from Pastor Wendee

OCCUMC's Mission Statement is Oak Creek Community United Methodist Church is a Christian Fellowship whose mission is to...

Worship God Love and Serve All People Grow in Faith and Invite Others to Become Disciples of Jesus Christ.

This year, the last Sunday in May is *Peace with Justice Sunday*, one of six special Sundays recognized by our United Methodist Church. These special Sundays help draw our attention to everyday needs in our world, country, state, communities, and families. The other five special Sundays are the following:

Human Relations Day in January
One Great Hour of Sharing in March
Native American Ministries Sunday in April
World Communion Sunday in October
United Methodist Student Day in November

We celebrate, promote, and inform people in the United Methodist Church about these Sundays because our General Conference has determined that drawing our attention to these needs helps us work together to make a difference through these ministries.

Peace with Justice Sunday focuses on the gospel of peace and encourages cooperation between people to help alleviate pain, suffering, and inequality. As Christians, we look to the Bible for the source of this direction toward justice. In the scripture text from Luke 4:18-19, we find Jesus quoting the prophet Isaiah saying, "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, for he has appointed me to preach Good News to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim that captives will be released. That the blind will see, that the downtrodden will be freed from their oppressors, and that the time of the Lord's favor has come." (CEV)

Through this text, we find that God and Jesus are continually encouraging us through the Spirit to take up their lead by caring for our neighbors near and far. When we, as disciples of Jesus Christ, listen to this nudge of the Spirit to help bring about God's justice and peace, we are helping build up the Kin-dom of God.

Our United Methodist Church's mission statement is to make disciples for Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. We find that Jesus sets the standard for justice through the unmerited gift of mercy. In the Biblical story from Genesis through Revelation, we hear that one of God's goals is to set the world right again. Jesus comes to help reverse the effects of sin, hopelessness, destruction, and evil. Through the gift of his love upon the cross, Jesus reaches into our world and shares God's forgiving love and encouraging Spirit. His action of love transforms us and our world.

This summer, may we find opportunities to care for, encourage, and gift others with God's love. We do this by sharing, in our words and in our actions, how God, through Jesus, has changed our lives toward wholeness, hope, and peace. May justice prevail.

Apportionments: Disaster Response

Our apportionment giving allows us to respond quickly when disasters strike, becoming God's hands on earth, reaching out to those in need. After the devastating earthquake in Nepal in April, 2015, the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) partnered with four other organizations established in the region to help channel resources to those displaced and injured.

When tornados struck a small town in Illinois in November, 2013, UM-COR partnered with the Red Cross to help rebuild damaged and destroyed homes. As the Ebola out-

break brought about death and panic in Liberia, UMCOR focused on two often overlooked populations – the elderly and disabled – to provide food security and disease prevention education. These are just a few examples of the extraordinary work that can be done by combining the resources of many individuals and churches to make a real difference in people's lives.

Mary Randall Zigbuo, a Global Ministries missionary serving in Liberia, observed, "To me, the work of missions is like a remarkable safety net for God's people. Those who are at risk of 'falling through the cracks' are rescued by the safety nets provided through our response to missions."

Eighty-five cents of every apportionment dollar goes directly to missions and ministries. Small change can add up to a big difference. Please consider adding a dollar or two to your weekly giving and earmarking it for our apportionments so we can continue to help fund the many ministries of the United Methodist Church.



Drama team start-up group has first meeting


A new drama team is being formed for the purpose of enhancing our worship experience. No experience necessary, just a love of our Lord.


