Dutch Oven Cook-Off - Recap

e had a great turn-out for the annual February member meeting and Dutch Oven Cook-Off at Cascade River Gear. This year, the top three finishers received cash prizes (and a year's worth of bragging rights) of \$100, \$75 and \$50, for the first, second, and third favorite dishes. In addition, a donation jar was passed around collecting money for all of our chefs to help offset some of the personal cost that is incurred by volunteering to participate in this very popular IWA event.

It was an extremely close competition due to the amount of incredible dishes served. Most of us had a difficult time narrowing down whose dish we liked the most. A huge thank you to all of our chefs. Without you, this event would not be as wonderful as it is!

Here are the winning recipes from our top 3 contenders.



Chile Verde Tacos with Cilantro Lime Relish Robert Fehlau

Ingredients:

5 pounds boneless pork loin, chopped into three-quarter inch cubes.

Seasoning mix:

- 1 Tbsp. onion powder
- 2 Tbsp. ground Mexican oregano
- 1 Tbsp. ground cayenne pepper
- 1 Tbsp. smoked paprika
- 1 Tbsp. ground cumin

1 Tbsp. coarse kosher salt 3/4 Tbsp. ground black pepper

Seasoning mix - mix all ingredients together, then add to meat, tossing in large bowl. This can also be prepped at home and placed into Ziploc bags.

Directions:

Put 12 briquettes under Dutch
Heat 2 tablespoons vegetable oil in a 12 inch Dutch oven.
Crosscut thickly sliced bacon into quarter inch pieces
Cook bacon in Dutch until translucent.
Add seasoned pork cubes
Brown until slightly crispy.

Add:

2-30 ounce cans of gold hominy drained of liquid

2-7 ounce cans of mild diced green roasted chilies

2-7 ounce cans of salsa verde

1- 12 ounce can of Tecate beer

Cover and place 10 briquettes on top. Simmer for 1 hour.

Cilantro / Lime Relish Topping

Two bunches fresh cilantro finely chopped.

- 1 large yellow onion finely chopped.
- 1-7 ounce can of chunky red salsa of your choice.
- 1 teaspoon ground cumin
- 1 teaspoon ground oregano
- 1/2 teaspoon salt

Juice from 3 squeezed limes

1 - 12 ounce package of prepared guacamole.

Serve pork on warm yellow corn tortillas. Top with shredded sharp cheddar cheese.



Ingredients:

3 lb. sausage
30 oz. corkscrew noodles (cooked)
36 oz. Alfredo sauce
½ onion
1 Red bell pepper
10 cloves garlic
** 2 jalapenos
** 1 jar bacon jam
** for spicy version

Directions:

Brown sausage. Add onion, pepper, and garlic. Continue cooking until tender. ** If you are making the spicy version, add the jalapenos and bacon jam. Add Alfredo sauce and noodles.

Stir to coat.

Cook for 30 minutes in Dutch oven at 350 degrees.





Dutch Oven Blueberry Cinnamon Rolls

Ingredients:

2 tubes refrigerator big cinnamon rolls with icing

Filling:

1 pint blueberries

3 Tbsp. granulated sugar

2 Tbsp. cornstarch

2 tsps. fresh lemon juice

1 tsp. lemon zest

3/4 cup water

Directions:

Coat the Dutch oven in non-stick cooking spray, you can also line the Dutch with tin foil and coat with non-stick spray.

For the filling, use the Dutch oven to combine the blueberries, sugar, and cornstarch. Stir in lemon juice, lemon zest, and water. Cook over a full spread of coals, stirring often, until mixture begins to thicken slightly. Remove from heat and allow to cool.

Unroll each individual cinnamon roll. Place 2 spoonful's of blueberry filling on the strip of cinnamon roll dough and re-roll the dough back into the cinnamon roll shape.

Place all 10 blueberry filled cinnamon rolls inside. Cook for 25 minutes, or until cinnamon rolls are cooked through. Remove Dutch oven from heat.

Drizzle cinnamon rolls with icing. Serve warm.

These savings almost cover the cost of your yearly membership to the IWA! Life Flight Network is a nationally recognized, not for profit air medical service with 16 bases in Idaho, Oregon, Washington, and Montana. If EMS or healthcare providers determine that air medical transport is needed, your membership protects you and your family from having any out-of-pockets expenses. Life Flight Network works directly with your insurance company for their portion of the payment, and the rest is covered by your membership. Drysuits Don't Make You Bulletproof

Drysuits are a wonderful innovation for boaters. They have been used by divers for decades, but models suitable for kayakers, rafters and canoeists have only become popular in the last 15 years. Breathable fabrics, double tunnel designs, built-in socks, relief zippers and competitive pricing have caused more and more boaters to move up to a drysuit for cold-water protection.

And the breathable drysuit is a wonderful protective garment. It keeps water away from your body core and limbs, allowing

you to add and subtract insulating layers so you stay comfortable and warm. The US Coast Guard requires them for their small boat crews when water temperatures are 50°F or lower. They are definitely life-saving devices.

Talking to NRS customers and reading recent posts in various boating forums, I see many boaters singing the praises of the drysuit.

- "Greatest investment I've ever made!"
- "My drysuit has opened up more months of boating for me."
- "I don't know how I ever did without a drysuit."

All true and I can say "ditto" to each of those statements. However, I'm led to also give the cautionary warning, "A drysuit doesn't make you bulletproof."

My concern is that feeling the warmth and protection that a drysuit gives us can lead to overreaching the limits of our skills and equipment. Something that happened almost a year ago still nags at the edge of my mind. Some time back, I wrote about a mid-March trip several of us took on the Hells Canyon stretch of the Snake River, where it cuts between Idaho and Oregon. We drove through snow to the put-in, and while it only rained on us along the river, snow coated the canyon walls above. The water was frigid. At Granite Rapid, Paco and I chose to run right into the center hole in the rapid. I thought later, and still think, we wouldn't have made that choice had we not been wearing high-end NRS drysuits. While the hole looked clean, and we made it through fine, I don't think we would have chanced a flip had we been less protected against the cold.

We've written a number of <u>safety articles</u> for the e-News, and called out some of the more relevant ones on this page's *Related Articles* section. Take a look at them for good advice on all the other safety considerations a wise boater adopts. These articles and others stress the broad range of considerations you'll be wise to consider. They'll help keep you and your boating companion's safe when you venture out on the water, no matter what the season.

My charge to you is this: by all means, add a drysuit to your gear bag. It will open new horizons to your boating life. And it may save your life. It will certainly increase your comfort level. *However*, merely look at it as one piece of your boating safety arsenal.
