers has also made me realise how biblical morality is no longer considered relevant by many of our teachers and young people. Yes I have had many opportunities to share the gospel with girls and that is a wonderful privilege.

Can you tell us about a book you have read recently that has challenged you spiritually?

Yes two - The Prayer of Jabez by Bruce Wilkinson reading this book convinced me more than ever of the power of prayer and it made me pick up for a second time Jessie MacFarlane's book A Housewife's Adventure with God.

Remember that you are allowed to take the Bible and the Pilgrims Progress with you onto the island - three other books and your luxury. What will these be?

The Mystery of The Holy Spirit' by R. C. Sproul, 'What's So Amazing About Grace' by Philip Yancey and any one of

Max Lucado's books. The luxury I would take with me would be a radio.

If you were to pick a sentence or quote from any book or piece of poetry to stick on the wall of your mud hut on this fictional desert island what quote would that be?

"BE STILL AND KNOW THAT I AM GOD."

You have two grandchildren - Rohan and Blythe. As a grandmother do you enjoy

sharing books with your grandchildren? What are your favourites?

Yes. I love reading children's bible story books to them - ones with lots of illustrations and pictures. I believe it is very important to get children interested in bible stories from as young an age as possible.

Once you are on the island you are cut off from society but you are allowed to send one book to a non Christian friend back home. What book would you pick and why?

'Right with God' by John Blanchard because we have given it in the past to people and it has been blessed to them.

Out of all the books you will have read in your life, God's Word, the Bible will have had the most profound effect on you. In what ways has God's book the Bible shaped you as a person since you became a Christian?

God's word has transformed my thinking and directed me into areas I never thought I would ever be involved in for example the verses "If you falter in times of trouble, how small is your strength! Rescue those being led away to death; hold back those staggering towards slaughter. If you say 'But we knew nothing about this," does not he


We live in a world that increasingly thinks it can do without God's laws. The Fourth Commandment is about the Lord's Day – our Sunday – a special day given by God.
