From the Pastor

At the beginning of June as I sat there listening to members of our confirmation class reading their faith statements (which are published inside this issue of *The Churchmouse*) I couldn't help reflecting on what it means to have a maturing faith. The thing is the world needs our most mature faith so acutely right now. Our own life feels like it is in free fall some days. Relationships falter. Dreams are lost. Plans change. Even our theology keeps changing.

Our personal faith in the midst of this free fall is a little like Alice in Wonderland. When Alice falls down the rabbit hole, her dress puffs up like a parachute and she wonders if she fell far enough whether she would burst through the centre of the earth. If she did, where would it, and would the people all be upside down from her perspective?

Think about it. After all the change and upheaval you have experienced, you will think nothing of future life challenges. It is as if your clothes are puffed up and protecting you from the fall. You are learning to see life from a new perspective, maybe even upside down.

There is a lot to be said for a new perspectives that come from taking a leap of faith. Your life is a leap of faith, but faith in who or what?

Faith for the Hebrew people wasn't so much faith in an external savior God. It was faith in the word or law of God, which is the cosmic story. It was faith in the ever evolving ebb and flow of life, full of mystery, change and survival against all odds. They took many leaps of faith. They gained wisdom and courage. They kept moving.

Faith in Jesus' teaching starts small and grows, always grows. It is like a seed. It grows and it matures. The New Testament says that when combined with works, faith is perfected. To me that means that when your life actions match your highest purpose, your deepest belief in the flow and connectedness of life, you are living by faith.

Sharon Salzberg, one of the leading teachers of eastern meditation in the world today, has a nice way of describing

the maturing of faith. She differentiates between bright faith, verified faith and abiding faith.

Bright faith beams at the possibilities of life. It is pure optimism. Many children have bright faith. Bright faith is appropriate for children. For adults, bright faith can come close to blind faith. Mature faith is never blind. The problem with blind faith is that even though faith can move mountains, you need to see which mountain needs to be moved.

Verified faith includes a memory of past survival and achievement. It is learned wisdom. Verified faith works closely with doubt. Doubt is not the opposite of faith. They are two sides of one coin. Doubt sharpens faith, and faith affirms doubt.

Abiding faith is unwavering in the face of change. Abiding faith doesn't expect life to remain stagnant. It is in tune with a purpose that doesn't depend on circumstances. It is one with the flow of life. It manifests in whatever way is effective in the changing circumstance.

Whatever your circumstance, take the advice of Joseph Campbell - "Jump. The chasm is not as wide as you think."

Let me end with a short practice that you can do on your own as you take time to relax and reenergize this summer. Make yourself comfortable, close your eyes and picture your current life and faith challenges as a chasm between two cliffs. It's challenging and intimidating, but it's a jumpable chasm. Say these words (from Psalm 46:10) to yourself-

Be still and know that I am God. Be still and know that I am. Be still and know. Be still. Be.

Now jump. The chasm is not nearly as wide as you think.

FAITH STATEMENTS OF THE CONFIRMATION CLASS June 5, 2011

MATTHEW -- A lot of people have a different meaning of the word faith. To me faith is something you have a strong and passionate belief in. The more we believe in something, the more hopeful we are towards that something. Belonging to a church community lets you know that there are people who care about you and will always be there for you for no matter what you need. Confirmation is your acceptance into a new world of faith and god. At my age I am having some difficulties believing in a higher power, but as I get older and more mature, hopefully my faith will mature and it will be easier to accept the stories in the bible.

When I hear bible stories, some of them seem unrealistic and hard to believe that they really happened. This may be just me, but I'm guessing other people may be thinking the same exact thing. For me confirmation has been a long journey, but I finally made it.

TED -- Based on Webster's Dictionary faith is: "something that is believed especially with strong conviction." To me, faith is believing in something no matter what someone tells you. So I have faith in things and I won't change my opinion based on what they say. I believe that there is a God who keeps people believing and teaches them how to live. I also believe that there are parts in the Bible that are too far-fetched and are not real but they teach lessons. It's important to know what I believe in so I know how I want to act or live. This affects me by always having something to look at as a guideline on how to live, such as the Bible. What confirmation means to me is that it's teaching me about how a church works and what it will be like to be a member. I also learned about exploring my faith. This shapes my future by giving me a community I can always go to. I believe in God because I went to church when I was younger and learned about God and believing.

CHRISTOPHER -- Over the past year, I've learned many things about my faith and what I personally believe in. The different places our confirmation group has been to show me that you don't have to believe every single thing in a religion, and there can be different subgroups of a religion believing in different Confirmation has shown me different things. perspectives of different religions. I've been in a Jewish synagogue, a Buddhist temple, and Hartford seminary learning about Islam. All these religions have showed me that there are different perspectives, and some of these religions are very similar to ours. For example The Buddhist temple showed me about the Buddha, and how you can have lots of peace in a religion, but suffering too. But in our religion, I've learned things like you have to look for God's love, and you have to spend time to worship. You can't just pray a little bit, but you have to commit time.

I believe in God. God is like an old man in the sky. I remember going to class and taking everyone's perspective on who he is. He's some tall skinny guy up in the clouds, but he's always with us. Through your ups and your downs, God is always with you whenever you need him. I believe that you have to take time to pray for him, you can always trust his powers, and you have to allocate your time according to what matters most. God is the one that can always help you out, but he isn't just going to get you things that you want. I wonder why things like natural disasters happen if he's real, but I guess he can't stop everything. The world isn't just good. God protects us, but we have to make an effort to keep him close to us.

MARTA -- When I was younger I didn't have much to worry about, but now that I see all the bad things going on in the world, I question why they are happening. Faith, to me, is security; if you believe in something you can feel safe. The security of your faith can make you feel less lonely and comfort you. I believe we all have a good will that we are born with and that follows us throughout our life. Faith does not shape my future because as time goes by I will shape my faith with my life experiences, through losses and gains. In the future I could chose to believe faith is just a way of maintaining a good will, and the definition of confirmation to me is being accepted for what you believe in, by your friends and family.

WILLIAM -- In the beginning I really didn't know why I joined the confirmation class; it was mostly because my parents signed me up and drove me there ever other Wednesday. But as time went on we went to other houses of religion and I started to realize it was a great opportunity to be doing this. I opened my mind up then and I saw more how other people's religions influenced their lives, cultures and ways of thinking. I started to see many others people's faiths so I began to think about mine.

Faith to me is doing the right thing for other people. My faith is universal, it doesn't even matter if you don't believe in any god but the faith is still there. Every single person in the world has faith even if they don't call it "faith". As much as trusting someone is having faith in them. It is like the golden rule we all learned as a kid, if you do something nice to a person you expect to have them do something nice in return. It all comes back to doing the right thing.

Once I become part of this church, it is a great opportunity to meet new people and expand on my thoughts and feeling toward the world as a whole by seeing people's actions and responses to worldly events. I have used this experience to open my mind and to see what life is like beyond what I have come to know by living in Connecticut. **JOHN** -- Faith is having trust in another person. To have faith towards another person is also to believe that they can help you through tough times. They are able to cheer you up when you need it.

Through my faith in God, I believe that everyone can be happy. I often go out of my way to help others. I try my hardest to be nice to everyone, and I make sure that I am not egotistical.

To be in a community of faith means that everyone helps each other. I feel that because I belong to a community of faith I owe it to everyone to give back. My faith in God has changed since I was younger. I feel like I can connect with him now, unlike when I was younger. I believe that God gave us this universe, he created us and many other life forms. In the future I think my belief in God will stay pretty much the same but it still may change.

GRACE -- To me, faith is believing in something that will be there forever. Like believing that the sun will rise every morning, or believing that there is someone up there looking out for you. I believe in God and that he will look after me and help me when I need help or courage... like now because I'm extremely nervous. I know that my faith will shape who I am and who I will become. I think my faith will help me chose from right or wrong like when I see someone who needs help, I help them because Jesus taught me to treat others how would I would like to be treated.

For me, belonging to a church means to be surrounded by a community that believes in God and to be near people who will help you strengthen your faith. To me, being confirmed into a church is to have a strong idea of your faith and to make the decision to continue in that faith. I have a strong idea of my faith and I hope that my faith will continue to grow and get stronger.

My faith will shape who I am by the choices I make. For example, I know that I will not join the military or anything that involves a gun because in the Ten Commandments, it says "thou shall not kill" I know that whatever I do in the future, it will probably involve helping others.

We have \$159,111.57 cash on-hand (as of 5/9/11) in the Capital Campaign which we hope can cover our next/remaining two projects which include:

-Installation of Limited Use Elevator and Replacement of Parish Hall roof

-Purchase new organ




