

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#### From the Parish Clerk

## Flooding and drainage problems around Tiddington

As reported in the last Newsletter, members of the Parish Council met with Gordon Hunt, the Drainage Engineer for Oxfordshire Highways on the morning of Friday 12 September. We walked the village with him, showing him the problems which have affected us so badly in the last few weeks and he made notes of the various areas of concern, promising to take action.

This he duly did and a team of engineers spent a couple of days in the village with their jetting equipment. According to Mr Hunt's email to me, the jetting and camera survey showed up major problems in the system from the Village Hall to the outfall. He intends to replace this system from next year's drainage budget. Let's hope there aren't too many problems with surface water before then!

Mike Dickerson, Inspector for Oxford Highways came to have a look at the streams of water running down Sandy Lane and was himself somewhat mystified. Water appeared to be bubbling up at the edge of the road itself, possibly as the result of a blocked culvert which may pass under the roadway at that point. He left us stating that he would

#### From your Chairman

As we go into 2009, my impression is that the village is in good heart. Vandalism, although still a problem, is not as bad as it has been in recent years and village events have been well attended.

There are, of course, still problems, mainly relating to traffic. The pelican crossing argument rumbles on. A change of MP and the Cabinet Member for Transport at OCC may bring results and the Parish Council is still pressing hard. Similarly we are in regular contact with the relevant authorities discussing ways of reducing speeds, both on the A418, A40 and the village roads.

Current news on the closure of the bridge over the M40 at Junction 7 is that this will take place in April, possibly lasting for only three months but, as they say, watch this space! We are now more optimistic on the noise reduction front.

The Station Yard development continues to be a problem. SODC ignores us and to take action against it appears to be prohibitively expensive, particularly as we are far from certain to win.

It seems that OCC is taking more notice of our complaints concerning drainage and flooding. However, matters would be vastly improved if householders did not deposit green waste in the streams and ditches.

Inconsiderate and illegal parking continues to be problem. Please, everyone, do not park on pavements or in such a manner that impedes other road users.

Finally a warm welcome to the new landlords at The Fox.

The news from Crowmarsh is not particularly exciting in so far as it relates to Tiddington. There will be a change in the collection of household waste and the contractor collecting it. The arrangement may not be to everybody's liking but you can't please all the people all the time.

The development at Station Yard has been a thorny problem. It is as important to SODC for their reasons as it is to the village for ours.

The biggest news is the co-operation between SODC and the Vale of the White Horse District Council, with senior management posts being shared and the SODC Chief Executive, David Buckell taking over that role at the VWH as well. What all this means to us is still unclear, as is whether it is a precursor to a merger.

The rate of Council Tax for 2009/2010 will be set in the next couple of months and I am afraid to say you have to expect an increase, although it is the Council's intention to keep this to a minimum.

#### From the Vicar

I am writing this on a particularly bleak day in mid November. On days such as this it can seem to barely get light. Darker days, falling leaves and bad weather all herald the arrival of winter. It also heralds the arrival of Christmas. In Britain the Christian festivals seem to echo our calendar; Easter with its promise of resurrection comes in the spring when nature bursts back into life after winter, Christmas arrives when the days are at their darkest.

Light shining in the darkness is one of the most powerful biblical images at Christmas. In the first chapter of John at verse 5 we read, "And light shines in the darkness, and the darkness could not overcome it". This is the gospel reading that is often read at the end of carol services and at midnight communion. I love this image, and it is especially resonant at this dark time of the year.

The first chapter of John's gospel uses poetic words to express a truth beyond words. In verse 14 it says, "the Word was made flesh and dwelt among us, and we have seen its glory".

This Word made flesh is God himself present on earth as a tiny baby boy. The true and wonderful meaning of Christmas is that the Lord Jesus Christ is the light that shines in the darkness. This light that shines forever will give depth and meaning to our own lives in times of joy and of sadness.

Lights are a very important symbol of Christmas; much of the Christmas story takes part at nighttime. The shepherds leave their fields not at first light but in the middle of the night, a star leads the wise men. Perhaps the light shines in the darkness so that we can focus on it more clearly; if you are a light sleeper you will know how hard it is to ignore even a tiny light shining. It is far easier to ignore during the day. In the lead up to Christmas I know how distracted I am during the daytime, it would be easy to ignore and shut out the true meaning of Christmas. At

nighttime, though, things are calmer and stiller and I can begin to focus on the light shining in the darkness.

I love Christmas, and I enjoy all the extras; the Christmas lights, the decorated houses and the tacky decorations in shops. They are an important part of our Christmas celebrations. But by themselves they will not get us to the heart of the Christmas story. The true meaning of Christmas is revealed to us through the pages of the Christmas story.

Jesus is the light that shines in the darkness; he is the light revealed in the darkness of the stable in Bethlehem. He is the light we seek to follow and the light that will prevent us from stumbling in the darkness. Candles are very visible at Christmas; they are also an important symbol of light. As you light candles this Christmas, remember at the same time that Jesus the light of the world has come into our world to banish all of our own dark corners.

I look forward to meeting you at our Christmas services and I hope and pray that Christmas will bring true peace into our lives and that we may be led further towards the light that is Christ.

I wish you all a very happy Christmas.

# Wheatley & Chalgrove Neighbourhood Policing update

#### Wheatley issues

During early October I and other local officers carried out a mobile phone and seatbelt

operation at various locations throughout the neighbourhood to deal with any drivers seen using their mobile phones whilst driving or not wearing a seatbelt.

Unfortunately this operation had to be curtailed early due to an operational emergency. However, further operations will be taking place around the area and I will take this opportunity to remind people that the law states that you must wear a seatbelt whilst driving (with some exceptions). If you are caught not wearing a seatbelt then you can be given a £30 fine. However, it is more important to remember that failure to wear a seatbelt may cause you serious injury even in a low speed accident.

As for using a mobile phone whilst driving, the law was recently changed so that drivers caught using a mobile phone whilst driving could be reported for driving without due care and attention if the officers have reason to believe that the person driving was negatively affected by their use of a mobile phone. This can apply even if the driver has a "hands free kit" if the officers believe the drivers was focused attention more on conversation than the driving. This is a serious offence. Even without this drivers can receive a £60 fine and 3 points on their driving licence if caught using their mobile phone whilst driving. A recent study showed that drivers using their mobile phone whilst driving are about as likely to be involved in an accident as someone driving under the influence of alcohol. Also, during September and October local officers carried out high profile operations at the Thame fair. Thame Charter fair and Abingdon fairs. These operations seemed to be successful as this year those fairs went off without any major problems, whereas in recent years some of these occasions had suffered problems.

# M40 Chilterns Environmental Group December 2008 Report

#### Junction 7 Bridgeworks.

The latest date given by Darren Rhoden of the Highways Agency (HA) to commence repairing the Motorway Bridge over Junction 7 of the M40 is currently April 2009.

However, a complete reworking of the bridge reconstruction project is now undertaken. They discovered at the 11th hour that a high pressure water main that was thought to exist was actually capped off many years ago. Supporting this non-existent pipe during the repairs had previously bedeviled their planning to reconstruct the bridge, hence the project will now be quicker, cheaper and a great deal easier to undertake. When we have more information regarding the new reduced working time schedule to complete the repairs you will be notified in the Newsletter.

#### Milton Common Noise Barriers.

The M40 CEG had a successful meeting with Tom Harris, Minister of Transport in March this year. Following our presentation and discussion he instructed the HA to explain the difference in our far cheaper pricing to erect noise barriers against their own, difference being in the region of 2 million pounds. The HA have been working since March this year on a solution to cost out the noise barriers required at Milton Common. It is now anticipated that their noise model will be completed at the end of December 2008, some 9 months in the making at a cost estimated to be over £50k.

The M40 CEG had Sound Barrier Solutions Ltd produce a Scoping Report at a cost of over £2,000.00 that was supported and funded by the SODC and County Councils. We are most grateful for their welcome support.

Darren Rhoden is in charge of this project at HA and it is their No 1 project because it is a Ministerial request. Darren Rhoden is adamant that the scheme is not recommended, should not go ahead and will only be undertaken if the new minister, Lord Andrew Adonis instructs them to do so.

That being said, we continue to remain positive as to the outcome being in our favour to obtain new noise barriers. The large cost savings to repair the bridge would go a long way towards the costs to provide effective noise barriers and we continue to press hard.

In early November, following our meeting with John Howell, MP, he submitted three written questions to the Department of Transport all relating to effective noise barriers at Milton Common. They should have been replied to on 13 November 2008; however we continue to await the response that we will receive via John Howell.

#### **Christmas Crackers**

Celebrate Christmas with plants this year! Use them as decorations inside and out; give them as gifts to friends, family and neighbours. Most of all, enjoy plants and nature this winter, and if your garden falls a little short of perfect, plan some planting now that will lift it for next winter.

Using plants as living decorations helps us to get back to some of the roots of the Christmas celebration. Our ancestors understood the symbolic and practical significance of foliage and berries in the bleak mid-winter and the deep-seated responses that we still have to plants means that wonderful displays awaken in us feelings of comfort and well-being.

Considering plants as "Christmas crackers" also includes giving them as gifts. A beautiful shrub in a stylish pot is a fabulous way of showing you care and anyone with outside space (even a balcony!) will benefit from a gift like this.

What qualities does a plant need to make it great for winter interest or as a living decoration or gift? It must be hardy and attractive, even during the most hostile weather of the year. It must exhibit exciting visual features like colourful foliage and it helps if it's a low maintenance plant because the winter garden really needs to be able to look after itself.

Evergreen Leucothoe species, including Leucothoe SCARLETTA"Zeblid", are an excellent choice. "Zeblid" has beautiful foliage - long, slim, glossy leaves that turn burgundy and bronze in autumn and winter. Although it can reach to between 1 and 2m in height, if it's kept trimmed, it will form a lovely dome-shaped mound and can work very well as a ground cover plant. It thrives in acid soil so if you want to grow it in pots and containers, make sure you use ericaceous compost. A small evergreen shrub such as Leucothoe SCARLETTA planted in a container is excellent for use on a patio, roof terrace or small garden. It can work well as a focal point or as part of a group of containers.

So whether it's to brighten up the dash out of the house in the morning, improve the view from the window or make those forays into the garden on fine days more enjoyable, let's all get more winter interest into our gardens this year. Whatever plants you choose to help you do this, *Leucothoe* SCARLETTA will get you off to a great start.
