

- 1. Warm up for reading Students read familiar books.
- 2. Introduction of Snakes in Third Grade! Introduce Snakes in Third Grade! by looking at the cover photo and starting a discussion about pet snakes.
 - Suggested questions to facilitate introductory conversation:
 - What do you think Snakes in Third Grade! is about?
 - What do know about snakes? How do you feel about snakes?
 - Have you ever had a classroom pet? Which was your favorite? Explain why.
- 3. Skimming and Scanning Snakes in Third Grade! Use this time to introduce or review your lesson focus strategies and/or skills. Suggested skimming and scanning prompts:
 - Look at pages 4 and 5. What clues do the illustrations give you that tell you where the story takes place?
 - Look at page 7. How does the illustration help give you a clue about how Jack feels about the snake?
 - Look at page 15. Why does the author use exclamation marks?
 - On page 19, using pictures clues and the sentence, can you figure out the meaning of the word coiled.
- 4. Reading Snakes in Third Grade! Students read independently.

- 5. After reading Snakes in Third Grade! Open the conversation with a question that relates to the comprehension strategy which is asking questions. After a brief conversation about the contents of the book move to questions that support your lesson focus.
 - Suggested after reading content connection questions: Why do you think Jack didn't want to hold the snake at first?
 - How did they find out that Red was missing?
 - How did Jack's feeling about holding Red change in the story?
 - What would you want for a classroom pet? Why?
 - Suggested after reading lesson focus prompts:

 - I noticed (student's name) using (reading strategy) while you were reading. Did it help you with your reading? (Repeat this question to highlight different reading strategies or skills used by students.)
 - Did you read ahead or reread when the words didn't make sense?
 - How did the illustrations help you with words? How did the illustrations help give you clues about the setting? Characters' feelings?
- 6. After Reading Application for Snakes in Third Grade! Have students complete the reproducible on creating a story map.
