<u>Year 10</u> are working hard towards their Controlled Assessments and have an external exam in January. Good luck with your revision over the holidays!

NUMERACY—BOYS' CAMPUS

Numeracy is important in all subject areas and a skill that is necessary in all areas of life. How many of you have had a go at learning chess? Chess is a game that develops clear

thinking, strategic ability and strong willpower, as well as being enjoyable.



If you have played before or not there is a now a chess club called 'Draughty Knights' in the LRC every Thursday from 3.10 – 3.45 pm. We are hoping to get enough players together to enter the UK Schools' Chess Challenge, so please come along and join us.

The object in chess is to checkmate your opponent's King. Checkmate, or just "mate" occurs when a king is attacked and the

king cannot escape capture on the next move.

Chess is played on a board with 64 squares set up in the following way:

The Rooks begin the game in the corners. The Knights (many beginner players call them horses) are next to the Rooks. The Bishops start next to the Knights, then the King and the Queen.

Note that white and black Queens both begin the game on squares of their colour. The white Queen begins on a white square. The black Queen begins on a black square. At the beginning of the game, always start with a white square in the lower right corner of the chessboard.

TO BEGIN THE GAME, white moves first, and then black... taking turns until CHECKMATE, or one player RESIGNS, or both players agree to a draw.

BENJAMIN ZEPHANIAH - VISIT TO GIRLS' CAMPUS

In October Benjamin Zephaniah, famous poet, novelist and film-maker returned to the classroom to face his lifelong fear of Maths. Mr Zephaniah explained to the students that he was involved with the charity Changing Faces, which supports people's fears of dealing with anyone with disfigurements. The Charity is raising awareness of dealing with fears.

Mr Zephaniah explained that he is hugely dyslexic and left school barely being able to read or write but this has not stopped him having ideas and



putting them down. He is hoping to face his fears of Maths in a similar way, so that he can do with numbers what he has done with words. The Maths lesson was fantastic as the class were shown how it is relevant to everyday life and he would have loved to have been in the next lesson to learn more!



LEARNING RESOURCES CENTRE BOYS' CAMPUS

GIRLS' CAMPUS - PE Uniform

BTEC SUCCESS - BOYS' CAMPUS
