

"Food With a Farmer's Face: Community Supported Agriculture, Local Food, and Place."

In recent years, Americans have become increasingly interested in where their food comes from, and growth in interest in locally produced food has grown dramatically as a result. One of the outgrowths of this has been the rise in Community Supported Agriculture, or CSA. In a CSA, members pay farmers an annual membership fee. In turn, they get a share of the harvest throughout the growing season. But, as this talk will discuss, members obtain much more than food in the process. Dr. Steven M. Schnell, a native of Norman, Oklahoma, is a professor in the Geography Department at Kutztown University where he has taught since 2002. After completing his PhD at the University of Kansas he was on the faculty at Northwest Missouri State University. At Kutztown University he teaches courses in cultural geography, globalization, the geography of the US and Canada and the geography of Sub-Saharan Africa. His published research includes a variety of cultural geography studies, with his current research interest focusing on the creation of local economies in an age of globalization, with an emphasis on sustainable, local agriculture.

REVISITING HOT TOPICS PRESENTATION ON COLUMBUS DAY

On Monday, October 14, Darree Sicher, Founder of *United Sludge Free Alliance*, discussed "Agriculture, Communities and Rural Environments (ACRE)", known as Act 38 of 2005. The Act was to protect family protect family farms from municipal laws that would interfere with traditional farming practices. Darree touched base with me recently.

"I want to thank you again for having me speak with your League of Women Voters about the ACRE issue." Darree is interested in speaking to other LWV groups or any other organization who might be interested in the many twists and turns of the sewage sludge issue. "I used the outline of my program with you to pitch a presentation about the ACRE issue to the PA Progressive Summit - hopefully they will be interested in the issue."

Darree promised attendees on October 14 that she would be sending out information about this and related issues. Below, Darree mentions CSAs or Community Supported Agriculture.

COMMENT EXTENDED TO FRIDAY, NOV 22nd! Food Safety Modernization Act: Will FDA Close Your Farm Markets and CSA?

SHOCKER - The FDA has extended the comment period for the Food Safety Modernization Act until this Friday, November 22nd due to computer access problems! Comment today to protect the future of America's food supply. Below are 'talking points' prepared by United Sludge Free Alliance and direct links to the FDA. Please copy and paste or create your own comments! Why is this important to you? Who is in charge of your fresh food? Forward liberally. Does the FDA think 48 million people in the US - 1 in 6 - are food poisoned by CSA's, farmers markets or the neighbor down the street selling eggs - but not by using the toxic waste and water from your city sewer plants and the corporate agribusiness industry? Please consider these relevant issues, tell the FDA to make changes to FSMA proposal and offer another opportunity for American citizens to evaluate the next FSMA proposal.

The Food Safety Modernization Act (FSMA) requirements as written will suffocate the 'little guy' and give the corporate agribusiness an 'affordable pass'. Small scale agricultural businesses, family farms, CSA's, co-op's and farmers' markets find the law creates difficulties for those who have been successfully creating local markets for their locally grown produce in community restaurants, co-ops, groceries and schools. As written, the FSMA promotes the corporate, industrial food and farming model that is a hazard to human health and the environment. Have you left the office and visited a farmers market or family farm? Certainly, if you care about the future of America's food supply and right to healthy and safe food supply, you will reconsider imposing these heavy-handed regulations on small farmers and markets.

Two major points concerning the FSMA: 1) the FDA's proposed new food safety rules unfairly burden family farmers, target sustainable and organic farming, and reduce the availability of fresh, local food in our communities, 2) FSMA proposals exempt contamination testing of soil, fertilizer or agricultural irrigation water if sewage sludge/biosolids or the 'recycled' agricultural water effluence from waste water treatment plants is used during the growing process of your fruits or vegetables: Rejecting a "one-size-fits-all" approach, by including options for small, mid-sized, and direct-market agricultural operations. FDA must not impose regulation that impacts small farmers, especially sustainable and organic, or make it harder for beginning farmers. FDA needs to base cost estimates and make compliance afford-able. Acknowledging that organic production and food safety go hand-in-hand, new regulations must complement – not contradict – strict regulations for certified organic production.

- Minimize extra regulations for low-risk 'value-added' processing that is part of value-added production that helps farmers provide the variety consumers are looking for.
- Regulation must not impact communities by reducing local markets and choices.
- Must make use of agricultural water for irrigation based on peer-reviewed science; studies show antibiotic resistant genes in waste water effluence; no loop-holes for using municipal public water or municipal waste water effluence.
- Sewage sludge/biosolids is NOT a safe fertilizer option; peer-reviewed studies show re-growth of E.coli and Salmonella within 20 minutes of testing in 60% of samples. EPA only regulates 9 elements and 2 indicator bacteria in sewage sludge, yet finds 145 'elements of concern' nationally, including flame retardants. No loop-holes for sludge!

Testing of sewage sludge/biosolids does not include pharmaceuticals, viruses and chemicals known to contaminate soil and to have plant uptake within the body of the plant. FSMA regulations must create true safe food by discontinuing the use of sewage sludge as a fertilizer.

FDA suggestion to 'treat' irrigation waters with an antimicrobial agent is dangerous for the health of the soil, especially with agents like Triclosan which will destroy necessary soil bacteria.

Row, row, row your shale gas wastewater, gently down the stream. Sounds like a bad idea, right?

The United States Coast Guard (USCG) is considering allowing just that. They recently proposed a policy to allow companies to transport shale gas wastewater in bulk by barge on the Nation's rivers. You know, the same rivers we recreate on and are sources of our drinking water. Tell the USCG they are flirting with disaster and need to reject this proposed policy. Please go to

Shale gas wastewater is highly toxic. It contains chemicals like benzene and arsenic, high levels of salt and radioactivity. If a spill on the river occurs it could contaminate drinking water supplies, kill fish and aquatic life and destroy ecosystems. This is too big a risk just so companies can save on transportation costs. Tell the USCG we need to protect our waterways not companies' bottom lines.

The USCG acknowledged that shale gas wastewater does not meet their usual definition of "listed cargo" because it contains multiple hazardous materials and the chemical composition varies from load to load. Yet they still claim there are no significant cumulative or environmental impacts expected. But you know differently.

We need your help defending our nation's rivers from this threat. Tell USCG that you oppose their proposal to allow shale gas wastewater to be transported on the nation's rivers.


