BOAR'S HEAD New Nature Preserve in Milledgeville Celebrated

One of the last remaining undeveloped parcels in Milledgeville has been designated as the 30th Nature Preserve of the Nature Trust of New Brunswick.

Those familiar with the Ragged Point/Boars Head area of Milledgeville will know that residents, local environmentalists and several politicians have been seeking protection of the green space in the area for many years. This 27 hectare preserve extends behind the Ecole Samuel de Champlain towards the St. John River. It protects a stretch of undeveloped shore on the St. John River consisting of rocky cliffs and a small sandy beach that can serve as a great stop-over point for recreational kayakers or canoeists.

Even though this property lies within the City of Saint John, there is notable ecological value as determined by botanists and the NB Department of Natural Resources. A small population of Anticosti Aster that is presently listed under the Provincial Endangered Species Act as "at risk" and under the Federal Species at Risk Act as "threatened" exists on this land.

The land was donated to the Trust by the Department of Supply and Services. The donation of funds necessary for the stewardship of this property was supplied by a resident, Mr. John Irving. In making their gift, the Department of Supply and Services and Mr. Irving envisage a nature preserve with rugged walking trails providing future environmental education opportunities for local schools and citizens.

The Nature Trust is in the process of developing an action plan outlining tasks and projects that will be completed this year. Some of these include public meetings, partnership development with the local educational institutions, a trail system study and other public events.

The Nature Trust's Board of Directors will hold their meeting in the vicinity of this property on May 8, 2010 and they are inviting the public to join them on a walk through the

A WORD FROM THE PRESIDENT

Having been elected at the September 2009 Annual Meeting of the Nature Trust, this is my first report to you as President. I join with all Members in thanking Ken Hirtle for his leadership over the past two years, and also for Co-Chairing, with Jessie Davies, the *Campaign for Coastal Lands*

I also wish to take special note of the fact that Bill Anderson has replaced John St. Pierre as Treasurer. John brought improved reporting to the Trust's accounts at the same time as the Campaign for Coastal Lands was in full flight. But we need also to get the Trust on a more regular financial footing. We have been running a growing organization and portfolio of land holdings

largely on the strength of project funding.

In addition to building our endowment fund, we are embarking on a partnership funding initiative in which we will be asking a select number of companies and organizations with an affinity to one or other of our holdings or focus regions to become supporters on a multi-year basis. We look forward to developing greater support for the Trust's expanding program of acquisitions and stewardship.

POTENTIAL IMPACTS OF CLIMATE CHANGE AND SEA-LEVEL RISE ON NATURE

Over the winter season NTNB Intern Stephanie Boulton completed a report examining possible outcomes of climate change and predicted sealevel rise on properties of the Nature Trust. Both the Governments of Canada and New Brunswick have observed that green house gas induced climate change is already causing environmental alterations in New Brunswick. The predicted impacts of climate change over the next century include more frequent storm surges, rising air temperatures, delayed species migration, as well as affecting the habitats of our preserves. The worldwide mean sea level is expected to rise over 60 cm in the next century, considerably impacting the coastline of the Bay of Fundy where many of the Trust's nature preserves are located.

Stephanie's report highlights measures that need to be considered and implemented in the coming decades in order for our organization to adapt to climate change. The Trust hopes to implement these manage-

ment recommendations to stay ahead of global climate trends.

COASTAL CAMPAIGN UPDATE

Since last reporting on the Campaign for Coastal Lands, whose its goals the conservation of 375 acres of undisturbed coastal habitat and 3km of Passamaquoddy Bay, two additional coastal properties have been protected.

With the help of the Nature Conservancy of Canada and volunteer Hayward Aiton, the Trust purchased 51 acres at the mouth of Birch Cove, thus protecting critical forest and shorefront at the outlet of Sam Orr's Pond. In December, landowners John L., John S.L. and Robert Williamson of St. Andrews, donated a conservation easement on land at the tip of Navy Island. The 'forever-wild' easement ensures the sanctity of the natural environment while maintaining inspiring, unspoiled views of the Island from St. Andrews.

We thank the Williamsons for their generous gift, and volunteer lawyers Steve Christie and Bruce Hatfield for their assistance.

These two parcels bring campaign conservation gains to a total of 260 acres, or 70% of our goal. We expect the balance of the land to be conserved by May, 2010, thanks to our many donors and gifts from loyal members. A number of events are in the planning stages to celebrate and thank those who have given, sometimes several times, to this major campaign. --MS

SPECIES-AT-RISK

over the past few months, the NTNB has been conducting landowner outreach in order to conserve the habitats with Species-at-Risk. The Maritime Ringlet butterfly is present only in the salt marshes of the Chauler Bay and many landowners received an informational brochure about its existence.

The Cobblestone Tiger Beetle appears in only nine isolated sites in New Brunswick on islands in the St. John River Valley; the closest known habitat is over 500 miles away in the United States

Butternut canker is endangering Butternut trees all across its range. We have been educating landowners on how to monitor for canker and help stop the spread of this invasive disease.

Thanks to past conservation efforts there are now 15 Peregrine Falcon nesting sites in New Brunswick. However, protecting these sites and their habitat is still crucial to their survival.

Furbish's Lousewort, is a unique plant of the snap dragon family found exclusively in the Upper St. John River Valley, the NTNB has been continuing communication with landowners since 2005 about preserving the lousewort and other rare plants in this region.

The Nature Trust also initiated public education outreach about the significance of the Upper Bay of Fundy through several articles that were published in the Sackville Tribune and Times and Moncton Times and Transcript. --SB/RW
