KCC Scrip Program

As introduced in last month's Spire, we have launched a new fundraising initiative....**Shopping With Scrip!!! The congregation has responded enthusiastically to the Program.** We now have 50 participating families/individuals. **Through mid –December we've sold \$26,000 in Card value and, as a result, have raised \$1300 for KCC's ministries.** Many people used the Program for their Christmas Gift Card shopping. **Now as we settle into the New Year, our focus will be to encourage everyone to use the Program for their regular weekly shopping.** We all buy.... groceries, clothing, medications, books, coffees on the go, a quick bite to eat, a dinner out, office supplies, etc. We all buy gift cards for birthdays and other special celebrations. With KCC Scrip, you can make these same purchases and generate dollars for KCC's ministries. **The nice thing about Scrip is that your normal shopping generates the fundraising \$\$\$; no additional outlay is required by you.** Scrip uses debit/gift cards to pay for your purchases. **All you have to do is order/pick up your cards at Church on Sunday,** then go shopping. **There are over 500 Retailers in the program;** their rebates to non-profit organizations range between 2% and 19%, with an average of 5%. We've even added Belmont's to our list. For our most popular retailers- Belmont's, Stop & Shop, Shaw's, CVS, Rite Aid, Dunkin' Donuts, and Panera Bread-we carry an inventory of their cards. So you can purchase their cards "On the Spot" on any Sunday.

Jim Findlay commented on his very positive experience with the group meeting held yesterday morning and encouraged people to participate in one of the other scheduled groups.

Old Business

In response to a question about the status of the pictorial directory, Andrea Richardson replied that she now has a copy of the proof book and with help from others will carefully check that the information is accurate. When that process is complete the book will be ready for printing.

New Business

1. The Scrip program (see attached report for details of the program) was presented by Tom Butcher, stepping out of his role as moderator, and Dorothy Leduc. The program is an opportunity to raise funds for uses to be determined by the congregation. Members and others would purchase debit cards to be used at participating stores and the church would receive a rebate averaging about 5% on all purchases. Tom and Dot have studied how this program is implemented at Peace Dale Congregational Church, UCC. A committee of 10-12 volunteers would be needed. It is suggested that they could set up a table during coffee hour to accommodate the purchase and distribution of the cards. Dot and Tom plan ask the church Council at its October Meeting to approve the plan in principle and take steps to set up a committee to prepare for a mid-November startup.
2. In response to a question, Pat recommended we define the interim work we need to do before forming a search committee. The interim time is important and it is a mistake to rush into a search.

The meeting was adjourned by the moderator at 11:30 A.M. with a prayer led by Rev. Liberty.

Kingston Congregational Church **Draft Strategic Plan as of 12/14/09**

Church Mission Statement: We are a Christian church that supports each person's spiritual journey through the pursuit of worship, learning, and service. (Adopted 4/27/08)

Introduction: The KCC Strategic Planning Committee invited the KCC community, including members and nonmembers, to participate in a structured feedback process focused on four discussion points: identify KCC's strengths, weakness, opportunities, and threats (SWOT). Meeting announcements occurred in various formats over several weeks: The Spire, weekly Sunday worship announcements, and letter (land mail and e-mail). Interim Pastor Pat Liberty trained 14 people to serve as group facilitators. The Strategic Planning Committee thanks the seventy-seven (77) people who participated in meetings at church or in a member's home from October 11 to November 15, 2009. The Committee also thanks the one hundred fifty (150) people who responded to the written church survey. Their thoughtful responses are greatly appreciated.

This report reflects collective concerns and wisdom from the church written survey and SWOT groups and will serve as the basis of a five year plan of action for this church.

Five (5) areas represent the greatest concerns of attendees and offer opportunities to build on our history, our strengths and resources to ensure that we as a congregation continue to serve God and people in need. **The Committee will present this draft plan at an informational meeting in the Sanctuary after worship on Sunday January 3, 2010. If approved at the January 31, 2010 Annual Meeting, church leadership will then assign responsibility, accountability, and a completion deadline.** Each timeline may vary from 6 months to 5 years, depending on the complexity of the goal. The leadership will update the congregation at large periodically as to the progress in each strategic area.

Strategic areas to be addressed:

1. Membership growth, assimilation and retention
2. Christian education across the lifespan
3. KCC role in our local communities
4. Church leadership structure and process
5. Stewardship Growth

1. Membership growth, assimilation and retention

- Assess physical plant barriers that discourage attendance or participation
- Formalize welcoming, assimilation process and follow up contact with visitors
- Create KCC ministries and small group fellowship opportunities to address changing needs
- Reach out to young families and URI students
- Learn from other faith groups' success with retention and absent member follow up
- Increase public awareness through traditional media and internet

2. Christian education across the lifespan

- Offer new opportunities for adult spiritual growth and education
- Strengthen youth Christian education curriculum to serve all youth
- Increase congregation awareness of youth Christian education curriculum and activities
- Recruit ongoing support for the Junior and Senior High youth

3. Our community role

- Create new outreach to local social service groups
- Serve as a community resource and leader
- Collaborate with other faith-based organizations, non-profits, and URI
- Create higher visibility in the community via traditional media and internet

4. Church leadership structure and process

- Clarify governance and accountability for more effective leadership
- Increase congregation's understanding of church leadership structure and process Review and update by-laws to support changing church needs
- Create church organization and procedural manual
- Develop leadership training program
- Develop orientation and mentoring process for new committee members
- Increase inter-committee communication
- Increase communication from committees to congregation

5. Stewardship Growth

Featured Speaker Pam Steager

Pam Steager has been the coordinator for the Department of Peace Campaign in RI since 2004. She has been trained in restorative justice and nonviolent communication, studying at the International Institute for Restorative Justice in PA and at Suffolk University's Center for Restorative Justice in Massachusetts. Between 2003 to 2004 she was the only North American in a pilot Masters Degree program, in Costa Rica for Gender and Peace Studies at the United Nations affiliated University for Peace. Since returning to the US she has served as the Director of Training at the Institute for the Study and Practice of Nonviolence and has consulted on the 'To Protect and Serve Project' - an effort to enhance the cultural competence and communication skills of recruits and officers of the Providence Police Department.

As a writer, trainer, consultant and performer, Pam has spent over 25 years in the prevention, education and human service fields, primarily in the prevention of substance abuse, family and community violence. She has managed to do all this, in addition to writing an opinion column for the Providence Phoenix for 15 years, perform as a story teller, standup comic and raise two daughters.

She provides workshops on restorative justice and restorative practices and believes that shifting our current ideas about justice from retributive to restorative is an essential building block for a culture of peace.

Pam hopes to educate us in the practices of restorative justice which are gaining a foothold around the world, from kindergarten classes to morning circles and national models like the Truth and Reconciliation Commissions in South Africa and South America.

Pam will preach that Sunday and conduct a talk and discussion after service in the Fireplace room at 10:45AM. A fellowship soup and bread lunch will be served by members of the Peace and Justice Task Force and the Mission Board.

Fourth Annual MEXICAN DINNER

Your Mission Board's Peace and Justice Task Force is pleased to invite all of you to the fourth Annual Mexican Potluck Dinner on Friday, February 26, 2010. It's "Angelina's Shelter," a small home for abused or abandoned street children in the town of San Cristobal.

This year has been especially difficult for Angelina, as it has for all of us, but her budget has increased by 500%! Instead of taking in one or two new children, Angelina and her staff answered God's call and rescued a family of five children that no one else would take. The children had watched their parents die in their small village at the hands of 20 men with machetes. They also suffered many wounds. We can only imagine why this terrible event happened. Even Angelina doesn't know.

So now the house is now practically bursting at the seams. Tina and Steve Letcher visited the shelter this year, taking KCC's donation of \$1,000. Angelina cried when she saw us! Your church makes all the difference, she said. Otherwise their small business of making communion wafers would not have allowed her to care for the five children, ranging in age from 4 to 16. Already she can see that the children's faces reflect the love and care of their new home.

Please come, enjoy great food and fellowship. All are invited, especially kids! There will be activities for children in the Fireplace Room.

Healthy You, Healthy Church

Mid-December H1N1 (swine flu) vaccination update: Public health authorities recommend that we get vaccinated for H1N1 flu, unless there are compelling medical reasons, such as a severe chicken egg allergy or a past history of very rare severe vaccination complications. Of course, the most reliable medical authority is your personal physician and these comments are intended as general discussion only and not as medical advice. In RI the flu is widespread and is predominantly the H1N1 strain so this is an ideal time to talk with your physician about his/her vaccine recommendation for you.

You may be as robust as an ox but your being vaccinated protects the rest of us as well. Your vaccination reduces the probability of your spreading the flu to the people around you - many of whom have medical conditions that make them high risk for serious flu complications. These folks need you on their "flu prevention team" so please get vaccinated when the H1N1 vaccine is available to you.

To date, hundreds of thousands of people have been vaccinated in the U.S. and the "H1N1 vaccine is showing a similar safety profile to seasonal flu vaccines", according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention ([cdc.gov](http://www.cdc.gov)). A local physician said that the numbers speak for themselves; there are more than 1440 H1N1-related deaths in the US but 0 deaths that are vaccine-related. Concerns about vaccine safety are addressed by the CDC in its comprehensive vaccine safety page at http://www.cdc.gov/h1n1flu/vaccination/vaccine_safety_qa.htm.

As of mid-December, the RI Department of Health is expected shortly to announce the availability of the H1N1 vaccine for the next high risk groups: young adults to age 24, healthcare workers and 1st responders, and adults 25 - 64 years with chronic illness or weakened immune systems (cancer or on long term steroids, for instance). The vaccine is projected to be available for the general public in January.

What are examples of chronic illness that place people at higher risk for H1N1 flu complications? The RI Department of Health (<http://www.health.ri.gov>) lists chronic illness, such as respiratory conditions (Asthma, Chronic Obstructive Lung Disease/COPD, Cystic Fibrosis), heart disease, Diabetes, pregnancy, weakened immune systems (examples: cancer or long term steroids), Cerebral Palsy and Muscular Dystrophy, as placing people at higher risk. This is not a comprehensive list so again, please speak with your physician if you have a chronic illness, such as kidney, liver, blood, neurologic, peripheral nerve, neurodevelopmental or metabolic disorders.

Finally, for parents and schools the American Academy of Pediatrics flu information is comprehensive and practical. <http://www.aap.org/advocacy/releases/swineflu.htm>

Environmental Task Force

At the risk of being repetitive the Environmental Task Force would like to share some ideas to help the environment from ClimateCrisis.net.

*Change a light:*Replacing one regular light bulb with a compact fluorescent light will save 150 pounds of carbon dioxide per year.

*Drive less: *Walk, bike, carpool or take public transportation more often. You'll save one pound of carbon dioxide for every mile you don't drive!

*Recycle More:*You can save 2,400 pounds of carbon dioxide per year by recycling just half of you household waste.

*Check your tires: *Keeping your tires inflated properly can improve gas mileage by more than 3%. Every gallon of gasoline saved keeps 20 pounds of carbon dioxide out of the atmosphere.

*Use less hot water: *It takes a lot of energy to heat hot water. Use less hot water by installing a low flow shower head (350 pounds of CO2 saved per year) and washing your clothes in cold or warm water (500 pounds saved per year).

*Avoid products with a lot of packaging:*You can save 1,200 pounds of carbon dioxide if you cut down on your garbage by 10%.

*Adjust your thermostat: *Moving your thermostat down just 2 degrees in winter and up 2 degrees in summer could save about 2,000 pounds of carbon dioxide per year.

*Plant a tree: *A single tree will absorb one ton a carbon dioxide over its lifetime.

Turn off electronic devices: Simply turning off your television, DVD player, stereo, and computer when you're not using them will save thousands of pounds of carbon dioxide per year.

(No matter what you believe about climate change we live in a world with finite resources and the Johnston landfill isn't going anywhere, but up.)

If you missed 6 out of 6

You need Kerygma desperately!

If you missed 5 out of 6

You need Kerygma badly!

If you missed 4 out of 6

You need Kerygma a whole lot!

If you missed 3 out of 6

You need Kerygma like a duck needs water!

If you missed 2 out of 6

You still need the Kerygma course

You guess it! You still need Kerygma about as much as anyone.

Kerygma needs you!!
