"The Gods of the Hills" is a compelling military history from the commanding officer of the capture of Fort Ticonderoga, an imprisoned rebel bound for the gallows, a witness to the starvation

and murder of American prisoners, a philosopher who saw the opportunities for liberty and public good on the one hand, and for servitude on the other. He was the leader of the Green Mountain Boys who, with them, carved out the Republic of Vermont.

Members of the 2008 Faculty

Todd Braisted is a long-time researcher, author, and lecturer in the field of Loyalist Studies. He will present a discussion of the various Loyalist troops that accompanied and were raised on the Burgoyne Campaign on 1777.

Dr. Joseph Fischer teaches at the U.S. Army Command and General Staff College and is the author of A Well-Executed Failure: The Sullivan Campaign Against the Iroquois, July-September 1779. He will examine the progress the Continental Army has made since its origins in 1775 and argues that by 1779 it has reached near equivalence to its British counterparts.

Erik Goldstein is the Curator of Mechanical & Numismatics for the Colonial Williamsburg Foundation and the author of 18th-Century Weapons of the Royal Welsh Fuziliers from Flixton Hall and The Socket Bayonet in the British Army 1687-1783, amongst other titles. His presentation debunks some long-believed myths concerning the only mass-produced cavalry sabers by a known maker, and by substituting fact makes an even more incredible story.

Dr. Holly Mayer is the author of *Belonging to the Army: Camp Followers* and Community during the American Revolution and a number of related articles and is Chair of the Department of History at Duquesne University. Her presentation focuses on the many Continentals who filled the ranks of Hazen's 2nd Canadian Regiment. These men were essentially soldiers without a state, and so these "outsiders" and others belonged to Congress—to the "US"—as they served American independence.

James Nelson is a prolific author of numerous books, including Benedict Arnold's Navy and his latest book George Washington's Secret Navy. Nelson will talk about the early years of the Continental Navy, including the formation of a small fleet by General George Washington in the fall of 1775 without informing the Continental Congress.

Capt. Seanagan Sculley is an instructor at the United States Military Academy and the author of Men of the Meanest Sort: Military Leadership and War in the New England Colonies. His talk presents his argument that a new form of leadership arose among the New England provincials during the colonial wars that later aided them in their initial meetings with the British military in 1775.

William Troppman supervises all living history and interpretive programs at Valley Forge National Historical Park and is researching Benjamin Franklin's involvement in military affairs. His presentation will focus on Franklin's "dabbling" in martial events during the Revolution, even while on his diplomatic mission in Paris.

Mark Turdo is Assistant Curator at Fort Ticonderoga and previously worked as Curator at the Moravian Historical Society. He will discuss the political and cultural attacks on the Moravians by their Revolutionary neighbors.

Glenn F. Williams is Senior Historian of the National Museum of the US Army and author of *Year of the Hangman: George Washington's* Campaign against the Iroquois. His presentation explains the Battle of Yorktown as a classic example of formal 18th-century siege doctrine in operational practice; not just Redoubts 9 and 10, and "The World Turned Upside Down."
