PRE-REGISTRATION

- A \$5.00 pre-registration fee is required to enter the Open Division. A \$2.00 pre-registration fee
 is required to enter the Intermediate Division, Junior Division, and Owl Hooting Division.
- All contestant callers MUST pre-register at the location of the calling contest. Pre-registration begins at 9:00 a.m. Saturday, July 23, 2011. Deadline for pre-registration concludes at 10:30 a.m.
- 3. Rules review meeting begins at 11:00 a.m.

DIVISIONS

- 1. Junior Division Ages 12 and under
- 2. Intermediate Division Ages 13 through 18
- 3. Open Division Ages 19 or older
- 4. First, Second, and Third places will be awarded for each division

CONTEST CALLING RULES

- All rules and questions will be reviewed with callers and judges at 11:00 a.m. before the contest begins.
- 2. Judges will be excused and positioned out of sight of the contestants.
- 3. All callers for each division will draw numbers for calling position. If a caller does not show up for the position drawing, he/she will be eliminated from the contest and forfeit the entry fee.
- All contestants will be placed in a pre-calling area. No practice calling is allowed once callers
 are assigned to the pre-calling area.
- 5. If a contestant has any physical, visual, or audible contact with a judge, they will be eliminated.

JUDGING AND SCORING

- 1. Callers in the Open Division will be required to perform four (4) specific calls: tree call, fly down cackle, plain hen yelp, and the caller's best call.
- 2. Callers in the Junior and Intermediate Divisions will be required to perform two (2) specific calls: plain hen yelp and the caller's best call.
- A one minute (maximum) time limit will be allowed for each specific call. A 5 point penalty will be applied for each call exceeding the time limit.
- 4. No mandatory calls or time limits are applied to the Owl Hooting Division.
- 5. Ties will be broken by a call-off.

USE OF CALLS

- 1. Contestants may use any manufactured, self made, or natural voice call.
- 2. Contestants will be allowed to change call types to perform each of the required calls.
- 3. Only multiple calls are permitted to perform the caller's best call.
- 4. All electronic calls are prohibited.

PREMIER EXHIBITOR AWARD

A Premier Exhibitor Award will be awarded to promote entries in the McDonald County Fair. To be eligible, an exhibitor must exhibit in a minimum of five different areas at the fair, but can collect points on no more than two exhibits in each division; must sell a minimum of 30 hog raffle tickets; must help set-up and clean-up Mondays before and after the fair; and must indicate on entry form that they are competing for Premier Exhibitor Award. Hog tickets and money must be turned in to fair secretary. Point system will be 3 points for blue ribbon, 2 points for red, and 1 point for white. Points may be accumulated in any competitive contest at the fair such as livestock judging, showmanship, etc. Each department superintendent is to keep a record of exhibitors and points in their department and turn them in to the fair secretary, who will tally points. Only McDonald County residents are eligible for the Premier Exhibitor Award.

Prize money will be: 1st - \$50 • 2nd - \$30 • 3rd - \$20

HERDSMAN AWARD

(Individual Award)

Purpose: To encourage young people to work with their animals with kindness and gentleness

but firmness; to promote ease of handling; and to promote proper care and training.

Eligibility: The award is presented to the youth, not to the animal. The animal will not be judged for conformation or quality. The animal itself will be judged only for:

- a. The animal's response to its owner.
- b. How well the youth has done with what he/she has to work with.
- c. Gentleness and workability of the animal in and out of the ring.
- 1. Care of Stall
 - a. Cleaned at all times
 - b. Properly bedded
 - c. Equipment picked up
 - d. Box for storage of equipment
- 2. Care of Animal
 - a Watered and fed
 - b. Made comfortable
 - c. Gentle
- 3. Courteous to all exhibitors
- 4. Courteous to public and answers questions
- 5. Behavior of exhibitor

JUDGING STANDARDS

Two herdsman buckles will be awarded. One to the Beef and Dairy sections combined and one to the Sheep, Goat, and Swine sections combined. Those who have won the herdsman trophy/buckle are not eligible to win it a second time in that particular division.

SHOWMANSHIP CONTEST

(Junior & Senior Exhibitors)

Junior exhibitors must be 13 and under as of January 1, 2011. Senior exhibitors must be 14 and over on or before December 31, 2010. Exhibitors showing Dairy, Beef, Swine, Sheep, and Goats are eligible. Every exhibitor must groom and show his or her own animal. Horses are included in the senior division round-robin contest only—not in the junior division round-robin contest.

NO BOARS IN SHOWMANSHIP

JUDGING STANDARDS

- A. Preparation of animals for showing
 - 1. Condition of feet
 - 2. Trimming of head, ears, hair, horns, etc; as appropriate for the animal
 - 3. Cleanliness of animal
 - 4. Condition of coat, including gloss, and non-use of objectionable materials
- B. Showing of animals
 - 1. Control of animal by exhibitor
 - 2. Poise and coolness of exhibitor
 - 3. Skill in showing, including
 - a. Continuous attention
 - b. Keeping animal placed to the animal's advantage
 - c. Being continuously alert
- C. Ability to stand or move the animal as requested by the judge.

SHOWMANSHIP SCHEDULE

At 8:00 a.m. Saturday all exhibitors in beef, swine, and sheep divisions are eligible (no matter what color of ribbon from previous judging). Dairy and Goat exhibitors are eligible to compete for showmanship immediately following their respective show. First, second, and third place winners will be selected in each division. Following this, there will be a contest for the top individual in each division for the Showmanship Buckle. Each of the five final exhibitors must be able to work with all five divisions of livestock because they will rotate to the animals in the finals. Horses are not included in the junior divion of this contest.

Those who have won the Showmanship Trophy/Buckle are not eligible to win the Showmanship Buckle the second time in that age category.

PREMIUM SALE

Eligibility for premium sale:

- 1. Exhibitor must show own animal in its class at the fair.
- 2. Exhibitor must present own animal at the sale by himself/herself.
- 3. Exhibitor must meet one (1) of the following requirements:
 - A. An exhibitor must be a verifiable resident of McDonald County, Missouri, at least ninety (90) days prior to the McDonald County Fair;
 - B. An exhibitor must be a verifiable member and actively participating in a McDonald County 4-H program. Active participation will be considered and decided on an individual basis by consulting with the exhibitor's 4-H leader;
 - C. An exhibitor must be a verifiable member and actively participating in McDonald County FFA. Active participation will be considered and decided on an individual basis by consulting with the exhibitor's McDonald County FFA advisor; or
 - D. An exhibitor who has not been a verifiable resident of McDonald County for ninety (90) days prior to the McDonald County Fair can still be eligible for the premium sale if the exhibitor meets the requirements set forth in subsection B for a 4-H program outside of McDonald County or the requirements set forth in subsection C for a FFA program outside of McDonald County.
- 4. Exhibitors should send "Thank You" notes to premium buyers and for add-on money.
- 5. An exhbitor may sell only one animal in the sale.
- An exhibitor will not be eligible for the McDonald County Premium Sale if the exhibitor participates in the Newton County Premium Sale for the concurrent year.
- 7. Premium Sale premium will be ready and should be picked up at the fair grounds during cleanup day the Monday following the fair between 8:30 a.m. and 10:00 a.m.
- 8. Premium sale add-ons will be mailed to the exhibitor within two weeks of the Premium Sale.

GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS

- The McDonald County Board of Education reserves the right to have the final approval of all Fair Board policies, rules, and regulations.
- 2. The rules and regulations will apply to each and every department of the Fair. Exhibitors will be required to familiarize themselves with all the rules and regulations concerning the Fair.
- 3. Any person who violates any of the rules will forfeit any privileges and premiums and be subject to such penalty as the Board of Directors may order.
- 4. All property of every character entered for competition, for display, or any other purpose shall be subject to the rules and regulations prescribed by the Board of Directors, McDonald County Fair Association, Inc.
- 5. The McDonald County Fair Association, Inc. or any of its officers or persons connected with the Fair shall not be held responsible for loss, damage, injury, death, or disability, by disease, or from any other cause to such property.
- Any person in McDonald, Newton, and Barry Counties is eligible to exhibit livestock or articles in the McDonald County Fair.
- 7. All exhibitors are limited to a number of exhibits as specified in the rules of each division.
- 8. Entry blanks are available at the County Extension Office in Pineville or Agriculture Education Office at the McDonald County High School.
- Exhibits must be registered and in place by 6:00 p.m. Thursday or earlier if required by that division.
- 10. All craft exhibits entered in the McDonald County Fair must be the property of the exhibitor and must have been made by the exhibitor.
- 11. Exhibitors of livestock may exhibit as many animals in a class as they like, but may not collect more than two premium monies per class.
- 12. Livestock exhibitors must be able to prove ownership of animal for a minimum of 60 days prior to the Fair by cancelled check, registration papers, notarized statement, or bill of sale. Bucket calves less than 60 days old still need to be able to prove ownership.
- 13. All livestock must meet the State Health Regulations. Proof thereof **must be** presented to the section superintendent **before unloading the animals.** Veterinarians on the grounds will have the final say.
- 14. All exhibitors of livestock must furnish his or her own feed, bedding, and watering equipment. Exhibit space will be set up according to division entries. Stalls will be pre-assigned by Show Committee. (If exhibitors wish to be penned together, they should indicate so on their entry form.)
- 15. Judges will award premiums only to those exhibits mentioned in the premium list.
- 16. Danish system for judging will be used, except for horse show.
- 17. Exhibition livestock is welcome but must bring pens. Contact commercial booth superintendent.
- 18. All protests must be in writing and accompanied by a deposit of \$20, which will be forfeited if protest is not sustained. Such protest must state plainly the cause of the complaint or appeal and must be delivered to the department superintendent within six hours after the occasion of such protest. Protests will be considered by the Board of Directors as promptly as possible, and their decision will be final.
- 19. Youth exhibitors must not have passed their 19th birthday before January 1, 2011, unless they are active FFA members. **Verification must be made with a valid membership card.**
- 20. Entry fees for exhibitors not living in McDonald County are as follows: Beef - \$10.00 Sheep - \$5.00 Dairy - \$10.00 Rabbits - \$2.00

Swine - \$5.00 Horses - \$10.00 Goats - \$5.00 Poultry - \$2.00

Livestock entry deadline is July 1. (Entry fees must accompany entry form.)

(Make checks payable to "McDonald County Fair".)

- 21. All indoor exhibits will be released at 9:00 p.m. Saturday, July 23, 2011. All livestock will be released immediately following the premium sale or 10:00 p.m., whichever is latest. Premiums, ribbons, and trophies will be forfeited if tack, animals, or other entries are removed before that time. This will be strictly enforced.
- 22. No dogs are allowed on the fairgrounds, except exhibition dogs.
- 23. No alcoholic beverages allowed on fairgrounds.
- 24. All checks for class premiums **must** be picked up from department superintendents at release time Saturday night. No checks will be mailed.
- 25. Any livestock entries received after entry deadline will be charged a \$5.00 penalty fee.
- 26. Treasurer's books will be closed ninety days after the fair. All business transactions with the McDonald County Fair must be attended to by that time.

- 27. Set-up and clean-up days: the Mondays before and after the fair. All 4-H and FFA members and others participating in fair should participate.
- 28. All youth groups with exhibitors spending the night must have an adult sponsor also spending the night.
- 29. Animals showing in a breed class must have registration papers in exhibitor's name, or they will be shown in the cross or other class.
- 30. All livestock trailers must be parked in designated parking areas.
- 31. All youth livestock exhibitors must submit a copy of the conduct pledge (printed in the fair catalog) at the same time they submit their livestock entry form. Those who violate the pledge will forfeit all premium and/or placing money and will not be allowed to sell in the premium sale. The second offense will result in the exhibitor being barred from exhibiting at the McDonald County Fair. The Board of Directors will evaluate violations, and their decisions will be final.
- 32. The superintendents have the right to reject any exhibit they feel unworthy of exhibition.
- 33. No single exhibitor will be paid premium on more than one placing in each class, with the exception of livestock, which may have two.
- 34. Youth who are not McDonald County Fair livestock exhibitors spending the night on the fair grounds must submit a release form before doing so to the Livestock Superintendent. Releases may be obtained from the Livestock Superintendent.
- 35. Neither, the McDonald County Fair Association, Inc., nor any of its members, will be responsible for items not picked up at the release time on Saturday.
- 36. No straw for bedding will be allowed in sheep, goat, or hog pens. Must use shavings or sawdust only.
- 37. All exhibitors exhibiting swine, sheep, goats, beef, dairy, bucket calf, little flock, and/or horses must be five years of age or older by July 1, 2011, to exhibit the above referenced at the fair, unless otherwise provided for herein.

ANIMAL HEALTH REQUIREMENT FOR EXHIBITION 2011

(This is a SUMMARY, and not a reprint of 2 CSR 30-2.040 Animal Health Requirements for Exhibition regulation. Contact the Missouri State Veterinarian's Office at 573-751-4359 for clarification on the following.)

Animal Health Requirements for Exhibition, 2 CSR 30-2.040 (2009)

- (1) Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.
 - (A) The term Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (including paper copy of an electronic Certificate of Veterinary Inspection) means an official document signed by an accredited, licensed veterinarian. The official Certificate of Veterinary Inspection shall state that the animals are free of visible signs of contagious, infectious, or communicable disease, describe the animal(s) by species, breed, sex, and age. In addition to the individual animal identification(s), the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection shall reflect all data for required tests and vaccinations, all dates, results, and the name of the laboratory. All breed-specific data requirements for the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection are located in the subsection relating to that breed.
 - (B) Animals with active lesions of ringworm with resulting loss of hair or warts easily visible without close examination will not be permitted to exhibit and shall be subject to isolation or expulsion depending upon the nature and seriousness of the disease.
 - (C) Scheduled breed association sales with shows in conjunction with the sales will employ accredited veterinarians other than state regulatory personnel for processing animals and Certificate of Veterinary Inspections for change of ownership.
- (2) The following listed minimal health and testing requirements on livestock are for exhibition only and do not qualify livestock to be sold or moved to a new owner or destination.
 - (A) Exhibition Requirements for Cattle, Bison, and Exotic Bovids.
 - 1. Intrastate (Missouri origin cattle and bison moving for exhibition only).

- A. No Certificate of Veterinary—Inspection is required.
- B. Brucellosis—no test is required.
- C. Tuberculosis—no test is required.
- 2. Interstate (cattle, bison, and exotic bovids entering Missouri for exhibition only).
 - A. All animals must be individually identified by an official eartag as defined in Title 9, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 71, published annually in January, herein incorporated by reference and made a part of this rule, as published by the United States Superintendent of Documents, 732 N Capital Street NW, Washington, DC 20402-0001, phone: toll free (866) 512-1800, DC area (202) 512-1800, website: http://bookstore.gpo.gov, registration tattoo, or any other means approved by the state veterinarian and listed on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection. This rule does not incorporate any subsequent amendments or additions.

B. Brucellosis.

- (I) Cattle from brucellosis-free states.
 - (a) All sexually intact cattle may enter without a brucellosis test.
 - (b) Steers. No brucellosis test required but must be individually identified and listed on a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.
- (II) Sexually intact cattle from brucellosis Class A states. All test-eligible animals must be tested and negative within thirty (30) days prior to entry except—
 - (a) Cattle from a certified brucellosis- free herd. The certified herd number and the date of the last test must be listed on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection;
 - (b) Steers. No brucellosis test required but must be individually identified and listed on a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection; and
 - (c) Rodeo bulls from a Class A state must have a negative brucellosis test within twelve (12) months prior to exhibition.

C. Tuberculosis.

- (I) Dairy—all classes of dairy cattle, two (2) months of age and older, entering Missouri for exhibition must meet the following requirements:
 - (a) Must obtain an entry permit;
 - (b) Must have a negative tuberculosis test within sixty (60) days of shipment, test date must be listed on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection; or
 - (c) Move from an accredited tuberculosis-free herd (herd test date must be listed on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection); or
 - (d) Move directly from a herd of origin that has had one (1) complete negative herd test within one (1) year (date of test must be listed on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection).
- (II) Beef—all classes of beef cattle (including exotic bovids and bison), two (2) months of age and older, entering Missouri for exhibition must meet the following requirements:
 - (a) All classes of beef cattle, two (2) months of age and older, entering Missouri for exhibition from a state having a tuberculosis free status may enter without additional testing requirements or entry permit;
 - (b) All classes of beef cattle, two (2) months of age and older, entering Missouri for exhibition from a state having a tuberculosis status less than free must meet the following requirements:
 - I. Must obtain an entry permit;
 - II. Must have a negative tuberculosis test within sixty (60) days of shipment, test date must be listed on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection; or
 - III. Move from an accredited tuberculosis-free herd (herd test date must be listed on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection); or
 - IV. Move directly from a herd of origin that has had one (1) complete negative herd test within one (1) year (date of test must be listed on the Certificate of

Veterinary Inspection).

- (B) Exhibition Requirements for Swine (exhibition of feral swine is prohibited).
 - 1. Intrastate (Missouri origin swine moving for exhibition only).
 - A. All swine to be exhibited must be free of clinical signs of infectious or contagious disease.
 - B. No Certificate of Veterinary Inspection is required.
 - C. Brucellosis. No test is required.
 - D. Pseudorabies. No test is required.
 - 2. Interstate (swine entering Missouri for exhibition only).
 - A. All swine must be individually identified by official eartag as defined in Title 9, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 71, published annually in January, herein incorporated by reference and made a part of this rule, as published by the United States Superintendent of Documents, 732 N Capital Street NW, Washington, DC 20402-0001, phone: toll free (866) 512-1800, DC area (202) 512-1800, website: http://bookstore.gpo.gov, ear notch, tattoo, or any other means of permanent identification approved by the state veterinarian and be individually listed on a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection and free of clinical signs of infectious or contagious disease. This rule does not incorporate any subsequent amendments or additions. An entry permit is required.

B. Brucellosis.

- (I) Swine originating from brucellosis- free states may exhibit without a brucellosis test.
- (II) Swine originating from a state having a brucellosis status less than free must be tested negative within sixty (60) days prior to exhibition except breeding swine from a validated brucellosis-free herd. The validated herd number and date of last validating test must be listed on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.

C. Pseudorabies.

- (I) Swine originating from a state classified as Stage V in the National Pseudorabies (PRV) Eradication Plan may exhibit without a pseudorabies test.
- (II) All other swine must be tested negative within sixty (60) days prior to exhibition except swine from a qualified pseudorabies-free herd. The qualified herd number and date of the last qualifying test must be listed on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.
- (C) Exhibition Requirements for Equidae (including exotic equine, donkeys, asses, burros, and zebras).
 - 1. Intrastate (Missouri origin horses and other equidae moving for exhibition).
 - A. Equidae must be free of clinical signs of an infectious or contagious disease. Any equidae showing signs of infectious or contagious disease at an exhibition shall be excused by the official inspecting veterinarian. When an official inspecting veterinarian is present, all equidae will be subject to daily inspection.
 - B. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection is not required.
 - C. All equidae (except nursing foals accompanied by their dams) must be accompanied by a current VS Form 10-11 or any officially recognized federal/state Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) test chart showing test date within twelve (12) months prior to exhibition for each animal, the name of the EIA accredited testing laboratory and the test accession number assigned by the laboratory, the graphic description of all markings needed for identification, or microchip, or legible tattoo, or unique registered brand or imprinted photograph on any officially recognized federal/state EIA test chart. A certified photocopy or certified facsimile of the VS Form 10-11 or any officially recognized federal/state EIA test chart may be accepted for the purpose of exhibition.
 - (I) A certified photocopy is one obtained from the testing veterinarian or accredited testing laboratory bearing seal or signature in the lower right-hand corner along with the date of certification of photocopy in some ink other than black.
 - (II) A certified facsimile may be obtained only from the testing veterinarian or accredited testing laboratory and must bear the facsimile imprint of the originating

facility clearly across the top of the page. It must also bear the date of facsimile either along the top or in the lower right-hand corner.

- (III) Alteration or substitution of any information on any VS Form 10-11 or any officially recognized federal/state EIA test chart, including certified photocopies, certified facsimiles, or Certificate of Veterinary Inspections, shall cause the document to be invalid and in violation of sections 267.010 to 267.730, RSMo, and may result in civil penalties not to exceed ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) per violation and subject to expulsion.
- 2. Interstate (including exotic equine, donkeys, asses, burros, and zebras).
 - A. Equidae must be free of clinical signs of an infectious or contagious disease. Any equidae showing signs of infectious or contagious diseases at an exhibition shall be excused by the official inspecting veterinarian. When an official inspecting veterinarian is present, all equidae will be subject to daily inspection.
 - B. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection is required on all equidae (except nursing foals accompanied by their dams) showing identification and description of equidae listed and negative test results of an official EIA test, showing test date within twelve (12) months prior to exhibition for each animal, and the name of the EIA-accredited testing laboratory and the test accession number assigned by the laboratory. All equidae entering without an official Certificate of Veterinary Inspection and/or EIA test shall be excused from the show until proper documentation and test are available.
 - C. All equidae (except nursing foals accompanied by their dams) must be accompanied by a current VS Form 10-11 or any officially recognized federal/state Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) test chart showing test date within twelve (12) months prior to exhibition for each animal, the name of the EIA accredited testing laboratory and the test accession number assigned by the laboratory, the graphic description of all markings needed for identification or microchip, or legible tattoo, or unique registered brand or imprinted photograph on any officially recognized federal/state EIA test chart. A certified photocopy or certified facsimile of the VS Form 10-11 or any officially recognized federal/state EIA test chart may be accepted for the purpose of exhibition.
 - (I) A certified photocopy is one obtained from the testing veterinarian or accredited testing laboratory bearing seal or signature in the lower right-hand corner along with the date of certification of photocopy in some ink color other than black.
 - (II) A certified facsimile may be obtained only from the testing veterinarian or accredited testing laboratory and must bear the facsimile imprint of the originating facility clearly across the top of the page. It must also bear the date of the facsimile either along the top or in the lower right-hand corner.
 - (III) Alteration or substitution of any information on any VS Form 10-11 or any officially recognized federal/state EIA test chart, including certified photocopies, certified facsimiles, or Certificate of Veterinary Inspection, shall cause the document to be invalid and in violation of sections 267.010 to 267.730, RSMo, and may result in civil penalties not to exceed ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) per violation and subject to expulsion.
 - D. A six (6)-month passport from states with which there is a reciprocal agreement will be accepted in lieu of a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection. These passports must have proof of a negative EIA test within thirty (30) days of the date of application of the passport and permanent identification for each horse recorded on the passport and the VS Form 10-11 or any officially recognized federal/state EIA test chart, along with other identifying characteristics. In the event of confirmed vesicular stomatitis in any of the states with which reciprocal agreements exist, use of the six (6)-month passport will be suspended by the state veterinarian of Missouri.
 - E. Venezuelan Equidae Encephalomyelitis (VEE) vaccination and entry permit is required prior to entry on equidae originating from states in which VEE has been diagnosed within

the preceding twelve (12) months.

- F. Any equidae from a premise under quarantine for vesicular stomatitis shall obtain an entry permit and must include the statement on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection that "the equidae listed have not been exposed to vesicular stomatitis within the past thirty (30) days."
- G. The board, organization, or manager of each assembly or event is responsible for certifying that all equidae admitted or participating meet the regulations in this section and shall not admit or allow participation of equidae not so certified. Untested equidae shall not be allowed to congregate with other equidae. The owner of each animal shall comply with requirements under sections 267.010 to 267.730, RSMo, and may be assessed civil penalties not to exceed ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) for each violation.
- (D) Exhibition Requirements for Sheep (including exotic sheep and antelope).
 - 1. Intrastate (Missouri origin sheep (including exotic sheep and antelope) moving for exhibition).
 - A. All sheep (including exotic sheep and antelope), regardless of age or gender, must be free of clinical signs of an infectious or contagious disease.
 - B. All sheep (including exotic sheep and antelope), regardless of age or gender, must be individually identified by an official scrapie identification as defined in Title 9, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 79, published annually in January, herein incorporated by reference and made a part of this rule, as published by the United States Superintendent of Documents, 732 N Capital Street NW, Washington, DC 20402-0001, phone: toll free (866) 512-1800, DC area (202) 512-1800, website: http://bookstore.gpo.gov, or any other means of permanent identification approved by the state veterinarian identifying them to the flock-of-origin and be listed on a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection. This rule does not incorporate any subsequent amendments or additions.
 - C. No tests are required.
 - D. Scabies.
 - (I) Sheep from a scabies-quarantined area must be dipped or treated by an officially approved method within ten (10) days prior to exhibition.
 - 2. Interstate (sheep (including exotic sheep and antelope) entering Missouri for exhibition only). The previously mentioned intrastate requirements must be met, and:
 - (I) A permit number must be obtained and recorded on a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection if the sheep (including exotic sheep and antelope) are from a scabies quarantined area.
- (E) Exhibition Requirements for Goats (including exotic goats).
 - Intrastate (Missouri origin goats (including exotic goats) moving for exhibition only).
 A. All goats (including exotic goats), regardless of age or gender, must be free of clinical signs of an infectious or contagious disease.
 - B. All goats (including exotic goats), regardless of age or gender, must be individually identified by an official scrapie identification as defined in Title 9, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 79, published annually in January, herein incorporated by reference and made a part of this rule, as published by the United States Superintendent of Documents, 732 N Capital Street NW, Washington, DC 20402-0001, phone: toll free (866) 512-1800, DC area (202) 512-1800, website: http://bookstore.gpo.gov, or any other means of permanent identification approved by the state veterinarian identifying them to the herd-of-origin and be listed on a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection. This rule does not incorporate any subsequent amendments or additions.
 - C. No test is required.
 - Interstate (goats including exotic goats entering Missouri for exhibition only).The previously mentioned intrastate requirements must be met.
- (F) Exhibition Requirements for Poultry.
 - 1. Intrastate (Missouri origin poultry moving for exhibition).

- A. All poultry must be free of clinical signs of any infectious or contagious disease.
- B. No Certificate of Veterinary Inspection is required.
- C. Pullorum-typhoid. All poultry exhibited (except Missouri origin waterfowl) shall be tested negative for pullorum-typhoid within ninety (90) days prior to exhibition or equivalent program in which the flock has been tested within the past twelve (12) months with no change of ownership. This information shall be documented on a VS Form 9-2 (see 2 CSR 30-8.020) or similar certificate which shall accompany the poultry to the exhibition and shall be made available on request.
- 2. Interstate (poultry entering Missouri for exhibition only).
 - A. All poultry must be free of clinical signs of any infectious or contagious disease.
 - B. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection, VS Form 9-2 or similar certificate is required.
 - C. Pullorum-typhoid test. All poultry exhibited shall be tested negative for pullorum-typhoid within ninety (90) days prior to exhibition or originate from a flock approved by the National Poultry Improvement Plan (NPIP) or an equivalent program in which the flock has been tested within the past twelve (12) months with no change of ownership. This information shall be documented on a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection, a VS Form 9-2 (see 2 CSR 30-8.020) or similar certificate which shall accompany the poultry to exhibition and shall be made available on request.
 - D. An entry permit is required.
- 3. Requirements for sponsoring exhibitions for poultry.
 - A. An official representing the person or organization sponsoring the exhibition shall notify the state veterinarian no later than thirty (30) days prior to the exhibition giving the names, place, inclusive dates and times of the event.
 - B. Record keeping. The sponsor of the exhibition shall compile a list of all poultry present at the exhibition. The list shall contain the name and address or voluntary premises identification number of each owner and the number, species, breed, variety, type, sex, and pullorum-typhoid status of all poultry present. A copy of this list shall be retained by the sponsor of the exhibition for at least twelve (12) months and shall be made available upon request to a representative of the department.
 - C. Inspection. Poultry must be free of clinical signs of an infectious or contagious disease. Any poultry showing signs of infectious or contagious disease at an exhibition may be excused by the official inspecting veterinarian or department representative.
 - D. Pullorum-typhoid status. All poultry (except Missouri origin waterfowl) exhibited shall be tested negative for pullorumtyphoid within the past ninety (90) days or originate from a flock approved by the National Poultry Improvement Plan (NPIP) or equivalent program in which the flock has been tested within the past twelve (12) months with no change of ownership. This information shall be documented on a VS Form 9-2 (see 2 CSR 30-8.020) or similar certificate which shall be made available on request.



YOUTH LIVESTOCK DIVISION

General Rules of Fair apply. Stalls will be pre-assigned by show committee. Steers will be weighed, mouthed, and checked Friday at 9:30 a.m. **NO** animals in stalls until checked in with department superintendent. **See health regulations following general rules.**

Entry deadline is July 1. All late entries will be charged a \$5.00 late penalty fee.

Livestock must be in place by 6:00 p.m. on Thursday and will not be released until immediately following the premium sale or 10:00 p.m., whichever is latest. If livestock or tack is removed before this time, all trophies, ribbons, and premiums will be forfeited.

Youth will be judged on the Danish system.

All exhibitors must keep hold of halter while showing in the ring. Exhibitors of male animals will be responsible for restraint and safe precautions of their animals.

Exhibitors must be able to prove ownership of animal for a minimum of 60 days prior to the Fair by cancelled check, registration papers, notarized statement, and/or bill of sale. Bucket calves less than 60 days old still need to be able to prove ownership.

All animals exhibited must have proof of age either by registration papers or have a signed statement from the breeder.

Animals showing in a breed class must have registration papers in exhibitor's name, or they will be shown in cross or other class.

Unethical fitting will be deemed to consist of any method altering the natural conformation of any part of the animal's body. Any attempts to change the degree of firmness of an individual animal will also be deemed unethical.

Stalls must be cleaned before premium checks are released. Steer weights must be turned in to Beef Superintendent. A 4% tolerance will be allowed to steer exhibitors.

All clipping blocking chutes <u>must</u> stay in the designated area on the east end of the livestock barn. This <u>will</u> be enforced.

Class premiums will be paid only on classes listed in the book. Regardless of the number of entries in a class, livestock exhibitors will be paid for no more than two placings per class. Money for placings will be distributed by the department superintendents during release time.

Exhibitors participating in the Premium Sale must present their animal by themself at the Premium Sale.

No straw will be allowed for bedding in the hog, sheep, or goat pens—shavings or sawdust only.

All exhibitors exhibiting swine, sheep, goats, beef, dairy, bucket calf, little flock, and/or horses must be five years of age or older by July 1, 2011, to exhibit the above referenced at the fair, unless otherwise provided for herein.


