

Manager's Message A Quick Review

he year of 2013 is about to come to an end and I hope everyone has had a successful and safe year.

As a member/owner of Big Horn REA, your cooperative has had a successful year in many ways. In the past year we have connected an additional 62 electric services bringing the total of electric services to 3,693. Our total kWh sales for 2013 are estimated to be 133,000,000 which show a very slight increase over the 2012 sales.

Additional items marking a successful year are: tested over 2,600 poles for structural integrity; provided scholarships and education opportunities for our youth; held district board meetings in Meeteetse, Ten Sleep, and Burlington to inform and educate our members; held five area meetings to meet with members regarding possible future electric requirements; made donations to community projects from unclaimed capital credits; refunded \$650,000 in capital credits; had a positive financial audit report; built a high voltage safety demonstration unit that was used at the Big Horn County Fair, several schools and fire districts: completed the 34.5kV tie line between the Basin area and the Greybull substation; begun work on a new Grevbull substation to upgrade and replace the system's oldest substation; and our employees had no lost-time accidents - to mention just some of the accomplishments.

Every day, Big Horn strives to

provide our members with safe and reliable power and excellent member service with our dedicated employees. Your board of directors is very diligent in reviewing outage causes and times of outages. Thus far in 2013 our outage time has decreased from the times recorded in 2012 and 2011. One of our primary causes of outages still remains trees coming in contact with lines. Big Horn has again allocated resources to remove trees so that the costs to members related to outages and liability issues can be reduced and minimized. This tree removal program has proven to be successful.

Speaking of costs, Big Horn does attempt to manage costs and expenses (continued on page 3)

A Year of SAVING

G ot cabin fever this winter? Spend time making your home more energy efficient and start saving for your summer vacation!

You can trim your electric bill all year long by taking a few simple steps. Here's a list of Big Horn REA's recommendations for year-round energy and money savings!

January: Lowering your thermostat just a few degrees during winter months can save as much as \$85 per year. Programmable thermostats make it easy to save by offering preprogrammed settings to regulate a home's temperature throughout the year.

February: Adjust your water heater. Turning down the temperature gauge to below 120 degrees Fahrenheit can heat up your savings.

March: Stop air from escaping your home and money from escaping your wallet! Head down to your home's basement and seal those leaky ducts.

April: A little caulk can go a long way. Air leaks in your home add up. Caulking cracks and openings to the outside could save more than \$200 a year.

May: Make sure your refrigerator is on your spring cleaning to-do list. Throw out expired items, clean the refrigerator inside and out, and check the temperature gauge. For maximum operating efficiency, a refrigerator's temperature should be between 37 and 40 degrees Fahrenheit.

June: When was the last time you changed a filter? Replacing furnace and air conditioner filters regularly can have a big impact on a home's energy use. Dirty filters can restrict air flow and reduce the overall efficiency of your cooling system, forcing it to work harder on hot summer days.

July: Your home's cooling costs can

skyrocket-right along with the temperature outside-during summer months. Keeping your thermostat set between 78 and 80 degrees Fahrenheit can save up to 8 percent on monthly cooling bills.

August: Heading out of town on vacation? Be sure to unplug all of your electronic devices like computers, monitor, printers, TV and cable boxes, DVD players, and microwaves. Electronics with digital displays and instant-on features consume energy even if they're not in use.

September: Be a "fan-atic." While they don't replace an air conditioner or a heat pump, fans move the air so everyone feels more comfortable. On a milder day, a fan is a much more energy-efficient choice than cranking up the air conditioning. Fans cool people, not rooms, so turn them off when you leave.

October: Get ready for winter by insulating your attic. Adding nine or more inches of insulation could save you more than \$150 a year.

November: As the weather cools down, pull up your window shades. Keeping blinds open during cold weather lets heat from sunlight


in, reducing the need to turn up your home's thermostat.

December: Put a new ENERGY STAR appliance at the top of your Christmas wish list. Upgrading appliances like washing machines to ENERGY STARrated models can save up to \$140 per year.
