Cantor's Corner

Mar (or Bitter) Cheshvan is the month of the Jewish calendar when there are no holidays or other events to look forward to except Shabbat. It is even said that this month is sadder than Tisha B'Av. At least on Tisha B'Av you can have growth and spiritual connection to look forward to afterward. This is not possible in Mar Cheshvan.

However, does our CBS family need a holiday in Cheshvan to celebrate? What will give us time to pause and provide introspection in October/Cheshvan?

On the 1st Shabbat of the month in October, we read the story of **Noah and the Great Flood!** The flood began on the 17th of Cheshvan, and the waters receded by the following year on the 27th of Cheshvan, allowing Noah and the other inhabitants of the ark to disembark.

The second important event that occurred in Cheshvan seems unrelated at first glance. This was the death of Jacob's wife **Rachel**, as well as the birth of **Benjamin**, which occurred on the 11th of Cheshvan. It was precisely the same day as Methusaleh's death, the very day that flood had originally been slated to begin. As there are no coincidences in the Torah, we must ask: What is the connection between these two events, and what do they reveal about the essence of the month of Cheshvan?

In thinking about what the matriarch Rachel and her son Benjamin stand for, respectively, we can see that Rachel represents the Jewish people in exile, and Benjamin represents the completed state of the Jewish people in the Land of Israel. Rachel spent her entire life outside



of Israel, and passed away just as Jacob and his family entered the holy land.1

Exploring further, we see that the very death of Rachel resulted in the birth of Benjamin. This would correspond to the idea that the exile itself is that which births the redemption. When events in life don't go well, it is possible that there is potential for future light or growth.

This theme can be seen in the flood, as well. Although the world in its previous state came to an end, at the same time, there was a new beginning that was being sown in the person of Noah. The very passing of Methusaleh opened the curtain for Noah to assume leadership of the next generation. The death of the previous order gave rise to a new potential for growth.

Cheshvan is also a time when the rains begin and the potential for future growth is being sown. When all seems bleak, it is the moment of the birth of Benjamin, the seed of the Jewish people's perfected state, which is sown in that very darkness.

Cheshvan begins the extended time span between the last festival, Sukkot, and the next, Passover. In the meantime, the spiritual seeds planted during the Jewish month of Tishrei begin to take root – to be watered and to grow, finally appearing and bearing fruit in Nissan of next year.

Adon Olam, Master of the Universe, there is future growth that awaits us. We have the opportunity to nurture that right at this moment. It is now that we gather the seeds from the holidays of the month of Tishrei, plant them, and carefully water them through the winter months. Soon we will see the fruits of our efforts.



Ways & Means Committee update



Today as I write my article, we just completed the Yom Kippur marathon of prayers, forgiveness and reconnecting with G-d. Cantor Shapiro did an outstanding job, his passion and love for Judaism was evident in the elevated learning and enjoyment he displayed at every service. As Isaac Maya noted over the Holy Days ... urging us to take one lesson from the Cantor's messages and adopt it for the coming year – there are so many choices to select from. — I actually thought of one for myself that came to me during the services — I chose to dispel the racist notion that Jews are cheap.

Perhaps the heat and the lack of air-conditioning had a part in my thought process, but I am tired of people (including ourselves) stereotyping our faith by indicating we are cheap or always seeking a deal. Whether it is getting a Senior discount to which we are not entitled, bargaining to exhaustion, not correcting a checkout clerk that has returned us too much in change, or any other financial transaction, I thought to myself how much that would hurt if it were not in "my favor". I also realized these are not "Jewish" traits, they are human traits. I am far from perfect – however I do hope I can learn from these situations as I continue my process of improvement.

To ensure our thinking is clearer — a new air-conditioner is needed for our shul. This takes money. To begin with, I will focus on providing more financial assistance to the synagogue — through its upcoming projects and programs. Fortunately there are many

such opportunities in the works, like the Texas Hold'Em Poker night (see below), the Legacy Luncheon, etc., -- I encourage everyone to do the same, you have a variety of different programs to select from.

Chairing Ways and Means – we have two fabulous yet very different projects coming during the next 5 months. On Saturday, November 23 we will hold our annual Texas Hold'em Tournament - where even the person who (like me) doesn't understand the card game can come and learn - and perhaps win some prizes and cash! I have distributed tickets to many of our members – if you would like to help us sell tickets, connect with me – they are \$60 per person. Legacy Luncheon update

Over the next several months, the newsletter will feature bios about our Legacy Luncheon's honorees. This month features the bios of CBS's honorees, Bruce and Marci Rouman and Bruce and Jackie Williams.

Bruce and Marci Rouman



Bruce and Marci Rouman, Philadelphia natives, have over 20 years of dedication and service to Congregation Beth Shalom. Currently Bruce is serving as the President of the Congregation and Marci is the Director of Education though each of them provides countless numbers of hours serving on many synagogue committees and helping to plan numerous events. Their energy and concern about the Jewish community in Corona has been an inspiration for everyone they have come in contact with over the many years that they have been a part of CBS.

Bruce and Marci met in Philadelphia on a blind date and were married in 1980 and shortly after moved out to California for a job that Bruce took in Anaheim following the completion of his engineering degree from Drexel University in Philadelphia. Marci received her B.A. from Cal State Fullerton and began working in the accounting field in the northern Orange county area. After living in Orange County for a few years, Bruce and Marci found their way to Corona and a new Jewish life that would be focused around the synagogue. They learned of the synagogue from the Schwartz and Spiegel families who had been longtime residents of Corona and founding families of Congregation Beth Shalom. Bruce and Marci have two children, Adam and Jessica. Adam is a graduate of Cal Poly San Luis Obispo and will be getting married in June 2014. Jessica, a graduate of Chico State, is working towards obtaining a teaching credential to work with children with special needs. Adam and Jessica were both very involved with their respective Corona-Norco high schools as were their parents in addition to all of the work at the synagogue the family did. Adam lives in San Jose and Jessica is living in Corona and teaches at CBS' Religious School.

Bruce held several engineering positions throughout the Southern California area, over the years. His career began at Rockwell Autonetics. He then took on a position at Aerojet in Azuza. After 25 years in the defense space business, Bruce moved on to work for Raytheon in El Segundo where he is now a Program Quality Engineer. Marci currently works for the Corona/Norco Unified School District in addition to all of her duties as Director of the CBS Religious School. There really is no job at the synagogue that the Rouman's have not done. Bruce also helped start the first Macintosh User group in Riverside County in 1984 and the group continues to be active collecting antique Victrola's, phonographs and old records.

Bruce and Marci have involved themselves in every aspect of synagogue life at CBS. They truly serve as an example of dedication and tireless effort on behalf of the Jewish community of Corona.

Bruce and Jackie Williams have a long history of CBS involvement having moved to Corona from Fountain Valley 13 years ago. Bruce and Jackie have served on just about every committee possible at CBS and currently both are on the Board of Directors. Bruce is a Past President of CBS and Jackie is currently Vice President of the Ritual Committee and serves on the Education Committee.

Bruce spent many years in the "information technology business;" first in the US Army Security Agency Special Operations Unit gathering information related to National Security followed by working at Cal Tech's Jet Propulsion Lab in Computer Operations on the Unmanned Spaced Flight Program. Bruce then managed Computer Operations at McDonnell Douglas for 25 years until IBM made Bruce an offer that he couldn't refuse. He managed a number of different information technical teams across the United States for IBM for 12 years

Jackie's career spanned some 44 years of teaching in both public and private schools. In addition, she taught both religious and Hebrew school for 25 years at Congregation B'nai Tzedek in Fountain Valley and was the pianist playing at every service for those 25 years while co-chairing the synagogue's music program for the children.

Bruce and Jackie have been very active in Boy Scouts of America. Bruce was a Scout in his youth and served as a Committee Chairman, Webelos Den Leader, and Assistant Scoutmaster for more than a decade as an adult.Bruce's Boy Scout troops had a large number of Jewish Scouts in the troop and Bruce worked with them to earn their "Ner Tamid" award; the Scouting's Jewish religious award. In doing so, Bruce earned the "Shofar" award which is the adult Jewish Scouting award. Both Bruce and Jackie's sons are Eagle Scouts.

Bruce and Jackie have two sons; Brian and Joel. Brian lives in Las Vegas with daughter- in- law Rachel and three of five grandchildren; Joseph, Aden and Eliana. Joel lives in Corona and is a member of CBS with his wife Cindy and grandchildren, Chelsea, and Amanda.

This year marks Bruce and Jackie's 50th wedding anniversary. Fifty years ago, Bruce and Jackie made two promises to Jackie's parents; one was to take care of each other, the other was to take care of and protect the Jewish faith. Bruce and Jackie are not done yet, but they are headed in the right direction.
