Cardiac Arrest Survivor Terry Blake's Story

It was at one of the Friday evening club sessions when I was traversing the length of the pool in the 'Swimmers' lane that I suffered a cardiac arrest and subsequently was seen laying face down in the water without any movement.

The quick response of one of the club members who had been swimming in the same lane put into action a sequence of events that saved my life. I was taken from the water and laid unconscious at the poolside. Cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) was undertaken and the defibrillator at the Brentwood Centre was rushed to the area where defibrillation was applied. When the ambulance arrived they took charge of the situation.

I am thankful to be alive. Today as I enjoy my swimming once again I am forever grateful that the Brentwood Centre had the defibrillator machine and that the members of staff had been trained in its use.

Why do we need AEDs

(Automated External Defibrillators)?

Each year between 80,000 & 120,000 people suffer a cardiac arrest in a public place in the UK.

Cardiac arrest can affect anyone, sometimes even children. Speedy defibrillation saves lives.

Speedy Defibrillation Saves Lives


Having an Automated External Defibrillator (AED) at hand can save lives. An AED is a portable easy to use device that measures the heartbeat via sticky pads attached to the chest. The AED will deliver a shock via these pads to restart the heart if a person suffers cardiac arrest. It guides the operator at every stage giving clear and easy to follow instructions. It is so safe it can be used with only a little training.

Cardiac arrest

This is one of the major causes of death in the UK. It is the sudden severe disturbance of the hearts rhythm (arrhythmia) that stops the heart beating or causes it to beat so slowly or so fast that it cannot pump enough blood to sustain life.

When cardiac arrest occurs defibrillation is the only means of restarting the heart and preventing death.





Jo Smith, Community Defibrillation Officer at the London Ambulance Service, said: "With cardiac arrest it's crucial to get appropriate treatment to the patient as fast as possible. In London we've done a lot of work to reduce time between cardiac arrest and defibrillation, and as a direct result have helped to save more people's lives."
