"Perspectives"

from Pastor Diana

Spring has officially come. The colorless, black-and-white world of winter is about to give way to the colorful brilliance of budding trees, crocuses, daffodils, and tulips. Easter is near. Children will be coloring eggs in bright blues and pretty pastels.

Looking forward to the color emerging and breaking out all around us, I was reminded of a question we were asked at the Two-Year Academy for Spiritual Formation that I attended a few years ago. You might ponder the question yourself: "What color is your God?"

My response came as a poem:

"What Color Is Your God?"

The question is: "What color is your God?"

If "Jesus loves the little children—red and yellow, black and white," and "all are precious in his sight," then God cannot be red or yellow or black or white (or brown) but must be all of these

because human beings are created in the image of God.

If God is all of these, then perhaps God is the color of light Because light consists of a spectrum of colors.

But God cannot be merely "white light."

It is only "black light" that reveals the deeper hues and colors that cannot be seen without it.

STEWARDSHIP INSIGHT "The Law of Risky Management"

(Adapted from <u>The 33 Laws of Stewardship: Principles for a Life of True Fulfillment</u> by Dave Sutherland and Kirk Nowery, Chapter 24)

The New Testament Book of Acts 5:1-11 tells the story of the couple Ananias and his wife Sapphira, who owned a piece of property which they sold, supposedly for the purpose of giving a large offering to the apostles. Unfortunately, they had conspired to keep back part of the money for themselves while <u>pretending</u> to give everything to God.

Ananias and Sapphira were trying to cheat God, promising him everything but only giving him part. They were violating a basic principle of stewardship, the Law of Risky Management, which reminds us that trying to deceive God will always trip us up. Ananias had seen what others in the church were doing: selling their possessions, bringing the money to the leaders, giving sacrificially. He and his wife did not have to sell their property. No one even told them to do it. And, even after they did sell it, they did not have to bring the proceeds to the church. The sin of Ananias and Sapphira was that they decided to hold back part of the purchase price, but give the impression they were giving it all.

The story teaches that God wants a Spirit-led surrender—nothing fake, nothing contrived, just simple honesty. When we mismanage what God has entrusted to us, taking selfish risks with God's resources, the consequences can be frightening. It isn't that God is waiting for an opportunity to punish us, but he is watching, judging, and holding us accountable for our stewardship. When we violate his principles, especially when we make ourselves out to be better Christians than we really are, a kind of death occurs—the death that separates us from fellowship with God and with one another.

The end and effect of <u>true</u> Christianity is revealed in great power, great grace, and great fear. Wise stewards always keep before them God's power, grace, and awesomeness.

Chicago Mission Service Project

Last summer the members of Clear Lake UMC and Bethel UMC of Manly participated in a Chicago Mission Service Project serving Union Avenue UMC, Will Feed Community Organization at Christ UMC, and Marci-Newberry Community Center. This year we have created an opportunity for a second project serving the same areas, but in different ways.

We will stay at Union Avenue UMC, sleeping on the floor in the air-conditioned gym, and shower each day at the local YMCA. During the week we will lead a Vacation Bible School at Union Avenue UMC, paint classrooms and help with other physical projects at Marci-Newbury Center, serve meals at the Will Feed soup kitchen, and unload/distribute a semi-trailer of food. After working hard each day we'll spend evenings having fun: we'll go swimming at the beach, attend a White Sox vs Tampa bay baseball game, eat Chicago pizza and go to the Chicago Art Institute, Sears Tower, Buckingham Fountain and Navy Pier.

The Chicago Mission Project is scheduled for July 19-26. High school students and adults are welcome; registration is on a first come-first serve basis. The costs are not fully determined but will probably be \$115 per person. A non-refundable \$25 registration fee is needed to hold your place. Small Group Bible Study with Pastor Rhoda

Enough: Discovering Joy Through Simplicity and Generosity

Today we stand and watch as the American Dream turns into a national economic nightmare. Home prices are dropping, the stock market is in chaos, retail sales are down and retirement funds are shrinking. Personal savings habits are at an all time low. More jobs are being eliminated every day. Our crumbling economy is so different from the society that told us not so long ago, "you deserve it now," regardless of whether we could afford it, or whether we actually needed it. Do we need to redefine our relationship to money? Where do we find true wealth and contentment?

Pastor Rhoda is offering a 5-week DVD study based on Adam Hamilton's book *Enough: Discovering Joy Through Simplicity and Generosity.* This small group study will help us examine our own values and habits around wealth, spending, discipline, giving, and contentment. We'll discuss how to have faith in the midst of financial crisis, and what to do when dreams become nightmares. We'll explore ways to cultivate contentment, and discuss what it might mean to be defined by generosity.

Misunderstanding Our Musical Heritage

Misinformation, or misunderstanding of information, is a real concern even in our age of technology and mass communication. Dean McIntyre, Director of Music Resources at the UM Board of Discipleship in Nashville, sheds light on one such widely circulated misconception regarding the founders of Methodism, John and Charles Wesley, and the many hymns they composed. The Wesleys wrote the texts or words of the hymns, not the tunes. Of particular interest here is the form of poetry they, like many other writers, employed. The poetic form used is known as "bar tune" or "bar form" ---- begun in the Middle Ages and consisting of three or more stanzas and AAB or AABA pattern for each.

This has nothing to do with the origins of the <u>tunes</u> that are used to accompany the hymns. Yet from these simple facts has arisen the myth, often stated as if factual, that the Wesleys, Martin Luther and others, used "bar songs", drinking songs or saloon songs with their texts.

The bar form is still used today. The lyrics of "Over The Rainbow" are just one example. The following hymns are among those in our own hymnal which are composed in bar form: 61, 96, 110, 139, 196, 298, 384, 410. What tunes did the Wesleys and others use to accompany their hymns? Many were written specifically for the words, some were borrowed from classical music, opera and oratorios. Many were ancient Psalm tunes. John Wesley particularly had a keen ear for fine and singable quality in melodies and compiled many collections of tunes suitable for singing Charles' hymns. But even in the camp-meeting settings with their spirited music-dancing-preaching and freedom from sophistication, balladlike melodies and folk tunes accompanied the simple verse of the converts, taught by rote.


