If you do this, we recommend you keep your original application for your records. Applicants will be contacted for interviews no later than Tuesday, February 28.

They should provide students opportunities to "get their feet wet" in subjects they would not encounter in a typical high school setting, or otherwise introduce new games, arts, skills, etc. They should be as interactive as possible (not just 100% lecture), and should be exciting and enjoyable for the students.

Please be prepared to present and answer questions about your lesson plan at a group interview, as well as give a **10-minute teaching sample** based on this lesson plan, as if you were really teaching the class. You will have access to a board and projector. The interviewer and your interview-mates will act as your students.

After you apply

The Interview. Seminar teacher applicants are interviewed together in small groups. Depending on how many applications we receive, we may or may not be able to offer interviews to all of the applicants. If you are offered an interview, you can expect:

- *To describe your course proposal (question 2, part D) to the group and teach a 10-minute sample of your course.* For the sample, you can expect to have access to a board and/or projector if needed. The interviewer and your interview-mates will pretend to be your students. You and your interview-mates will then be asked to give constructive feedback on each others' course proposals and sample teaching.
- *To describe your activity proposal (question 3, part B) to the group.* You and your interview-mates will also give constructive feedback on each others' activity proposals.

The interview is informal. While we are serious about professionally running an awesome summer program, we're also a bunch of undergrads. Feel free to show up in jeans and a t-shirt, or whatever you're most comfortable in (if you show up in a Jedi costume or an Oscar Meyer Wiener suit, we might give you a few funny looks... but really, we'll take you just as seriously without the slacks and tie.) The interview will include either lunch or dinner, depending when it is scheduled.

On March 11, you will hear back from us with a decision. You will have a week to decide if you would indeed like to take the job. Extensions may be granted on a case-by-case basis, as needed. Note that if you do accept, you will be making a firm commitment to teach for us this summer and to fulfil all of the job requirements over the spring.

The first meeting of the seminar teacher group will occur on one of the dates mentioned above: 3/18, 3/19 or 3/20, and all hired teachers will be required to attend.
