The Old Hickory Council of the Boy Scouts of America conducted their annual "Scouting for Food" on February 11<sup>th</sup>. This year we had 12 Boy Scout Troops and Cub Scout Packs working together to bring us a total of 7,861 pounds of food and personal care items – what a blessing! Way to go Scouts!

Recently, Jane Morgan Smith organized and conducted a fundraising dinner with 48 couples in attendance. Their donations for the meal, plus donations from several organizations brought us almost \$2,100 to help fund the BackPack Program to feed hungry children. # The Little Blue Star

"Thud" was the sound of something hitting the hardwood floor behind me. I turned around and saw my little two-year-old sister lying on her back beside the couch. I scooped her up in my arms, gave her a hug and sat her on my knee. She seemed a little confused. I was reminded of a comic book account of a bump on the head causing stars to orbit around the head of the injured person. So, I asked her "Are you alright? Do you see stars?" "Yes, isn't that little blue one cute" was her reply. She tried her best to make me see the blue star as she pointed in the air and smiled. She was too small to be making up the story but what was clear and in living color to her was invisible to me. The star existed for her even though it was impossible for me to see. Aren't we all like my little sister sometimes? We expect everyone to see exactly what we see. We do not realize that the circumstances of our lives may cause us to view things much differently. Some of the clients I have interviewed at King Outreach Ministry have experienced hunger, sickness, loneliness, abandonment, homelessness, abuse, neglect and torture. These clients try to help me to see the impact of the circumstances on their lives. I know it exists; even if I have not seen it myself. The Holy Bible tells us in Luke 3:11, *"If you have two coats," He replied, "give one to the poor. If you have extra food, give it away to those who are hungry."* At King Outreach Ministry we are entrusted to distribute the food and clothing donations we receive. We make our decisions based on the information we receive from the client, the Department of Social Services and other help agencies. We do not know all the circumstances of every case but we do our utmost to do God's will and let Him be the judge of the actions of our clients.

# TIME TO DIG IN!

There comes a time when we all must dig in. When you hold a bat in your hand with two strikes and two outs the best strategy is to dig in, take a deep breath, narrow your focus, and shorten your swing. When the economy turns south and dollars are scarce it is time to dig in, hunker down, get to work and stick to the necessities.

Sometimes God waits for us to dig in before He pours out His blessings. There is a wonderful reminder of the "dig in" principle found in the story of the prophet Elisha in 2 Kings 3. Three kings went out to war: King Joram of Israel, King Jehoshaphat of Judah, and the King of Edom. As they headed south to Moab, the desert suddenly became very dry and hot (as deserts are prone to do). The kings underestimated their needs and they were in danger of exposing their armies and livestock to dehydration and exhaustion. The King of Israel began to complain. The King of Judah looked for a prophet. The clear comparison between kings can teach us plenty about how to act in the midst of a crisis. When the going gets tough – the wise seek a word from the Lord!

Elisha the prophet happened to be in the midst of the armies that day. He stepped forward when Jehoshaphat called, secured a harpist and began to prophesy. The Lord spoke through Elisha saying, "Dig in." The prophet instructed the armies to dig holes throughout the desert. Against all reason, they listened to the Lord and spent their remaining energy digging holes in the desert. The next morning, the holes were filled with water. No rainstorms, no flooding, not even a gust of wind – but the Lord filled the holes with water. "The next morning, about the time for offering the sacrifice, there it was—water flowing from the direction of Edom! And the land was filled with water." – 2 Kings 3:20

The progression of this story is important. First the armies obeyed the Lord and dug in. Then the Lord blessed them with life-giving water. If you have become parched by the dry desert of everyday life, maybe its time to dig in. Open holes for God to fill with His life-giving blessing. Don't give in to temptation, like Joram, and complain. Follow the example of Jehoshaphat. Call on the Lord, prepare yourself to obey, and expect to see the Lord's blessing.

This has been a difficult season for many families in the area serviced by KOM. Jobs have been lost, home values have decreased, and fuel prices have increased. We could react by complaining. But what would that solve? Instead, the body of Christ needs to get to work and step up our efforts to help those in need. Grab a shovel! Let's dig some deep holes for God to fill with His blessings.

# TOTAL ASSISTANCE RENDERED IN CY2011: KOM + Salvation Army......\$557,842.00

**In 2011 we have received \$176,804.25 in free and donated food items**. These include TEFAP (The Emergency Food Assistance Program) and SNAP (State Nutrition Assistance Program) foods from the Second Harvest Food Bank of Northwest North Carolina, as well as items donated by local churches, civic organizations, businesses, individuals, schools, Scouts, Food Lion and Lowe's Foods, Dollar General stores Pizza Hut and Papa John's. [Total donated pounds of food = 235,739! (That is 117.9 tons of food!)]

We purchased \$101,506.67 in food items from the Second Harvest Food Bank, a food service, SAM's, WalMart, local grocery stores and discount food stores.

In feeding 1,782 families in 2011, we have spent \$56.96 per family fed purchasing food. This means your donations of food items help us to really S-T-R-E-T-C-H those dollars, and we appreciate every item donated!

# **Sleeping With Bread**

From the book <u>Sleeping With Bread</u>, <u>Holding What Gives You Life</u> by Dennis & Sheila Fabricant and Matthew Linn © 1995

During the bombing raids of World War II, thousands of children were orphaned and left to starve. The fortunate ones were rescued and placed in refugee camps where they received food and good care. But many of these children who had lost so much could not sleep at night. They feared waking up to find themselves once again homeless and without food. Nothing seemed to reassure them. Finally, someone hit upon the idea of giving each child a piece of bread to hold at bedtime. Holding their bread, these children could finally sleep in peace. All through the night the bread reminded them, "Today I ate and I will eat again tomorrow." [p. 1]

## Giving Our Bread Away

This book began with the image of World War II children sleeping with bread to reassure them that they would eat tomorrow as they did today. Many of them survived the concentration camps only because other prisoners had given their own last piece of bread to these children. Viktor Frankl wrote of how this bread brought not just survival but also hope and interior freedom:

"We who lived in concentration camps can remember men who walked the huts comforting others, giving away their last piece of bread. They may have been few in number ... but they offer sufficient proof that everything can be taken from a man but one thing: the last of his freedoms – to choose one's attitude in any given set of circumstances, to choose one's own way." When we sleep with bread we are empowered to choose our own way under any circumstances. We become like the men and women in the concentration camps who could give others the bread of life they held. [Viktor Frankl, <u>Man's Search for Meaning</u>, New York: Washington Square Press, 1963. p. 44]

Jane added a personal message to those in attendance that evening: "I read this book some years ago and was so touched by the message that, when I read the article recently in the Stokes News about the BackPack Program in Stokes County Schools, it really resonated with me. I realized that I was being called to do something about this issue and that maybe others would also feel that way...
