Disqualification by Association Safeguarding Update

As many of you will already be aware, the Department for Education has recently published new supplementary guidance to help schools understand childcare legislation and in particular the concept of 'disqualification by association'. The new guidance can be found at DFE Supplementary guidance. Your Local Education Authority will no doubt have issued its own guidance on this controversial issue and will be able to support you on this. However, we are also keen to ensure all of our schools are fully aware of the implications of this guidance. Key points all schools should be aware of are:-



Who does the guidance apply to?

The guidance applies to people working with children under 8. This guidance will therefore cover all staff working in first and primary schools and staff in secondary schools where services are provided for under 8s (e.g. after school clubs, childcare or visits from younger children). It will also cover those directly involved in the management of such childcare and those who visit different schools as part of their work (for example inspectors)

When is a person 'disqualified'

A person will be disqualified from working with children under 8 if they have been cautioned for, or convicted of, certain violent or sexual criminal offences against adults and any offences against children. They will also be disqualified if they are the subject of certain Orders in respect of childcare (including in respect of their own children) More detail on the relevant offences can be found in the schedules to the Childcare (Disqualification) Regulations 2009.

What does 'disqualification by association' mean?

An individual will be disqualified 'by association' from working with children under 8 where they live in the same household where another person who is disqualified lives or works. The guidance suggests the intention behind this is to guard against an individual working with young children where they may be under the influence of a person who poses a risk to children.

What should Schools do?

Schools are responsible for ensuring that all staff that they employ have had the appropriate checks. The guidance suggests asking staff to complete and sign a declaration about themselves and any person who lives or works in the same household as them providing details of any ground for disqualification under the Regulations.

• What if someone completes a positive declaration?

Schools should seek advice from their Local Education Authority in the first instance. In the event that a member of staff is disqualified by association they are not permitted to continue to work with children under 8 but they can apply to OFSTED for a waiver of disqualification.

What about new staff?

Remember when recruiting new staff that you should now require completion of a declaration before they start work, alongside the usual DBS checks.

Recruitment update, Voluntary Aided Schools

The National Society no longer provide standard application forms for use when recruiting Head Teachers or Teaching staff in Voluntary Aided Schools although standard employment contracts are still available for use.



In the event that you need an application form our advice is that you use the standard Local Authority forms but adapt these with guidance from the Joint Education Team to ensure the form is tailored to a Voluntary Aided School. We can then help you ensure that applicants are aware of the terms of the National Society staff contracts regarding the Christian character of the school and collective worship requirements.

Apprentices hired to support school

A recently-formed Anglican church primary school has taken on five apprentices to help with the education of its 500 pupils in a project supported by the Bishop of Durham the Right Revd Paul Butler. Northern Saints Church of England Voluntary Aided Primary School in Sunderland was created after an agreement between the Diocese of Durham and Sunderland City Council. Its formation brought together Hylton Red House Primary School and Bishop Harland Church of England Voluntary Aided Primary School to create the city's largest primary school.

The Apprentices project is being run as part of a partnership with Sunderland College and three of the people taken on are working with Early Years children, one is assisting with site supervisory duties and the fifth is a business administration assistant. Northern Saints school headteacher Steve

Williamson said: "This is a way of supporting people who want to train whilst they work and we see it as a way of raising our Apprentices' aspirations. As a church school we wanted to put something back into the community. Our Apprentices have aspirations and seeing what they are doing also raises our pupils' aspirations as well. They will inspire our young people. This is very much a long-term project." During his visit, the Bishop met the Apprentices and also opened a newly refurbished part of the school for Early Years pupils.

Site Supervisory Apprentice Michael Leonard (aged 19), whose work includes building maintenance and health and safety, said: "Being an Apprentice gives you experience of a wide range of jobs. It gives you a good grounding."

Michaela Dodds, one of the education support apprentices in Early Years, said: "Being an Apprentice you get the best of both worlds. You work at the school and one day a week at College. You get a lot of experience. Ideally, I would like it to lead to a job. Learning everything as an Apprentice will allow me go on to apply for jobs as a teaching assistant."

Business Administration Apprentice Dionne Hall is the oldest of the five, having been made redundant from her factory job,

which she had held for thirteen years. The mother-of-two said: "I wanted to make the best of myself. I had opportunities when I was younger but did not have the confidence to grasp them. I am determined to grasp; them now. I see it as my last chance. Apprenticeships allow you to learn practical skills and look ahead. For me, it's the best option."

Bishop Paul said: "This is a very encouraging scheme having apprentices of all ages in our schools learning whilst they earn is a benefit to the School, the Children and the Apprentices. I would encourage wider creation of apprenticeships – in fact we are suggesting that churches look at how they might get involved when there is an appropriate need. Seeing what has been achieved here and opening the newly refurbished early years outdoor area was a delight. This feels like a very good place to learn and that is clearly happening across the years with Children and Adults alike."

Bishops' Blessing on new twin Church Schools

Pupils celebrated the official opening of their brand new £6.45 million primary school campus in North Tyneside on 3rd December 2014. The Longbenton Voluntary Aided Schools campus houses two schools - St Bartholomew's Church of England Primary School and St Stephen's Roman Catholic Primary School.

Children and staff from both joined together to celebrate the official opening ceremony which was performed by Bishop Frank White, Assistant Bishop of the Church of England Diocese of Newcastle, and Bishop Seamus Cunningham, Bishop of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Hexham and Newcastle. The event included the unveiling of two special commemorative plaques at each school, and performances by the school choirs.

The state-of-the-art campus is located on Goathland Avenue in

Longbenton - on the former site of Goathland Primary School - and the schools opened for learning in September 2014. The new campus brings the two schools together on one bespoke site, but both have retained their individual identities and remain as two distinct and separate schools with their own registration, curriculum, faith and ethos. Facilities include bright and modern classrooms, a community learning centre and impressive and extensive outdoor facilities. Each school also has its own special 'teaching hall' which all classrooms open onto. The schools share some areas including the main hall, dining hall, computing suite, staff room, playing fields, community building and an outdoor multi-use games area.

Elected Mayor for North Tyneside, Norma Redfearn said: "This impressive primary campus is a real first for North Tyneside. We have created two fantastic new primary schools in one cutting-edge building with spacious classrooms, a community building and extensive outdoor facilities. These fantastic facilities will encourage and support our children's learning and enable our teachers to deliver the first class educational opportunities our children deserve."

Cllr Ian Grayson, Cabinet member for Children, Young People and Learning added: "Today's event officially marks the start of a very exciting future for these two schools and this fantastic new facility will benefit generations of North Tyneside pupils."

Richard Restall, Headteacher at St Bartholomew's Church of England Primary School, said: "It is a real privilege to be in such an exciting place. The children love the new building and very quickly made it their own. It provides a unique opportunity for our both school communities to work alongside and support each other in delivering a great learning experience, set firmly within a Christian context. We are looking forward to building on our school's long heritage and equipping our young people for their 21st Century future."

Stephen Fallon, Headteacher at St Stephen's Roman Catholic Primary School, added: "We are absolutely thrilled with our new setting. The configuration of the learning spaces provides great flexibility and maximises opportunities for creating high quality learning experiences. The unique design and shared facilities are allowing us to explore a wider range of collaborative working practices with our colleagues at St Bartholomew's. It's all extremely exciting for everyone connected to our school communities. I am grateful to the design teams and everyone involved in the construction who worked so hard in providing this wonderful place of learning."

The work was funded by North Tyneside Council as part of its Primary Capital Investment Programme, with contributions from the Diocese of Hexham and Newcastle and the Newcastle Education Board. The building project was delivered by Kier North East and the scheme was designed by Space Architects and Kier North Tyneside.

Educational Trip to Auschwitz 26th - 29th June 2015

Dear Colleague

We are writing to invite you on an organised trip to Auschwitz, near Krakow in Poland. This visit is to be led by the Revd. Gavin Wort and similarly to last year, is being organised by Lesley Hillary (Bishop of Newcastle Inter-Faith and Ethnic Relations Advisor) and Natalie Chapman (RE Consultant). It will include tours of Auschwitz I and Auschwitz - Birkenau, a visit to the Jewish Cultural Centre in Oswiecim and a tour of the Kazimierz district of Krakow. It is also hoped that workshops on the Christian Response to the Holocaust, the Sacrifice of Maximillian Kolbe and the Holocaust from the Jewish Perspective shall be offered. The aim of the visit is to gain further insights into what happened during the holocaust and how this has affected the Jewish and Christian communities – both then and now.

The cost of this trip is £480.00 per person (based on a group of 20). This price includes flights, transfers, accommodation for three nights on a dinner, bed & buffet breakfast basis staying at the Centre for Dialogue and Prayer and admission costs to Auschwitz and Auschwitz Birkenau with a work shop taking place at Auschwitz 1 which will be led by a curator from Auschwitz. There will also be an opportunity for participants to meet before the visit and hear from a Holocaust Survivor about his experiences of Auschwitz. There are up to twenty places, open to all teachers, school chaplains, and clergy, which will be allocated on a first come, first served basis.

The feedback following the visit was overwhelming positive, with many teachers and clergy and students expressing how useful the trip had been and was going to be when teaching about the Holocaust in RE.

The trip is designed to support the teaching and learning of the units of study included within the syllabuses and opportunity to discuss curriculum links and future planning of RE and the holocaust shall be organised before, during and after the visit. In particular the units to be looked at, whilst in Krakow shall be People of Faith (Questful RE, Primary Syllabus unit 6.7) and 'Should we commemorate the Holocaust?' (Illuminating Pathways, Secondary and Middle schools, unit 8.5); there are other opportunities to study the Holocaust within the RE syllabus, in both the primary and secondary planning, but these units shall be the primary focus.

If you or your colleagues are interested in this visit to Auschwitz and require further information, please do not hesitate to contact either Lesley Hillary (<u>I.hillary@newcastle.anglican.org</u>) or Natalie Chapman (<u>nrchapman76@gmail.com</u>). In order to ensure that the trip takes place a non-refundable deposit of £200.00 plus a copy of your passport which would need to be made by Friday 27th March, with final payments being made by Friday 24th April 2015.

We returned from Lesotho this weekend and there, waiting on the door mat, was the BACS notification of the collection raised at the School Leavers Services. Thank you so much for the donation of £432.10. We were most impressed that so much was raised and would love to be able to thank all those staff and children who contributed.

I can assure you that this donation will be used directly to support some of the children in the Child Headed Household project. Whilst we were in Lesotho we were very encouraged to hear stories of how the LINK has been providing respite care holidays for some of these desperately poor and vulnerable youngsters. But further than that it was great to hear how many of these little family units have been taught, and helped, by the staff to build their own simple keyhole gardens in the land around their rondavels. This technique is proving to be a very successful method in Africa. The LINK has also provided them with tools and seeds and hopefully they will now have fresh vegetables for most of the year – an extremely valuable addition to their diets. Obviously the more funding we raise the more families we can help. We were so pleased to learn that the LINK in Lesotho is committed to providing on-going support and mentoring to these youngsters.

If it is at all possible I would be grateful if you could pass on our thanks, on behalf of all those youngsters who will directly benefit, to all the schools who contributed.



Spend less on energy

We all know about the pressure on school budgets these days, and one of the best ways to make any budget go that little further is to reduce energy usage and hence cost. St Aidan's Academy in Darlington recently brought in Axion Energy Solutions (www.axionenergysolutions.co.uk) to carry out an energy management programme, producing a 21% reduction in energy consumption.

Having reduced the amount of energy used by a variety of school facilities and systems, Axion then enhanced this by also negotiating fixed prices with their gas and electricity suppliers. Gas prices were fixed for 3 years, producing a further substantial reduction; and electricity prices were also renegotiated to a lower tariff and fixed for two years.

The savings that St Aidan's achieved were by 'easy wins' - focusing on how plant is operated and controlled; they have not involved spending on major projects. The Academy's Carbon Footprint has been calculated as 16% lower as a result of the activities over the last year. Those that are seeking to carry out larger projects, for example installing more efficient lighting can get help from Salix Finance - a government funded 0% loan for energy efficiency projects in government funded organisations. Being the change

The Year 5 pupils at Richard Coates Church of England Middle School, Ponteland, received Young Leaders' Awards from the Archbishop of York's Youth Trust (ABYYT) at the end of 2014. The Trust was founded by Dr John Sentamu to encourage young people to engage with their communities and 'be the change you want to see'.

Gathered at St Mary's Church, Ponteland, to receive their awards from Bishop Frank White, some of the young people told their own stories:

"Year 5 led our harvest festival. We thought about the meaning of harvest and how we could help those who are less fortunate than ourselves; we collected food for The People's Kitchen, who provide hot meals and food for homeless people in Newcastle, decorated baskets and wrote harvest poems and prayers."





"We were invited to wear a tie for a day at school, to raise awareness about mental health and raise money for a charity called Young Minds. George, a student at Ponteland High School, is wearing a different tie for every day of the school year, to raise awareness about mental health. We enjoyed wearing our ties and raising money."

"Miss Henderson and our Year 5 gardening club work very hard to keep our school gardens tidy. The whole of Year 5 have become involved with the 'Mini pots of Care' scheme. We each planted daffodil bulbs and took these home to raise money for Marie Curie Cancer Care. We will care for our bulbs and we have asked family and friends to sponsor us to raise money for the charity."

"In November there was an exhibition in Ponteland Memorial Hall to recognise those who fought in the World Wars. The Mayor asked us to produce some artwork and we did this to show our respect for those in our community who fought for us. Ponteland Town Council asked us if they could display it for a performance of 'Oh what a lovely war'."

"We thought about justice in the world and the Christian response to helping others. We played the paper bag game, to help us understand how children in Calcutta get the things they need. We worked as families to make paper bags and earn Rupees. We found this very difficult and it made us understand how unfair life can be for Children in other countries."

"As BBC Children in Need approached, we decided to hold a fundraising fair and invited our parents and the community along to support it. We planned and ran Pudsey-themed stalls, from apple bobbing to cakes. The afternoon was a huge success and we raised £362!"

"In November, Vicky Hopley who is part of the congregation at St Mary's Church came to talk to us about the fantastic work she does at Mandritsara Hospital in Madagascar. We had lots of interesting questions to ask her."

"Throughout the award a character called Archie has set us individual challenges. We have really enjoyed The Young Leaders Award and we feel we have made a positive change to the community around us."



"Some of the children in Year 5 have also been involved in a 'Wilderness School Programme' at the same time as our ABYYT Award. We have thought carefully about the environment around us and have developed our Literacy, Numeracy and Science skills in an outdoor classroom. We had a fantastic time and really enjoyed the sessions at Wallington Hall."

"We used the story of the Good Samaritan to help us think about how Inspirational Leaders and how we can help others and be the change we want to see."

Contract review for schools

Parish Buying, the national buying service run by The Church of England, is currently offering a free contract review to help Church schools reduce their costs in key spending areas such as energy, office products, telecoms and photocopying.

Their aim is to see Church organisations (schools, cathedrals, diocesan offices and parishes) reduce the amount spent on key contracts in order that the money saved can be spent on the purpose of that organisation rather than on running costs. They do this by pooling the bulk buying power of The Church of England in order to negotiate lower prices and ensure excellent quality of service, tailored to the needs of the Church.

Parish Buying currently manage around £15m of spend per annum and have over 200 CofE schools registered with the service and using a range of contracts that Parish Buying offers.


The contract review is a simple yet effective way of finding out exactly how much Parish Buying could save your school. It covers a range of contracts including IT. All that's needed is for a school to complete the Overview Sheet (**click here**) with details of the contracts used, along with copies of invoices received over the last three months. The procurement team at Parish Buying will then provide the school with detailed quotes and savings on those products and services, along with independent advice from the procurement experts within the team.

In meeting with various Diocesan Education staff in the last few months, Parish Buying have received a very positive response to the contract review analysis, with education officers keen to see how much schools could be saving. Several schools in Ipswich and Derby are currently taking advantage of this free contract review following endorsement by their DBE.

Our Masters programmes in the Department of Theology & Religious Studies offer you the chance to benefit from the research and teaching excellence of our academic staff.

Our students study for different reasons and in different ways. For some, doing a postgraduate course is mostly about feeding their interests and exploring the subject in real depth. Others see a Masters as primarily a way of developing their careers. Some students want to complete a programme within a year of full-time study, and others want to study part-time over several years.

What will I study?

The MA Contemporary Religion has two routes, one offering specialist training for those looking to prepare for doctoral-level research, and one for those interested in developing their knowledge and professional skills. Both routes require you to take three or four taught modules, one of which will be related to your chosen route. The others will be drawn from the following list (with four being offered each year).

- Religion in the Public Sphere
 Religion & Philosophy in Contemporary Life
 Religion & Popular Culture
 Religion & Psychology
 Religion & Peace-building
 Religion in Contemporary Practice

For the research route you will take three taught modules plus an 18,000 word dissertation.

For the professional route you will take four taught modules plus a 12,000 word dissertation

The MA Theology & Ministry requires four taught modules and a 12,000 word dissertation. There are six taught modules delivered in a two-year cycle.

- · Contemporary Christian Theology
- Contemporary Biblical Studies
- · Ordinary Theology
- . The Bible & the Church
- · Church, Culture & Mission
- · Contemporary Christian Ministry

The MA Theology & Religious Studies is an award offered to those who may want to study modules from both of the above programmes, and to do a dissertation that is related to neither.

The MA Chaplaincy Studies has four taught modules, delivered in a two-year cycle, and a 12,000 word dissertation:

- . Chaplaincy within the Mission of the Church
- . The Chaplain in the Institutional Context
- · Chaplaincy in the Multi-Faith Environment
- The Theology & Spirituality of Chaplaincy

How are the programmes delivered?

. The MA Contemporary Religion is mainly aimed at fulltime students (though a part-time route is available), and modules are delivered during the day over two semesters at the University campus.

Full-time 12 months | Part-time 2 to 3 years

 The MA Theology & Ministry and MA Theology & Religious Studies are mainly aimed at part-time students (though a full-time route is possible) and modules are delivered on one evening a week (ten sessions) in terms 1 and 2, and over three Saturdays in term 3.

Full-time 12 months | Part-time 2 to 4 years

. The MA Chaplaincy Studies is a part-time programme, and delivery is at block residentials which may be held on the campus or elsewhere in the region.

The programme runs on a two-year cycle, with taught modules delivered in residential blocks over three days.

Part-time 2 to 4 years

There is some scope for studying some modules across programmes, which allows you to tailor what you do to suit your interests. More details are on the website, and you can talk with the Head of Programme about what might be possible in any given year.

Entry requirements

In addition to the University's general entry criteria for postgraduate study, you must have an upper second-class or first class honours degree (or equivalent). This can be in any subject, though priority will be given to students with degrees in humanities and especially in theology or religious studies.

Applicants with a lower second-class degree and knowledge of theology and/or religious studies may be accepted onto the programme following an interview. This includes applicants who may have a lower second-class degree in another subject area and who have evidence of having studied theology or religious studies at certificate or diploma level (for example as part of ministry training).

For international applicants If English is not your first language, you need to take an IELTS test or an equivalent qualification accepted by the University. You must pass at 6.5 or higher in all four aspects of the test (listening, reading, speaking and writing).

Associate Student entry route

If you do not qualify for direct entry to the programme you might be offered enrolment as an associate student on a single module taught over one semester. This depends on your qualifications and experience, and an interview. Associate students can only register for a single module, and therefore this is not a suitable entry for full-time students, including international students. Please contact us for more information.




