
## The Spire

Dear Friends in Christ,

Most everyone is advertising flu shots; grocery and drug stores, the mall and other places. There is another malady that lurks in this season; the disease of "Affluenza"; defined as "a painful, contagious socially transmitted condition of overload, debt, anxiety and waste resulting from the dogged pursuit of more (John deGraaf, David Winn and Thomas H. Naylor, Affluenz: The All Consuming Epidemic, 2<sup>nd</sup> Edition, Berrett-Kohler Publishers, 2005)

In the next eight weeks Americans will spend \$14.6 billion on gifts. The average family spends between \$700 and \$1400 each season. On average the credit card bills are not paid off until late March. Our gifting frenzy generates about 25 million tons of additional garbage (nationally).

And there are 36.3 million people in the United States who are hungry or at risk of hunger, including 13 million children. (Bread for the World Domestic Hunger Fact Sheet). In Rhode Island that translates to about 70,000 people with 40,000 children.

There is no question that we have the potential to significantly decrease the number of hungry families in Rhode Island by simply changing our giving priorities. Most of us need nothing. If we are hungry it is mostly likely because we didn't have or take the time to eat. Yes, money is tight for most of us, but we will still buy gifts for one another.

Here is an idea for alternative Holiday Giving that makes a difference for the people Jesus loved and cared for: the poor, widows and orphans, the oppressed and those in need.

Draw names for Holiday giving at Thanksgiving. Buy one gift for that person (with a limit of \$25.00). As a family use the balance of what you would have spent and support the charity of your choice. Write a letter as a family to the charity to explain.

Families with young children tend to exempt them from the one gift rule. But what might it mean to a child's faith development to share that experience with the rest of the family? If you start very young, the child never knows anything different.

Celebrate National Buy Nothing Day (the day after Thanksgiving) and bring your extra coats to the Coat Exchange on the grounds of the State House. All you'll feel is good.

#### **KCC** Environmental Task Force

#### A Few Environmental Notes to Share:

- 1.) The United Nations voted to make access to clean water a human right. Hopefully, this action will stimulate more work and money towards providing clean water and cleaning up contaminated water. More people die each year from contaminated water than from all forms of violence and war combined, almost twelve people every three minutes! Did you know that a \$25 donation to water.org could provide clean water for one person for a lifetime?
- 2.) Solar Panels will soon be going up on the roof of the White House Residence. The Obamas hope that this will stimulate others to go solar, similar to the vegetable gardening campaign. (Of course, if the White House had left the solar panels that President Carter put up, we wouldn't be doing it over again.)
- 3.) The Department of Interior has approved two permits for the first utility scale solar projects on federal lands in the US, both in California. One is the Chevron Lucern Valley and is considered small with 45 MW produced. The second is the Imperial Valley project that is on 6500 acres of land, 14 miles west of El Centro and the power will go to San Diego. It aims to produce 709 MW with gigantic solar dishes. Both sites worked with and were approved by the NRDC (Natural Resources Defense Council) so we can hope that they will have a minimal negative environmental impact.
- 4.) 10/10/10 was a unique date and for Greenpeace and 350.org it was called "A Global Day of Action Against Climate Change". 7000 events in 188 countries were held that day to raise awareness and call for more actions to stop pollution and CO2 emissions.
