The successful candidate will focus on the field of global mental health and be jointly appointed in Duke's Global Health Institute http://globalhealth.duke.edu/ with research and teaching activities split between Psychology and Neuroscience and this interdisciplinary Institute. Specialty emphasis and geographical regions are open, but we are especially interested in scholars working in low or middle income countries in areas related to adult psychopathology or child clinical psychology. Research topics of interest include depression/suicide, trauma, addictions, serious mental illness, and adaptation of evidence based treatment models in global settings. We seek outstanding applicants with the potential to develop an internationally-recognized, externally-funded research program and willingness to engage in undergraduate and graduate teaching.

The Department of Psychology & Neuroscience is a department with training programs in clinical psychology, developmental psychology, social psychology, cognitive psychology & cognitive neuroscience, and systems and integrative neuroscience. The clinical training program is a collaborative effort with the Division of Medical Psychology in the Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences and has close ties with the Duke Global Health Institute (DGHI). DGHI's Signature Research Initiatives in the areas of Gender, Poverty and Health; Health Systems Strengthening; and Global Aging and Population Dynamics also provide collaborative potential. The department is also strengthened by connections with the Duke Institute for Brain Sciences (DIBS), Duke's Social Science Research Institute (SSRI), the Center for Child and Family Policy, the Transdisciplinary Prevention Research Center (TPRC), the Center for Health Policy and Inequalities Research, and the Institute for Genome Sciences and Policy. All create excellent opportunities for interactions with faculty and students within Duke and across the wider university community.

Applications should include a curriculum vitae, a statement of research and teaching interests, three letters of recommendation, and three selected reprints/preprints.
