## Rational for new SAT

1. To make the SAT even more consistent with curriculum and instructional practices in high school and college.
2. To help colleges make better admissions/placement decisions by providing a third measure – writing skills.
3. To reinforce the importance of writing skills throughout a student’s education.

**Mathematics** – The change: Add content for Third-Year College-Preparatory Math and Eliminate Quantitative Comparisons.

Increase Alignment with Curriculum and Admissions expectations

- 70 % of all high school students finish Algebra II (3-4) by the end of their Junior year
- 97% of college bound students complete 3 years of math and 69% complete 4 or more years of math
- Most 4-year colleges require 3 years of math

# The New SAT (continued)

## The New Writing Component – Multiple Choice: Grammar and Usage, Student-Written Essay

Improve predictive validity and encourages writing in schools

### Short Essay

- Measures students' ability to develop and support a position on a topic. Students must first analyze the topic and consider their own viewpoint on it, then support their position with reasoning and examples taken from their reading, studies, experience, or observations.
- The essay will be similar to the type of on demand college writing that is typically read by the professor as a first draft.

### Multiple-Choice

- Measures students' ability to recognize errors, improve sentences, and improve paragraphs within a writing context.

### Scoring will be based on procedures for the current SAT Subject Test in Writing

- Scored by trained high school teachers and college professors
- Each test is scored independently by two readers on a 1-6 scale according to a scoring guide.
- Essays will be scanned and distributed to readers via the Web.
- Essay will be scored holistically
  - Each reader will award a score according to the overall quality of the Essay
  - They will take into account designated aspects of writing, such as the development of ideas, supporting examples, organization, word choice, and sentence structure

## Renaissance Fast Facts

Q: What is Renaissance?

A: It is a program that recognizes academic excellence.

Q: How?

A: Students who are eligible will receive a gold or silver card (based upon GPA). These cards can be used for:

- Discounts on student parking (Gold only)
- Discounts on selected student activities
- Discounts at local malls
- Student give-aways
- One final exam exemption (Gold only)
- Reduced admission to sponsor-selected, administration approved activities

Q: What are the qualifications to receive a card?



Over 800 Gold and Silver Cards were recently distributed to sophomores, juniors and seniors in their third hour class.

A: Must be a full-time Desert Vista student for at least one semester

- Gold: GPA of 3.833-4.00 or 1.0 increase\*
- Silver: GPA of 3.677-3.832 or 0.5 increase\*

\*(increase between 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> quarter of the 2003-04 school year)

Q: Based on semester or quarter grades?

A: Quarter grades. We are using 4<sup>th</sup> quarter GPA, not semester, based on enrollment in six credit and grade bearing classes.

Didn't get a card and think you should have? Check your second semester, 2003-2004 report card under MARKING PERIOD 4. If there has been an error, see Mrs. Lyon in the Counseling office. No new cards will be issued after December 1, 2004.

Q: I am a brand new student to Desert Vista, or I am a freshman. Why didn't I get a card?

A: You must be a full time Desert Vista student for one semester before you are eligible for a card.

Q: When will cards be distributed again?

A: In January 2005, based upon 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter grades.

## National Merit Scholarship Semifinalists

Semifinalists in the 50th annual National Merit Scholarship program were announced in September and included six students from Desert Vista. **Jennifer Lee, Jacqueline McAndrew, Matthew Petterson, Robert Stout, Stephanie Tzeng and Philip Wang** were among the 16,000 scholastically talented high school seniors who have an opportunity to continue in the competition for some 8,200

Merit Scholarship awards, worth \$33.9 million, that will be offered next spring.

To be considered for a Merit Scholarship award, Semifinalists must fulfill several requirements and advance to the Finalist level of the competition. About 90 percent of the Semifinalists are expected

to become Finalists, and approximately half of the Finalist will be selected as


## Site Based Council

# Annual Notice to Parents Regarding Confidentiality

Confidentiality of education records is a right of public school students and their parents. This right is provided for by two federal laws, the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA), and the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA). Under these laws, “education records” means those records that are: (1) directly related to a student; and (2) maintained by an educational agency or institution or by a party acting for the agency or institution. Of course, education records are maintained by an educational agency or institution or by a party acting for the agency or institution. Of course, education records are maintained on every school enrolled in a public school. The types of information gathered and maintained includes, but is not limited to: the student’s and parent’s names, address and telephone number; the student’s date and place of birth, date of enrollment in the school, records from previous schools attended, attendance record, subjects taken, grades, school activities, assessment results, number of credits earned, immunization records, disciplinary records, if any, correspondence from parents, and child find and other screening results, including hearing and vision screening results.

In addition, for children with disabilities, education records could include, among other things, evaluation and testing materials, medical and health information, each annual Individualized Education Program (IEP), notices to parents, notes regarding IEP meetings, parental consent documents, information provided by parents, progress reports, assessment results, materials related to disciplinary actions, and mediation agreements.

The information is gathered from a number of sources including the student’s parents and staff of the school of attendance. Also, with parental permission, information may be gathered from additional sources including doctors and other health care providers.

This information is collected to assure proper identification of a student and the student’s parents and the maintenance of accurate records of the student’s progress and activities in school. For children

with disabilities, additional information is collected in order to assure the child is identified, evaluated, and provided a Free Appropriate Public Education in accordance with state and federal special education laws.

Each agency participating under Part B of IDEA must assure that at all stages of gathering, storing, retaining and disclosing education records to third parties that it complies with the federal confidentiality laws. In addition, the destruction of any education records of a child with a disability must be in accordance with IDEA regulatory requirements.

The federal Family Policy Compliance Office of the U.S. Department of Education has provided the following notice of parent’s rights under FERPA. In accordance with IDEA, the rights of the parents regarding education records are transferred to the student at age 18.

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) affords parents and students over 18 years of age (“eligible students”) certain rights with respect to the student’s education records. They are:

1. The right to inspect and review the student’s education records within 45 days of the day the school receives a request for access. Parents or eligible students should submit to the school principal (or appropriate school official) a written request that identifies the record(s) they wish to inspect. The principal will make arrangements for access and notify the parent or eligible student of the time and place where the records may be inspected.
2. The right to request the amendment of the student’s education records that the parent or eligible student believes are inaccurate or misleading. Parents or eligible students may ask a school district to amend a record that they believe is inaccurate or misleading. They should write the school principal, clearly identify the part of the record they want changed, and specify why it is inac-

curate or misleading. If the school decides not to amend the record as requested by the parent or eligible student, the school will notify the parent or eligible student of the decision and advise them of their right to a hearing regarding the request for amendment. Additional information regarding the hearing procedures will be provided to the parent or eligible student when notified of the right to a hearing.

3. The right to consent to disclosures of personally identifiable information contained in the student’s education records, except to the extent that FERPA authorizes disclosure without consent. One exception which permits disclosure without consent is disclosure to school officials with legitimate educational interests. A school official is a person employed by the school as an administrator, supervisor, instructor, or support staff member (including health or medical staff and law enforcement unit personnel); a person serving on the school board; a person or company with whom the school has contracted to perform a special task (such as attorney, auditor, medical consultant, or therapist); or a parent or student serving on an official committee, such as a disciplinary or grievance committee, or assisting another school official in performing his or her tasks. A school official has a legitimate educational interest if the official needs to review an education record in order to fulfill his or her professional responsibility. Upon request, a school may disclose education records, without consent, to officials of another school district which a student seeks or intends to enroll, if the school states in its annual notification of FERPA rights that it forwards records on request.
4. The right to file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education concerning alleged failures by a school to comply with the requirements of FERPA. The name and address of the office that administers FERPA

A school may designate information in education records as "directory

information" and may disclose it without parent consent, unless notified that the school is not to disclose the information without consent. The law defines "directory information" as follows:  
The student's name, address, telephone listing, date and place of birth, major field of study, participation in officially recognized activities and sports, weight and height of mem-

bers of athletic teams, dates of attendance, degrees and awards received, and the most recent previous educational agency or institution attended by the student.  
Notice of these rights is available, upon request, on audiotape, in Braille, and in languages other than English. You may contact the Arizona Department of Education at 602-542-3111.

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**NPLB (No Parent Left Behind) University** will offer a wide variety of parent and teen workshops throughout the 2004-2005 school year.
