This is a result of Rich's commitment to the program. The improved attendance these two steps have sparked means I see more, and meet more, potential friends at the meetings. Not bad. I don't think I want that to change. But. that is on a personal level.

On an organizational level the AKCA is expected to: "promote education and public awareness in the use, handling, and safety of edged implements, as well as to assist in the development of information regarding aspect knives: everv of knifemaking. collecting. exhibiting. coordination and sponsorship of trade shows and conducting regular meetings." (taken from our by-laws) This is where our Fall Knife Show comes in and the problem as I see it. To "promote education and public awareness...etc." you have to get them through the door. This did not happen this vear at Mesa and seems to be a problem nationwide. At every show I have been to in recent years, attendance has been down. Fewer people are coming out, and those that discriminating in do are more their purchases.

Low attendance does not necessarily mean the show was a "bad show" for all those involved. After reading the responses to the questionnaire Rich sent to the table holders I was surprised how many answered the question "How did you do at the show? (i.e. sales, trades, etc.) "positively. I was also pleasantly surprised by the thoughtful and caring responses to the other questions.

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Election Platform By Gary Fields

My name is Gary Fields and I am running for president of the AKCA. I have been encouraged to get involved in the future direction of the club's activities and Knife Show due to the extremely poor outcome of the 2006 show. The yearly knife show is the club's big event and is an event that almost every one in the club looks forward to. It is a very important event in that it is one of the few chances the knife community in Arizona has to introduce the populace to the art of the knife. While almost everyone knows about knives as practical tools, very few know about the wide-ranging aspects of knives and knife collecting. These include the fascinating history of antique knives, the beauty and workmanship of custom knives and the fact that there are so many very fine makers here in Arizona.

The planning and execution of the AKCA 2006 Show resulted in major disaster for the club. It did not meet the expectations of most of the members and exhibitors, the "customers" of club management. Many of the exhibitors have said they will not participate again. I can tell you that this is the worst AKCA show I have seen. In 2003 I became vice-president of the club under the Presidency of Mike Mooney. He had been working on improving the AKCA show for a couple of years. The 2003 show was a wonderful show and was the first event I had ever seen where so many people were so happy with the outcome. The vendors, purveyors, makers, and attendees wholeheartedly proclaimed the show one of the best they have ever attended and looked forward to the 2004 show. New members were joining at every meeting. The amount of monies available to put on the Club Show was growing. Building on that success, the 2004 and 2005 shows were also fairly successful. continued

In 2006 the current administration took over management of the AKCA and the Knife Show. Rich Hale, President, and his administration moved the club meetings to a better location, which I feel was a good move, and the meetings seemed to improve. The AKCA Knife show was to say the least a very expensive flop. Attendance was at an all time low and for the first time the vendors were so upset that some of them left on Saturday. The raffles held at the show made very little money compared to past years. The club brochures were made available so late (at the October meeting) it gave insufficient time for the members to distribute them, and as a result, generated very little attendance. The advertising was very ineffective. The main raffle, which always brought in a fair amount of funds, fell off drastically because the tickets were distributed so late.

Because it has been made very difficult for members to see the financial reporting, we have no idea as to the solvency of the organization. One of my main worries is what can be done to rebuild and fund future shows that will meet member and table holder expectations. This is one of the areas we need to focus on in 2007.

What I want to accomplish, as president of the club, is to build a management team that will meet the expectations of the AKCA membership Members have expressed to me the hope that we can rebuild the AKCA and make the AKCA Show a success again. The first thing I want to do is open up the leadership to a broad range of people. I will suggest a few members for the board and hope others will run for these posts. I will also consider all suggestions from the membership. The leadership of the club will be based on the bylaws with the board members having a say as to how the club is run. My goal is to understand club members' expectations and meet them.

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We will execute club functions in a professional manner that is open to all members. I will make sure the preparation for next years show starts immediately after the election. I will also publish the condition of the clubs finances as soon as possible.

•We will prepare a simple brochure to be passed out at the various knife shows that our members attend.

•We will commit to buying advertising in the various knife magazines and publications (as funds become available).

•One of my plans is to get tables at all the major gun shows held in the state and let people know we exist and there is a knife show in the future.

•We will try to get exposure at the various sporting clubs in the state.

•We will submit our show dates to all show lists, on line forums, and community bulletin boards that we can.

•We will get the knives for the Show raffle and create the raffle tickets and brochure by mid-summer.

•We will explore new venues for the show, if not the 2007 show possibly the 2008 show. •We will build on the goodwill created in the 2003 show and try to convince the vendors to come back and give us another try under the new administration.

•Another thing I would like to see is small satellite shows in Tucson, Flagstaff, Prescott, and Payson. This may not be possible until the future because of lack of funds, but when we get the club solvent again we will consider the small shows.

•At the meetings there will be a financial statement available for the members to peruse and a state of the club finances will, if possible, be published in the monthly newsletter.

•We will update the web site and will attempt to add services to the web site for the general membership. continued •I have discussed board membership with the following people and they have said they will run for office. Jim Ort (vice-president), Dan Zvonek (board member), John Brown (board member), and Mike Mooney (board member). Mike Mooney has also agreed to become the show coordinator for the 2007 show. Dave Ammons has agreed to continue on as newsletter editor.

Please vote for my team and me and for the future of the Club at the January election meeting. My team will work hard to make the club and show a success. We need your support and involvement to make these things happen.

Knife Handle Materials by B. R. Hughes

Let's face it. A knife handle can be made out of virtually anything, including kitchen linoleum! There are, however a number of other materials that are more suitable, and the would-be purchaser of today's handmade beauties is often asked for his preference at the time of placing the order.

Very quickly it must be emphasized that there is no ideal handle material. Indeed, in my modest collection of custom cutlery can be included most of the more commonly encountered hardwoods, the various micartas, ivory, stag, oosic, etc., and there is generally something to be said for each. Conversely, not one is perfect.

If you start asking around, you will soon discover that the majority of today's bladesmiths do not like synthetic handle materials. Thus, if micarta is your number one choice, you may have to shop around for a maker if you opt for a forged blade. There are also cutlers who will not make handles from mother of pearl, because of the hazards presented by the dust when grinding and polishing. The recent action on elephant ivory may soon remove one of the more desirable materials from the option list, although some makers are already switching to Wooly Mammoth ivory as a substitute.

It is difficult to find a great deal of fault with hardwoods such as cocobolo, rosewood, ebony, etc. Handles made from such woods feel extraordinarily good in my hand and hardwoods are relatively low in cost and are also easy for the maker to shape. Whenever the subject of Bowie knives comes up in my presence, I generally interject the knowledge that John Johnson, better known as... continued "Liver-eatin" Johnson carried an English-made Bowie with a rosewood handle.

Stag is a beautiful handle material. It is becoming more and more costly. Stag has its charm from the rough texture of its surface. This can also make it hard to use. For using knives the stag must be carefully chosen.

It is tough to cast brickbats at micarta. The stuff is almost unbreakable, and it is relatively inexpensive. For a tough, heavy duty knife, I don't know of anything better. Of the various micartas, I have found that paper micarta is probably the weakest, although it is still exceptionally rugged, and to my eyes very attractive. Linen and denim micarta are both tough, and either of these would be a wise choice for a combat-survival knife. One of the more appealing aspects of micarta is that it can be had in many colors, tan, black, red, green, etc. It will shrink, not as much as wood or ivory but it will shrink.

This brings me to the "exotics". Some are quite good. Caribou antler is very good indeed. I don't like the look of moose horn but it should also be good. Oosic is not pretty but is novel and therefore popular. Many stones; jade, agate, petrified wood, turquoise and others make good looking handles. Most are too heavy and of course too slick for a working knife. Bone is not as popular on handmade knives as it is on folders, why, nobody knows.

A closing tip: Spend at least as much time and thought on the handle material to be used on your next custom knife as you do on the blade material. The handle generally receives too little attention until it is too late.
