1.

a building or place where works of art, scientific specimens, or other objects of permanent value are kept and displayed.

Church noun

a building for public Christian worship.

At our most recent Minneapolis Area Synod Assembly our keynote speaker, Brian McLaren, reminded us that there is a distinct difference between the words "museum" and "church." All too often, we treat our church buildings like the former and forget to use them for their intended purpose: the public worship of God in Jesus Christ.

The word "public" is the key to this distinction. Whereas museums are places where things are kept for future generations to look at, admire and study, churches are intended to be places where the public comes to encounter God and then, rather than locking them in, they are sent out to proclaim that experience to the world!

Museums are carefully controlled and monitored to keep undesirable people or elements out. Churches exist to bring the riff-raff IN.

Our building must serve the purpose for which it was intended: the public worship of God. Our ideas about worship have changed over the generations just as our idea of what constitutes "public" and "private" have as well. As a community of serious Christians we carefully discern how God is calling us to serve rather than preserve our faith.

In the coming months, we, as a church, will be exploring some new ideas on how to best use our building to serve our mission. We are looking for ways to maximize our revenue, collaborate with our existing and new partners, and continue building Elim into a powerful presence in our community. This oasis is intended to be a place where the

public worship of God is experienced in both wide



and deep ways: wider than our past experience of going it alone as Lutherans of European descent to a place where we embrace different faith traditions, where we explore different ideas of what it means to be church, and encounter different personal backgrounds including diverse stories and struggles. We intend to grow deeper in our relationship to each other and to our God by coming to know the people who make their way into this building each week both in our congregation and in the four other congregations who use the Elim space.

What we will not be is a community that expends energy on preserving what used to be.

Are you curious about what is coming next for Elim? I know I am and I know God continues to guide us into a new future and a new life as Christian brothers and sisters in the world.

The Connections that Music Makes

I have always been musically wired. As a young adult, I was introduced to the pipe organ by a family friend. Attending a number of organ concerts, I gradually began to appreciate this instrument. This was a consolation to me in my Navy days. Whenever I was in port I looked for these events. In Norfolk and Charleston I found several opportunities in downtown churches and I was the "random visitor." I grew up unchurched but remarkably, attending these organ concerts gave me a double consolation of music and being in a church. Strange the connections we make. Between the music and the welcome I received from the members, I believe these brief experiences planted the seeds of future faith. The pipe organ and its musical depth and majesty is today one of my touchstones of worship.

Recently the Elim Foundation sponsored a unique opportunity for music ministry. When we completed the rebuild of the pulpit side organ as the third of three projects under J29 we wanted to celebrate J29 in some way and an organ concert seemed the ideal vehicle. To get a good recitalist we needed a decent honorarium. Approaching the Elim Foundation they agreed to support this activity under the heading of J29 celebration as well as music ministry, and community outreach. We engaged Dr. Catherine Rodland from St. Olaf College to present the concert. Of the 80 or so folks attending, I noted a dozen or more visitors. I chatted with one couple in particular who were very impressed with our church and what we are doing.

The Foundation reaches into this congregation in many ways in the spirit of extending our ministry into the north side communities. In the case of this recital we celebrated J29. But just as important, we may have touched the heart of someone seeking only to hear music. This is one more example of how the Foundation supports the ministry of this church.

Free Smoke Alarms

The American Red Cross's Home Fire Campaign is working to reduce the number of fire-related deaths nationally by installing **free smoke alarms** in the homes of anyone who needs them.



In the state of Minnesota, 44 people died from fires in their homes last year. Many of you have seen news stories about close calls and excruciating accounts of people who have died in house and apartment fires locally.

Anyone in the 9-county metro area who needs a smoke alarm in their home can request an appointment by calling 612-460-3674. This is a voice mail box managed by volunteers who will return the call to schedule the appointment. A team of trained volunteers will do the actual installation. The smoke alarms will have 10-year lithium batteries.

J29 Organ Update

The J29 committee wants to update everybody on the organ rebuild. There is still a little work to do, which we held up to keep the organ functional for the organ concert. The remaining items include:

- The organ builder found three extra sets of pipes that were never connected. He is installing drawknobs in the console and wiring those three sets of pipes. The organ builder has absorbed all the labor on this work (and a number of other details he simply couldn't ignore) under the original contract.
- There are a couple of dead notes where the electrical problem must be ferreted out.
- There is a persistent cipher (note that won't quit) in one pipe. This requires some fine adjustment in the mechanism.
- The old chest is still on the roof and must be hauled away.

When these tasks are completed, the organ gets a one month shakedown to catch any other issues. After that month, the project is completed.

All of this work is part of the original organ contract. We are not incurring any additional costs.
