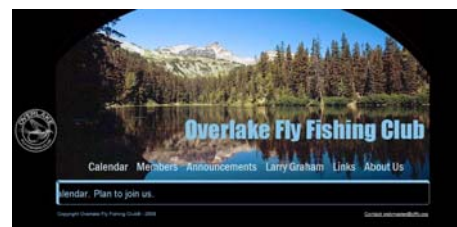

The Hudson Springs outing organized by Ron Romig was an opportunity to fish waters that we had heard about but never gotten the chance to experience. We signed up, cleared our calendars and loaded all our gear in the truck so that we could spend the week-end fishing and

We awoke bright and early to a beautiful sunrise over Sun Lake and a bluebird day that foretold ideal fishing conditions. Ron served up a bountiful breakfast and then we headed off to the lake at a respectable time of 8:30 am. Seems as if the fish at Hudson Springs are very considerate, not being active much before 9:00 am or so. We had a very good day catching and releasing some very impressively sized fish. Even the smaller ones put up quite a show and made the catching very interesting. It was especially interesting to watch other club members' techniques and I learned a lot by watching and asking questions. I must admit that my success with chironomeds improved significantly by talking to and watching some of our experts. We headed back to the lodge in the late afternoon and gathered in the lounge area while Ron cooked up another great dinner. It was a great opportunity to talk technique and look over the patterns that were particularly successful that day. Once again it was an excellent learning experience and in addition I got to learn much more about the depth of experience and background of the members who were there. Sunday was much like the previous day, more learning opportunities, some nice fish and a lot of great companionship. Carol caught one of the largest fish she has boated in the afternoon on Sunday. She now knows a lot more about how to properly fish chironomeds. "Carefully watch that strike indicator!"

The other event we attended was the FFF Conclave in Ellensburg. The event was well organized, another great learning experience and another chance to see the club members involvement in making this conclave a great success. Vern Jeremica and the other OFFC FFF board members were instrumental in organizing this event and their efforts were very obvious. Vern had organized the fly tying demos and Dick Lange organized a fly tying instruction table for beginners that was manned by OFFC members. I saw at least 20 of our members at the conclave and most were participating in either the demonstration tying or at our instruction table. I think that the most fascinating demos that I watched were Joe Kristoff tying his version of a Sculpin fly that he found very successful on the Alagnak and Harry LaMere tying Atlantic Salmon flies with out a vise. I really appreciated listening to Joe's philosophy on what led to his design of his version of the Sculpin pattern. I also was very impressed by Harry's patience as I watched him tie on the wing of the pattern he was building at least 8 times to get it "just right".

I guess that the bottom line of all this is that we get the maximum benefit of being a club member by participating in the club events, learning from other members, sharing in their experiences and enjoying the comradeship that results. From my perspective that is what it is all about.

For the May meeting we will be tying caddis patterns hosted by our expert tiers. Caddis patterns make excellent flies and can be used on many rivers throughout the northwest. If you'd like to see some various patterns, look here on the club web site under "Members", then click the "Fly Tyers' Page" link. Once there, click on the "Search Flytiers page" and type in "caddis" or "deer hair caddis" or whatever, and you'll see lots of different patterns and recipes. Our club tiers will have the best patterns at the meeting, of course!

For beginning tiers, or those who would like to brush up on basic skills or learn better use some of those nifty fly tying tools, Joe Kristof will be there to get you up to speed. Joe is a fantastic tier and a great person to learn from. No tools, or materials are necessary, just bring yourself!

OFFC May Club Meeting – Jim Kerr

Jim Kerr fly fishing the Olympic Peninsula Rivers



Jim Kerr has been fishing, guiding and working on the water his entire life. He has Fly fished extensively in the Northeast Saltwater for Striped Bass and blue fish, in the Florida Keys and Everglades for Snook, Bone Fish, Tarpon, and red fish, and for trout in the American West. He now resides on Washington's Olympic Peninsula where he guides full time for Steelhead, Trout, and Salmon. His guide service has been featured in articles in Northwest Fly Fishing magazine, Western Outdoors magazine, Fly Fishing and Tying Journal

magazine, as well Doug Rose's new book on fly fishing for winter steelhead, "The Color of Winter". He can also be seen from time to time on The Out Door Network, and Northwest Outdoors TV, guiding for anglers such as Skip Morris, and doing fly tying demonstrations of his original fly patterns.

"Every trip I fish is different but my goals are always the same. Catch fish, have fun, relax, and enjoy pristine, natural, uncrowded surroundings. If there is something in particular you want to learn about, let me know. Maybe good beaches for sea-runs, how to cast farther, good presentations for winter steelhead, or hatch timing for Peninsula streams. (If you want me to just shut up and row the damn boat, I can do that too.) I believe that fly-fishing is, at its best, a vehicle for understanding the interconnectedness of natural systems. Trout fishermen must understand the life cycles of insects if they want to capitalize on every streamside opportunity. Winter Steelhead anglers study the drainages they fish to help them predict ever changing water levels and clarity. When we venture out of the rivers and into the salt we realize that we have to follow the movements of baitfish, which are influenced by tides, currents, moon phases and the availability of their prey, plankton, euphasids, barnacle spawn...And on it goes.

Like every great pursuit each hard won answer brings a sense of accomplishment, and reveals a thousand new questions." Good fly-fishing can be a complicated and endless study, or a few hours to forget the rest of the world and loose yourself on a great stretch of river.
