Seven Things to Know About the Capital Campaign

1. Construction on the new facility will begin when we have \$1 million on hand. We currently have \$700,000 saved. We have raised more than \$700,000 and some of the money has been spent on architect fees and other expenses to get us to this point. We will begin looking for a general contractor when we have \$900,000 saved. We are getting close.

- Our goal for this campaign is \$1.5 million over four years. This is an ambitious goal, but attainable if
 everyone participates. One important step within this goal is to have every member of the congregation make some contribution over the next three years no matter how small or how large. Together we can do this.
- 3. The total estimated cost of the project is \$4.5 million. This estimate comes from our architect and will be adjusted when we have a general contractor. We know that every year we wait to begin the cost increases. At present we plan to do the building in two phases. If this campaign surpasses the \$1.5 million goal we can consider taking on the entire project all at once and not in two phases.
- 4. Between now and November 8 everyone in the congregation will be invited to attend a group meeting or have a conversation with someone on the leadership team to learn more about the project. No one will be asked for money at the meetings. Everyone in the congregation will be asked to prayerfully consider a commitment on the weekend of November 7 & 8.
- 5. Pastor Philip Reitz is our campaign consultant. Pastor Reitz lives in Renton, Washington and works as a consultant for Stewardship Key Leader a ministry of the ELCA Mission Investment Fund. He will be with us on September 26 and 27 for training and kick off of the campaign. He will return November 7 and 8 for the conclusion of the campaign. The leadership team has been working with Pastor Reitz since mid-July preparing for the campaign. The cost for the campaign is \$13,000.
- 6. The leadership team: Pam and Tracy Willett General Chairpersons, Jim Iverson Personal Contacts, Communication Justin and Megan Bloom, Spiritual Emphasis Judy Peterson, Follow Up Rich Hageman, Financial Secretary Kerry Ellertson, Hospitality Carol and Gene Blackwell, Youth and Sunday School Keith Weatherford and Lori Wilson.
- 7. 10% of funds raised in this campaign will be given away to bless another ministry. The council is in deliberation about who will receive the gift.

Biblical Pilgrimage to Israel:

Places like Jerusalem, Bethlehem, and the Sea of Galilee have become a part of our faith. The names are familiar, but few of us have visited them. One author has called the land itself the "fifth gospel" because it is so much a part of the life of Jesus and the stories we tell about him. In March 2016, Pastor Steve and Martha will lead a twelve day trip to Israel. We will depart Billings on March 28 (Monday after Easter) and return on April 8, 2016. The cost is \$4298 per person. This price includes airfare, all travel in Israel, 4 and 5 star hotels, all dinners and breakfasts, five lunches (24 meals), baggage handling at all hotels, and tour guides. Route 66 – A Bible Study

Have you ever wanted to read the Bible cover to cover? Now is your chance. Route 66 – A Bible Study meets every Thursday morning Labor Day through Memorial Day 10:00am-11:30am with breaks for the holidays. We cover about one book of the Bible each week. We will read the Old Testament this year and the New Testament beginning in September 2016.

While there is no cost for the Bible Study, participants are invited to donate \$1 each week to support the Community Lecture Series. No prior experience or knowledge of the Bible is necessary. Everyone is invited so please invite friends and neighbors to come with you.

Sunday Morning Adult Education

We are offering an adult discussion group on the book *Speaking Christian* by Marcus Borg during the Education Hour on Sundays. THE REV. DR. RICHARD P. CARLSON

Glatfelter Professor of Biblical Studies, Director of Internship, and Coordinator of Post-Internship Candidacy

The Rev. Dr. Carlson's field of study and teaching is particularly in the New Testament. His goal in the classroom and in his own research involves bringing the message of scripture to people's lives in ways which are both revelatory and relevant. For him the twin questions for New Testament study are: 1) What did this portion of Scripture mean in its original context? 2) What does this portion of Scripture mean in

the context of the church's mission and in our lives today?

Dr. Carlson served rural and staff ministries in Minnesota before coming to Gettysburg in 1990 and has found those experiences have greatly enhanced his goals and focus as a seminary professor. He still enjoys teaching in congregations, conferences, and synods in the area. In addition to teaching responsibilities, he serves as chairperson of the Seminary's Field Education committee and oversees post-internship candidacy items.

Iona Trip

Is a pilgrimage in your future? If your spirit is saying "yes," please consider the possibility of a pilgrimage to Iona, Scotland in June 2016. Iona is a tiny and beautiful Hebridean island off the west coast of Scotland, cradle of Christianity in Scotland, where in 563AD the Irish monk Columba established a monastic settlement that evangelized large parts of Scotland and the north of England, becoming an important center of European Christianity. In the Middle Ages it became the site of a Benedictine abbey, and over the centuries it has attracted many thousands of people on their own pilgrim journeys.

This journey has several stages so keep in mind that to join the pilgrimage means you'll need to be prepared for international travel, train trips through Scotland, two boat trips and another by bus...all just to get to Iona. We'll request that we stay at the Abbey, an older building with shared baths and a largely vegetarian diet. On this trip, many of us will need to sleep in the top bunk in a room with up to 6 people from a variety of countries who may use English as a second language.

It is a bit like Bible camp for adults with the Iona Community, who define themselves as "a radical movement and organization committed to living out the Christian faith in the areas of: hospitality, diversity and inclusive community; worship, faith and spirituality; social justice and human rights; politics and campaigning; gender justice and human sexuality; environmental stewardship; peacemaking and non-violence; and healing and reconciliation.

Music Ministry

Martin Luther, Music, and the Reformation

The two great works of Martin Luther were those by which he gave to the common people a vernacular Bible and vernacular worship, that through the one, God might speak directly to the people; and in the other, the people might speak directly to God.

Have you ever been in love or been around someone in love? You know that goofy smile you can't get off your face? Or how someone with a new love can't quit talking about him/her? That's enthusiasm born out of a relationship. That kind of enthusiasm is what spawned the rapid church growth of the early centuries in the face of persecution and hardship, and it is what causes tremendous growth in churches of today, both here and abroad. It's being "salt of the earth." Salt makes people thirsty, so if we are salt, people will be thirsty for the water we have.

Martin Luther was salty, for sure! As he struggled to become more holy, he became more aware of his human frailty and failings. Luther could barely get through the first Mass he presided over because when it came time to distribute the elements, he felt so unworthy of them that he nearly "lost it" and was barely able to finish the Mass. Luther's life was spent searching for striving to be close to God. It was from this struggle that the Reformation movement was unintentionally begun.

We will celebrate Reformation Sunday at the end of this month, commemorating Luther's posting of the 95 theses on the Wittenburg church door. This was not the action of an intentioned revolutionary, as some today would imagine. The church door was the 16th century kiosk or bulletin board. Luther's posting was simply a call for discussion made by a monk who was concerned that indulgences and other practices of the Roman Catholic Church were actually hindering rather than aiding the common people's relationship with God. Unfortunately, the Pope and other high-ranking Catholic officials did not respond either kindly or in a timely fashion to Luther's requests for change. When they did respond, it was to order Luther to recant certain sections of his writings, and he replied after prayerful consideration that he could not. As a result, Luther was excommunicated from the Catholic Church and had to go into hiding for a period of time, but he continued to study, to write, to translate, and to teach.

Luther made the first translation of the Bible into German, an event still regarded as a landmark in German literature. No longer were the scriptures closed to those without an education in Latin. Luther's theses were printed on Guttenberg's new moveable print presses and distributed, making them the first political manuscripts to be mass produced and distributed. Luther wrote many hymn texts as well as some tunes, knowing the power of music in theological education. "The riches of music are so excellent and so precious that words fail me whenever I attempt to discuss and describe them....In summa, next to the Word of God, the noble art of music is the greatest treasure in the world. It controls our thoughts, minds, hearts, and spirits..."

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One popular misconception is that Luther "adopted" secular tunes and put sacred texts to them. The guys on *Mythbusters* would have to say this one is "busted." Out of his 37 tunes, we know that Luther himself composed fifteen; thirteen were derived from Latin hymns or church music; and four were German religious folk songs. Only one came from a secular folk song. Luther recognized the power of music and that songs are strongly identified with their users and their context. He believed in writing tunes that were very sing-able for the layman to give the congregation a voice in praise and an enlightening experience. [As for the statement that Luther used "bar tunes," this is a misunderstanding of the term "bar." It does not refer to a tavern; rather, it is a form of music. *Bar form* is typically in two halves, with the first half repeated, giving us AAB. In *rounded bar form*, the first half is repeated again at the end, giving us AABA. Bar form was a very common form of German folk songs and of hymns, and still is today. "Come, Thou Fount of Every Blessing" is in rounded bar form (AABA), as is "A Mighty Fortress is Our God" (repeating the second half of A at the end); "Praise the Lord! O Heav'ns Adore Him" is in simple bar form.]

It was important to Martin Luther to remove the "middleman" and enable people to develop a relationship directly with God, as he had. He knew what it was like to be connected to God deeply and directly, and he wanted to share that with as many people as he could. I am excited that we are on the brink of our own "Reformation" here at LCGS with new staff and re-formed programs & ministries, and I look forward to what God has in store for us.


