
I've attached a picture snapped yesterday by my wife, Paula, at our home at Moss

Creek, near Hilton Head, South Carolina. That's me on the left and on the right, Chico Kieswetter, Bushy Park class of 1956. We were just getting together after 50 years. Some highlights from our conversation:

- 1. Chico recalled getting into a basketball game and blowing his first chance to score—by dribbling too far underneath the basket. But probably he did that because he was so happy with his ball handling skills after Coach Cannon made him practice.
- 2. He did not remember Harold Dilley spraining his ankle and going on crutches to the '56 tournament in Blozis Hall, Frankfurt,

- because Chico's dad took the family back to the states sometime that winter—in late January.
- 3. He did want to get in touch with Harold and I told him that I talked by phone with Harold a while back—at his home somewhere in rural Maryland where he has gone to retire after a career as a Washington, D.C., police officer.
- 4. Chico remembered Tom Quist vividly—as I did—and wondered if anyone knows what happened to him. We both remembered Quist doing crazy things like standing outside the classrooms at Bushy Park with school going on --- Dickinson's or Hynes-Threlkeld's English class, we thought and doing things like leaning in the window and giving everyone a raspberry.
- 5. We both remembered Byron "Reb"
  Williams and wondered what happened to him. What I remember most vividly about Byron was how he identified with James Dean. That was right after "Rebel Without a Cause" and "East of Eden" had come out but before Dean killed himself in his Porsche.
- 6. Six Degrees of Separation department: it turns out that Chico and my Paula were classmates in grade school and junior high in Manhasset, Long Island. Chico didn't finish at Manhasset High because he left to come to Bushy Park but the family left, as I mentioned, before he graduated and he finally got out of high school by attending a prep school. His dad worked for U.S. Rubber—he wasn't military.
- 7. When I told Chico that my twin sister,
  Margery McFarland, lives in Mill Valley,
  California, he asked me if she ever owned a
  horse and when I said, yes, she did, we
  started in on people we might both know
  who also own horses and live in Mill Valley.
  It turns out that Chico knows a few. So now
  I'm going to find out if Margery knows any
  of them as well.

That's about all I've got for now. I will send this on to Chico and let him add anything but go ahead and use this in your next edition.

## BICYCLING EUROPE ON \$1.00 A DAY:

A Cold War Geographic and Cultural Memoir

Chapter 14 - August, Bergen, Norway

The next morning I toured around downtown Bergen, bought a replacement brake cable, and went to the dock where the ferry would take me to Newcastle. The bad news was that all tickets to Newcastle were sold, and I would need to check every day for a space available ticket. Very bad news, because I was out of money. Plus, they told me I would be lucky if I got out of Bergen in a week.

What had happened was this: I had budgeted \$1.00 per day between cities, and \$3.00 per day in those cities (Copenhagen, Stockholm, Oslo, etc.). First, I think \$4.00 per day would have been more appropriate in the big cities, and second, I spent more time in the big cities than I had originally intended.

After checking around at the dock, and talking with various people, I wound up at a local trucking company asking for work. I was tall, and confident I could handle anything they might offer. When no

one spoke English, I asked if anyone spoke German. At that point they quickly offered me a job as "second driver" to work with a driver that spoke German. He was clearly disliked by the other drivers. As it turned out, he was a Quisling, who cooperated with the Nazis during the war. No one else would ride or work with him. During the week I rode with him, I truly think he was happy to have the company, and the help. We went all over Bergen moving furniture, canned goods, boxes of fish, and concrete products. I checked with the ferry every day on the way to my campsite on the fiord, bought a fresh salmon steak, and picked up my earnings. Altogether, I made about \$50.00, which was a lot of money in those days.

From Wikipedia (edited by the author):

Quisling, after Norwegian fascist politician Vidkun Quisling, is a term used to describe traitors and collaborators. It was most commonly used for individuals and groups which cooperated with Axis occupiers in World War II.

In Norway local, non-German, fascist parties took part in the conquest of the country.

In contemporary usage, "Quisling" is synonymous with "traitor," and particularly applied to politicians who appear to favor the interests of other nations or cultures over their own.

I managed to keep most of my earnings so that after a week, when I finally got a ticket to Newcastle, I boarded the overnight ferry with enough money to eat well onboard, even though I was sleeping on the deck.

My next destination was Edinburgh, by way of Newcastle where a check waited for me. The Festival of Edinburgh was going on.

## It is that time again for the Bushy Park Central High School

Gathering 2008 and the Class of 1958 50<sup>th</sup> Reunion October 10<sup>th</sup>, 11<sup>th</sup>, and 12<sup>th</sup> 2008

We have reviewed several locations and hotels and have selected the Dallas / Fort Worth area. As you may not know, Texas has the second highest number of residents that attended Bushy Park. So expect all of them to be there.

Page two of this letter will provide you with the hotel selection and phone number for you to call for reservations. When you call <u>PLEASE</u> inform the operator that you are with the Central High School, London group. That will get you the special rate we have negotiated.

The hotel we have selected is the Marriott Dallas/Fort Worth Airport South. It is a primarily a businessman hotel during the week. The room rates are normally \$239 a night. We have worked it out with the Hotel, and with our large group, we will get the same rooms for \$99.00 a night.

In accordance with Marriott International, the DFW Airport Marriott South is now 100% Non Smoking in all guest rooms, meeting space, public areas, restaurants and bars.

The committee selected this hotel for it's location. It is only 4 miles from DFW Airport and offers complimentary 24-hour Airport shuttle service. It is only 12 miles to Dallas and 15 miles to Fort Worth. South on state 360 from the hotel 12 to 15 miles is Interstate 20. There are 3 high rated RV Parks just east or west on Interstate 20. (see page 4 for listings)

Reservations are your responsibility. The last day to reserve your room is <u>September 5<sup>th</sup></u>. We have a block of 75 rooms set aside. The hotel has 295 guest rooms so we can go over the 75 rooms and receive the same rate. However, after <u>September 5<sup>th</sup></u> you will not get the group rate.

Please make reservations early if you plan on attending. If for some reason you cannot attend, you may cancel your reservation with 72-hour notice.

The schedule of events is as follows. Friday Oct. 10 is arrival. Saturday Oct. 11<sup>th</sup> we have reserved a banquet/hospitality room from 8:00 am to 5:00 pm. The Class of 1958 is having a special dinner planned outside of the hotel Saturday night. Information will be provided by their committee. ## Luncheon and operation costs


