South Sioux City Recycling

You may have noticed a few changes in South Sioux City's curbside recycling program. One change that has been made is in the vehicle that is being used for the pick up of your recyclables.

The City's contractor, Western Hauling, is using a "clean" garbage truck rather than using the standard recycling truck that citizens are used to seeing. This change was imple-



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mented by the contractor as a cost saving measure. All recycled materials are being picked up utilizing this separate vehicle on the same schedule as your normal weekly garbage pick up. The items that you recycle are being utilized to conserve valuable resources and create usable paper and plastic products.

March 2009 EnergyWise Tip: "Conserving (hot) water is EnergyWise."

A necessary component of life, itself, water is undeniably a precious resource. As a primarily agricultural-based state, water is especially important to the quality of life in Nebraska, and all Nebraskans have a responsibility to use it wisely.

Using water – heating it and moving it to irrigate crops – also takes energy. Generally, there are three places many Nebraskans have an opportunity to conserve water, use energy efficiently and in the process save money. Those three places are in the home, on the yard, and in the field.

sprinkler system, if applicable, to operate when it's raining. Be sure to water your lawn early in the morning before evaporation from the mid-day sun makes your efforts to get water to your thirsty lawn highly inefficient.

In the field

Technological advances in agriculture in the last decade or so have taken great steps forward in water and energy conservation. It's a proven fact: Center pivot irrigation systems with low-pressure sprinklers lose less water to evaporation while precisely irrigating crops than

At Home

Many opportunities to conserve water and save money exist in the average home in Nebraska. Any water savings is beneficial, especially if you typically spend money to heat the water. After a look at the following data showing how much hot water is used in a typical household activity, two water- and energy-saving devices will clearly benefit the home: low-flow showerheads and a highefficient horizontal front load clothes washer.

In the Yard

Overwatering lawns accounts for the waste of millions of gallons each year in Nebraska. Make sure water is applied efficiently to your lawn. Don't allow your automatic



out-dated high-pressure systems do. Another advance – center pivots with drop sprinkler heads – only need to apply about half as much water as traditional gravity-flow irrigation systems to sufficiently irrigate crops.

Covington Program Encourages Families to Read Together

Covington students are really "Wild about Reading" this year. The purpose of the at-home reading program is to increase personal reading time at home and to encourage families to read together. Research shows the more students read the more success they have in school.

Students are provided with individual and group incentives to encourage reading at home. Some students have received books, book charms, theme related prizes, lunch with the principal, and their picture in the paper. We have also gone "live" with the zoo in their penguin exhibit and had Wild Animal Encounters bring kangaroos, owls, skunks, and snakes to show our students. The second part of our reading program is a quest to earn a trip to the Omaha Henry Doorly Zoo. The zoo gives away free admission to the school in Nebraska that reads the most books during the months of December, January, and February. Thus far, Covington students have read 29,005 books at home and 18,650 books in school, for an average of 134 books per child. The winning school last year read 140 books per student. With two weeks left to read, we are excited about our chances!
