The 13 Colonies Travel Brochure

Objectives

I will understand how and why the 13 colonies of America were founded and how they compared to each other with respect to government, culture, geography, and economy.

Background & Directions

You are a new travel agency working for one of the American Colonies. You will need to create a travel brochure that will catch the eye of the common European person. Your job is to encourage people from Europe to move to your colony and settle there. You will then present your travel brochure to the rest of the class. You will be graded on quality of research, quality of presentation, quality of editing, work ethic, and your overall presentation.

Required Elements

Your brochure must contain answers to the following items. These must be properly placed according to the brochure template on this list of instructions.

History of the Colony

- 1. Why was the colony founded? (hint: determine cause and effect relationship)
- 2. Who were the founders?
- 3. Was your colony a charter, royal, or proprietary colony?
- 4. What were 3-5 important events (with dates) in the history of the colony?

Government / Political System

- 1. What type of government is used in your colony?
- 2. Who is in charge of your colony?
- 3. Who can vote? Who can own property? How are these rights determined?
- 4. Is your form of government a good thing for the local people? Why or why not?

Economic System

- 1. What ways do people in your colony make a living?
- 2. What products are made in your colony?
- 3. What are the main natural resources of your colony?
- 4. Is my colony dependent on indentured servitude and/or slavery?







The 13 Colonies Social Studies

Geography & Map

- 1. Where is your colony located in terms of other colonies or geographic features?
- 2. What are the main physical features in my colony?
- 3. What difficulties do the physical features create for you and your fellow colonists?
- 4. Include a map of your colony on your brochure.

Religion

- 1. Is there an official religion in your colony? Describe it.
- 2. Are colonists free to practice any religion in your colony? Why or why not?
- 3. Are there any other religions in this colony? If so, what are they?

Culture & Family

- 1. What are the roles of men and women in this colony?
- What do children do in the colony work, attend school, or both? Are there differences for boys and girls?
- 3. What type of recreational activities do you do for fun?
- 4. Is there anything else in your colony's history that is interesting or unique? Use this category to include surprising and/or cool facts about your colony.

Resources

You can find a host of online resources on Mr. Merel's website (click on my class, then homework, and there you'll find it under "The 13 Colonies Travel Brochure"). You are most welcome (and definitely encouraged) to find sources on your own as well. Be cautious, though, as wikipedia, about.com, and ask.com are not reputable sites. *Please note: You will have to cite your sources while taking notes and in your final product as well.

Daily Guide

Follow this guide for class work and homework to achieve success on this project. Please know that you will be graded on the final project but also your day-to-day work while in class, worth 10 points per day. This includes attention to the project, team work, and overall focus. *Word to the wise: it might be best to take notes and save images on a shared file between you and your partner, like Google docs, so you can communicate about the project anywhere.
